## DoE fines Japan Garden City Ltd

The Department of Environment (DoE) yesterday fined Japan Garden City Ltd, a housing project in the capital's Mohammadpur, Tk 26 lakh for constructing buildings without environment clearance certificates.

The department revealed in a press release that the company evaded Tk 62.5 lakh as environment clearance fees for its 26 high-rise buildings.

On visiting the area, DoE Director (Enforcement) Mohammad Munir Chowdhury summoned Japan Garden City Managing Director Wahiduzzaman to the DoE office yesterday.

The MD being abroad, the company DGM Shafiqul Islam and Manager Shawkat Imran went to the DoE office when Munir fined the company.

Back in 2001, the DoE gave the company placement clearance against only one apartment. But, the company constructed 26 buildings in the area, without taking environment clearance certificate for any.

## Dubai expatriate commits suicide

An expatriate Bangladeshi who lives in Dubai allegedly committed suicide at his residence in Bangabazar of Sitakunda upazila in Chittagong early yesterday.

The body of Azizul Haq, 36, who came to Bangladesh two months back, was found hanging from the ceiling fan of his living room, said police quoting family members.

Informed by Azizul's family, police went to the spot, recovered the body and sent it to Chittagong Medical College Hospital for an autopsy.

## Six businesses fined in Ctg

A mobile court yesterday fined six businesses Tk 1.4 lakh in Chittagong.

The mobile court led by Zubayer Ahmed, deputy director of Directorate of National Consumers Rights Protection in Chittagong, fined four eateries -- Candy Tk 50,000, Café Alam Tk 30,000, Asian Kebab and Biriani House Tk 25,000 and Niribili Hotel Tk 20,000 -- for preparing food in dirty environments.

The court also fined two shops -- New Food Parler and Mojumder Store -- Tk 5,000 and Tk 10,000 respectively for selling commodities without price and weight tags.

## Mob beats up JnU bus driver for accident

Angry mob beat up a Jagannath University (JnU) bus driver after the bus hit a passer-by in front of Suritol Primary School at Bangshal in the capital yesterday.

Injured Jagadish was rushed to a hospital.

Bangshal Police Station Officer-in-Charge Abdul Kuddus said the Mirpur-bound bus with some of the university teachers hit Jagadish.

Locals attacked the bus and beat up its driver, leaving his right hand broken.

Proctor Ashok Kumar Saha rushed to the spot.

Some students of the university engaged in a chase and counter-chase with the mob. Police fired teargas to bring the situation under control, the OC said.

Traffic on the road was disrupted for around half an hour, he added.

## Power tariff hike protested

The National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports yesterday threatened to go for tough agitation programmes including laying siege to the energy ministry, if the government does not withdraw its decision to increase power tariff before September 6.

Slating the government's decision, the committee leaders said people will not be liable for the production of power as the decision was taken to satisfy looters of the country.

They made the remarks at a rally organised in front of the Jatiya Press Club in the capital in protest of the government's decision, said a press release.

Prof Anu Muhammad, among others, spoke at the rally.

MEGHNA, MEGHNA-GUMTI BRIDGES  
Temporary repair starts

Temporary repair works on Meghna and Meghna-Gumti bridges, two key bridges on the Dhaka-Chittagong Highway, began in the early hours yesterday to keep the structures fit for traffic movement for three months.

Officials said Malaysian Hercules Engineering, selected to do the repairs under a Tk 150 crore project, and Bangladesh Army will begin the long term repair works at the end of this year.

The six-hour repairs, during which traffic movement is off-limit on these sections of the highway, begin at midnight everyday and will continue till September 7.

Steel plates were being placed between the damaged expansion joints on the top part of the bridges and while the damaged hinge bearings underneath were being replaced as the damages have turned traffic movement risky.

The officials said Meghna bridge will be repaired in three nights while Meghna-Gumti in four nights.

On the first night's effort, the Malaysian firm fixed only two out of nine badly damaged expansion joints of Meghna bridge. Two more nights are needed to fix the remaining expansion joints.

During a visit to the Meghna bridge on the early hours of Sunday, the workers were seen struggling to keep the pace due to inadequate light and power outlets both on and beneath the bridge.

The first night's repair works were also hampered due to a visit by acting communications secretary MAN Siddique, Roads and Highways Department Chief Engineer Aminur Rahman Laskar and some other officials.

Many of them brought their vehicles which obstructed the repair works.

Placing of wrong steel plates on the wrong expansion joints also delayed the repairs.

The Malaysian technicians and their local staff mistakenly placed smaller plates on an expansion joint. The plates were removed when an army officer detected the mistake. In the meantime nearly two hours had gone by.

Bangladesh Army, which was given the responsibility to do the repair job in June, is assisting the Malaysian technicians.

The authorities concerned are stopping vehicles coming from Dhaka at Kanchpur bridge at 11:00pm and diverting those toward Narsingdi while stopping those from Chittagong at Mainamoti and diverted those toward Brahmanbaria.

This means that traffic movement from Kanchpur bridge to Mainamoti remains suspended for seven hours.

The government has arranged an alternative route to divert around 30,000 vehicles plying the highway each day.

The detour for the Dhaka-Chittagong traffic is Dhaka-Bhairab-Brahmanbaria-Moinamati-Chittagong.

## Voter list updating begins tomorrow in capital

The Election Commission will begin updating the voter lists of the areas under Dhaka south and north city corporations tomorrow, said Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad.

Enumerators will go door to door to collect information about prospective voters to register them on the electoral rolls and delete names of the dead from the lists, the CEC said yesterday at a training workshop of enumerators in Rajuk Uttara Model Collage Auditorium in the capital.

The commission will begin the task with Uttara and Sabujbag. Updating of voter lists of Gulshan, Dhanmondi, Demra, Motijheel, Cantonment, Mirpur, Mohammadpur, Lalbagh, Kotwali, Sutrapur, Tejgaon, Ramna, city corporations.

and Pallabi will begin on September 15, he said.

"There is no alternative to flawless voter lists for a free and fair election," Rakibuddin said, adding that he did not want to see any complication in the polls because of erroneous voter lists.

He made the remark in context of the controversial voter lists prepared by the Justice MA Aziz-led EC in the run-up to the ninth parliamentary polls scheduled for January 22, 2007.

The scheduled polls could not be held due to declaration of a state of emergency amid political turmoil. Erroneous voter list was one of the major reasons for the turmoil.

The current EC has recruited 3,319 enumerators and 668 supervisors for updating the voter lists of the areas under the divided Dhaka city corporations.

## Mobile eye care project launched

Around three lakh patients with eyesight complications, especially those suffering from retinopathy disease, will receive eye care services from a newly introduced mobile eye care project in the country.

Under the project, which is run by two mobile diabetic retinopathy screening and treatment units, services can be provided to 250 patients per day.

The project styled "BADAS-ORBIS Eye Care Project" was unveiled at the office of Bangladesh Institute of Health Sciences Hospital, a sister concern of Diabetic Association of Bangladesh (BADAS), which will run it for the next two and half years.

The association will primarily work in Dhaka and then move to other parts of the country, said Sayed Foysal Ahmed, project manager of eye care plan.

For the first time BADAS has taken an initiative to provide eye care services at district level, he added.


Along retinopathy disease, other common eye diseases such as peripheral neuropathy and cataract will be diagnosed under the project.

The aim of the project is to prevent blindness due to diabetic retinopathy in underserved areas of the country by increased access to eye care, screening and treatment services.

According to BADAS, around six percent of the total population is suffering from diabetes in the country. This number is around 5.7 million and 25 percent of them are susceptible to retinopathy disease.

Prof AK Azad Khan, president of BADAS, said the mobile eye care services would continue through different works after the expiry of the current project.

World Diabetes Foundation is funding the project.
