### 11 killed, 52 hurt in road accidents

Eleven people were killed and 52 others injured in separate road accidents in Dhaka, Chuadanga, Gaibandha, Tangail, Chittagong, Jhenidah, Jessore and Dinajpur on Thursday and vesterday.

Our staff correspondent reports, bus helper Abdul Halim, 23, son of Tamiz Uddin of Narayanganj, died as the bus ran him over after he fell off it in the capital's Motijheel yesterday.

Motijheel police said Halim fell off the Malibagh-bound bus while he was counting money standing at its gate around 10:45am.

Police seized the bus while its driver managed to flee.

Meanwhile, nine people were injured when a bus hit a roadside pillar at Joar Sahara in Khilkhet around yesterday afternoon.

They took treatment at different city hospitals, including Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

UNB from Keraniganj reports, two people died and five others injured as a bus hit a CNG-run auto-rickshaw on Dhaka-Maowa road at Teguria yesterday afternoon.

The deceased were Khuki, 55, and CNG driver Majnu, 28. In Chuadanga, Mitu, 12, granddaughter of Rafiqul Islam, died when a train from Rajshahi hit a human hauler while crossing the level crossing at Utholi in Jibonnagar upazila on Thursday afternoon.

Injured Khodeza Begum, 60, wife of Rafiqul Islam and

Rabjel, 42, driver of the human hauler, were rushed to Sadar hospital. In Gaibandha, some 20 people were injured when a bus

collided with a truck on Dhaka-Rangpur highway at Boalia in Gobindaganj on Thursday evening.

Six were admitted to Rangpur Medical College Hospital. In Tangail, Shafiqul Islam, 35, of Barshila in Gopalpur, died and 15 others were injured as a bus fell into a roadside ditch at Palima in Kalihati upazila yesterday afternoon.

Our staff correspondent from Chittagong reports, 18month-old Sarika Akter, daughter of Mohammed Munna of Dewanhat area, died yesterday after he was injured when a bus hit a CNG-run auto-rickshaw at Gawsia Circle in Hazipara area of the city on Thursday night.

Sarika's mother Jinia Akter, 22, and her grandmother Jothsna Akter, were also injured in the incident.

In Jhenidah, Aynal Hossain, 50, of Kaliganj upazila, was killed as his human hauler overturned at Ishwarba bus stand in the upazila yesterday.

Meanwhile, Rashed Mondol, 19, of Shailkupa, was killed as a truck knocked a human hauler carrying him at Churiarbil in the upazila yesterday.

In Jessore, Jarina Bagum, 50, wife of Sukur Ali of Chougachha upazila, died instantly as a truck hit her in Chougachha Bazar area in the upazila yesterday.

Meanwhile, Ajoy Pal, 17, son of Kishor Pal of Jhikargachha upazila, died after falling from the roof of a bus at Sharsha upazila Bazar yesterday.

In Dinajpur, Monmohan Chandra, an official of Parbatipur upazila Food Control Department, died as a truck hit his motorbike on Parbatipur-Phulbari link road at Kurial village in Parbatipur upazila yesterday evening.

# A Good Story

ho doesn't love a good Some of the earliest stories I enjoyed were long but exciting tales of prophets, kings and villains. My greatgrandmother, whom I called Biamma, told them to me and other children gathered around her. Like Scheherezade, she held us spellbound night after night, breaking off at tense junctures to ensure we returned to her the next day. Biamma, who had

married into the family from Dhaka's Nawab Bari, was an extraordinary woman. She was over seventy, but her memory never faltered during her storytelling. With her long white hair she was a picture of grace. She read voraciously. It is

said that when she ran out of books to read, she went around the house looking for children's textbooks.

Her brand of verbal storytelling, called Kissa, has almost disappeared from our culture. Our children multitask their way through life with smartphones, ipads and tablets while wrestling gargantuan homework assignments; few have time to listen to long stories.

One of my favourite storytellers today is the American writer Paul Auster. His novels deal with normal, everyday people, often in incongruous or unexpected circumstances. While literary critics love his existentialism, his finely honed style, and his modernist sensibility, Auster says it best: "When I write, the story is uppermost in my mind, and I feel everything must be sacrificed to it."

Why do I like his novels? They take me on a journey full of unexpected twists and turns. After the first sentence or two, I cannot let go.

While I have enjoyed his novels tremendously, recently I came across a different kind of gem from

Auster. It is a book he edited called True Tales of American Life. The book arose from a

weekly radio program that Auster hosted on America's National Public Radio, where he invited listeners to send in stories from their lives. Every week he selected stories and read them out over the radio. The response was

overwhelming. In the next year, over four thousand stories poured in. The stories were usually short. Once he read seventy in one radio program.

They came from all walks of life: from postmen, teachers, salesmen, musicians, doctors.

Many of the stories

involve family: childhood memories of parents, PHOTO: IHTISHAM KABIR Christmas and other festive occasions. Some are of family legends, such as the

great-grandparent who fought in a war. Some are about friendship and romance. Some contain pleasant surprises, or fighting and winning against overwhelming odds. Others are heartbreaking in their sadness. Yet others deal with dreams, supernatural occurrences and unlikely chains of events.

In a story called Airport, a woman's uncle has died far away and she decides to fly to the funeral. Unfortunately she drives to the wrong airport. When she finally arrives at the right airport, she discovers she has no money or credit card to buy the ticket. At this point she breaks down. Looking for a private place to cry, she visits the bathroom so she can be alone in a toilet, but it has only pay toilets. Finally, she sneaks under a toilet door only to find another woman using it!

The book reminded me, once again, of the timeless joys of a good story.

Hydraulic horn is one of the immeasurable mediums of traffic noise as well as sound pollution that cause serious problems, especially in children, said Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University Vice-Chancellor Dr Pran Gopal Dutta.

"This horn (hydraulic) specially causes serious damage to children...if a child below three years of age hears a horn producing 100 decibels (dB) of noise from close range, he or she might lose hearing ability," he said.

As per World Health Organisation, noise reaching 60 dB can temporarily cause deafness in a man and 100 dB could cause complete deafness. The noise in any busy street in Dhaka has been estimated from 60 to 80 dB, with the sound of hydraulic horns mea-

suring 95 dB. Dr Pran Gopal, an ear, nose and throat expert, narrating various hazards of hydraulic horns and sound pollution, said, "The

hearing loss that is worst in cities where this

type of horns and sirens are common." "Hydraulic horn is very loud and can hurt the eardrums of children. Long term exposure to traffic noise causes irreparable health damages," he told the news

Pediatric expert and in-charge of "Gulshan Ma O Shishu Clinic", Dr Sakil Sarwar, said, "Hearing loss in children can lead to speech problems."

"Excessive noise can cause problems in children including a decrease in school performance, weakening of the immune system and sleep disturbance," he said.

"Excessive traffic noise is one of the most common complaints of the city residents and the sound of hydraulic horn affects people more than any other unwanted noise," said environment expert and a professor of Dhaka University, Dr M A Bashar.

"Though there are sets of laws to prevent sound pollution, people do not know about them because of a lack of concern," he said. most obvious consequence of traffic noise is
