PADMA LOAN CRISIS

Mashiur all set to go?

In the interest of Padma bridge funding, Mashiur Rahman has tentatively agreed to step down as the prime minister's economic affairs adviser, highly placed government sources have said.

The co-financiers of the project -- Asian Development

Bank (ADB) and Japan International Cooperation Agency (Jica) -- have extended their loan effectiveness after getting specific commitment from the government to remove Mashiur, officials of the two agencies said.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith assured ADB Director General for South Asia Juan Miranda of Mashiur's removal when they met on Thursday, they added. The resignation of Mashiur is the last hurdle in efforts

to get the \$1.2 billion loan, cancelled by the World Bank in June over corruption allegations, revived.

It seems utility companies do not have a clue about what the other is doing. The Titas Gas company started commissioning its new gas distribution line from Thursday in Jatrabari after it removed its old line from the area, which was posing an obstacle to the Gulistan-Jatrabari flyover construction. The company dug up the road and installed the pipes prior to Eid and had covered it up with soil temporarily to ease public movement. As they resumed their job Thursday, they discovered that Desco had installed a new high-voltage power line above the Titas pipelines, perhaps before the Eid holidays. Desco never told Titas its plan. Such lack of coordination has unnecessarily made the job risky as seen in the photo where the power cables are hoisted. However, Titas Managing Director Aziz Khan said the job would be done by Monday.

Honda coming to Bangladesh

Plans to assemble bikes, then manufacture those in 4 years time

The Japanese Honda Motor Co plans to form a joint venture company in Bangladesh to assemble motor-



cycles, as production cost had increased in other countries, said a senior official of the industries ministry yesterday.

Within five years of operation here, the company would go for full-scale motorbike manufacturing, said ABM Khorshed Alam, an additional secretary of the industries ministry.

Honda would form the JV plant with the state-owned Bangladesh Steel and Engineering Corporation (BSEC) soon, he

HALL-MARK LOAN SCAM

Janata, Agrani too partners in crime

Finds central bank inspection

State-run Janata Bank and Agrani Bank breached banking rules to provide loans to the textile company Hall-Mark Group in connivance with Sonali Bank, helping embezzle crores of depositors' money, the central bank has found.

Janata's corporate branch located at Janata Bhaban and its local office in the city, the principal branch of Agrani Bank Ltd and the Sonali Bank Ruposhi Bangla Hotel branch worked in league with officials of Hall-Mark.

The findings came in a Bangladesh Bank inspection on foreign trade activities of the Janata corporate branch.

When accounts of the Anawara Mills and Max Spinning Mills were opened on June 8 last year the owner of Anawara Spinning Mills was identified in the papers as Md Jahangir Alam and the owner of Max Spinning Mills as Mir Zakaria.

In both cases, Tanvir Mahmud, managing director of Bobby Spinning Mills and also managing director of Hall-Mark Group, was the introducer.

Janata started purchasing bills of Anawara Mills on June 16, 2011, and of Max Spinning Mills on June 26, against letters of credit (LCs).

zens at a discussion on "Interim versus caretaker government: in which way free and neutral polls" held at the Jatiya Press Club in the capital yesterday.

Shushashoner Jonney Nagarik, a citizens' body for good governance, that organised the programme came up with a formula as an alternative to the BNP-led opposition's demand for restoring the caretaker system and the ruling Awami League's proposal for an interim government under which the next polls will be held.
