Buet stalemate takes new turn

No classes held after Eid holidays; now students prepare to stage demo for removal of VC and pro-VC

The deadlock at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology (Buet) appears to deepen further as the students resume demonstration today demanding removal of the vice chancellor and his deputy. Meanwhile, even though the Buet authorities insist the teachers to

return to the classes, the latter stand rigid to their demand for removal of the duo. They think it is the only solution to the crisis. The teachers, however, did not declare any new programmes after they had called off their demonstration on July 31 following a High Court

order. The court that day directed them not to stage any demonstration in the interest of smooth academic activities. Buet Teachers' Association launched the agitation along with work abstention on April 7, bringing 16 allegations against VC Prof SM Nazrul Islam and Pro-VC Prof M Habibur Rahman. The general students and

officials joined the agitation in mid July. The virtually stagnant Buet reopened on Saturday after a 44-day closure but no classes have been held since then, hampering education of SEE PAGE 19 COL 2

AL keeps door open for talks with BNP

The ruling Awami League would like to have talks with the main opposition BNP on whether to dissolve the parliament ahead of the next parliamentary election.

The party is, however, firm on the stance that under no circumstances the caretaker government system would be restored to oversee the election.

The BNP demands that the caretaker government system has to be restored.

Opposition leader Khaleda Zia on Thursday said a general election could not be held without the parliament dissolved and the present government would be forced to reinstate the caretaker government system.

Awami League leaders predicted that Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina would form a "small cabinet" comprised of other party leaders ahead of the elections and that government would oversee the polls.

ROW OVER UK VISA SPONSORSHIP

Thousands of foreign students face expulsion

More than 2,000 non-European students, including many Bangladeshis, face deportation risk after the UK government revoked London Metropolitan University's right to sponsor visas of non-European students.

Announcing the decision on Wednesday night, UK Border Agency said the university authorities had failed to address "serious systematic failings" identified six months ago, reports BBC Bangla on its

News agency AFP adds: Amid alarm at the potential damage to the foreign student market in Britain -- worth an estimated \$22.2 billion-- the government rushed to reassure foreign students that it was an isolated case.

7.6 quake hits coast of Philippines

A 7.6 earthquake struck off the Philippines coast yesterday, triggering a small tsunami that hit the eastern part of the archipelago, seismologists said.

The US Geological Survey said the quake had a depth of 34 kilometres (21 miles) and hit at 8:47 pm (1247 GMT), 139 kilometres east of the city of Sulangan on Samar island.

ADB calls for removing rice trade barriers Asks Asian nations to stabilise prices amid fear of crisis

Asia should cut rice trade barriers and stabilise prices, the Asian Development Bank said Thursday, as concerns grow of a supply crunch similar to one that led to the 2008 global food crisis.

Asians, the world's top rice consumers and producers, bore the brunt as prices of the cereal spiked in 2007-2008 due in part to export limits by producers and panic buying by big importers, the Manila-based bank said.

Their governments need to reduce export restrictions, which an ADB study found were to blame for a 149 percent price surge four years ago, said Lourdes Adriano, an agriculture and food security expert at ADB.

"To enhance resiliency and ensure that rice prices do not jump beyond the reach of the region's poor,

policymakers must think and act regionally," she said in a statement.

Experts blamed the last food crisis on slowing production growth at a time of rising demand, bad weather, and competition from biofuels, triggering hoarding and export restrictions.
