
### Pardew gets 2-game ban

Newcastle United manager Alan Pardew has been given a two-match touchline ban and fined 20,000 pounds for pushing an assistant referee during a Premier League match last month.

The Football Association confirmed the punishment on their website on Monday. Pardew had already accepted a charge of improper conduct following the incident during Newcastle's 2-1 victory over Tottenham Hotspur on August 18. The suspension takes effect immediately, meaning Pardew will be banned from the touchline for Newcastle's league games against Everton on Sept. 17 and Norwich City on September 22.



### Franchised 1st-class cricket from Oct 14

As promised the BCB is going to model the country's lone first-class competition -- the National Cricket League (NCL) -- on a franchise-based system. The fourteenth version of the tournament will start from October 14 at four different venues across the country, said BCB president AHM Mustafa Kamal after the board's emergency meeting yesterday.

"We want to start it. It may happen that of the eight franchises only two or three can get sponsors. In that case the rest will play under their respective division's banner. We should start it to introduce real competitiveness in the first-class competition," said Kamal.

"As you saw, there were some teething problems in the Bangladesh Premier League (BPL) T20 because we started in a hurry. Here too, there may be some teething problems, but it is important to get it off the ground," he added.

He also informed that it will be a singleleague-based tournament where the two top finishers will play the final. The board also decided that it will introduce day-night matches during this tournament, for which the pink ball being trialled worldwide will be used.

"The opening and final matches will be daynight affairs which will take place at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur," he added.

BCB took the decision to arrange daynight longer version matches in line with ICC's efforts to introduce day-night Tests.

BCB RELAXES CLAUSE TO ATTRACT BIDDERS

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB)

brought some leniency to one clause to attract more bidders to their international tender for worldwide media rights.

The amendment was made to the prerequisites for prospective bidders during the board's marathon emergency meeting and accordingly, a tender will be accepted if one among the marketing agent and the broadcaster has five years' experience in a related field.

The previous clause which stated that only companies with five years of experience can buy the bid papers rendered several prominent companies ineligible to participate in the bidding.

Kamal will head a new committee to approve the successful bidders alongside BCB directors Ahmed Iqbal Hassan (finance committee chairman), Jalal Yunus (media chairman) and Mirza Salman Ispahani (tender and purchase committee chairman).

"We made the amendment following a poor response from the companies. We are expecting a much better response now before the end of the new deadline. We took a tough stance regarding the TV deal this time because of our previous bitter experience," said Kamal.

# Murray rolls on

Olympic champion Andy Murray advanced to the last eight at the US Open while World No. 1 Roger Federer

reached his 34th consecutive Grand Slam quarterfinal on Monday without touching a racquet.

British third seed Murray, seeking his first Grand Slam title after four runner-up finishes, defeated Canadian 15th seed Milos Raonic 6-4, 6-4, 6-2 in a night match at Arthur Ashe Stadium.

The 25-year-old Scotsman, who reached his eighth Grand Slam quarterfinal in a row, will play for a semifinal berth against Croatian 12th seed Marin Cilic, who beat

Slovakian Martin Klizan 7-5, 6-4, 6-0. Murray is 6-1 lifetime against Cilic but the only loss came in the fourth round of the

2009 US Open. "Tough match. He's a tough player," Murray said. "He works extremely hard. He has a solid game. I will have to work

extremely hard to beat him.

Top seed Federer, seeking an unprecedented 18th Grand Slam title and record sixth US Open crown, advanced by walkover when American Mardy Fish withdrew from their match over health concerns.

"I am really sorry for Mardy," Federer said. "I just want to wish him a speedy recovery. We all want to see him back on tour soon."

The 31-year-old Swiss star reached a lasteight matchup with Czech sixth seed Tomas Berdych, who dispatched Spanish 11th seed Nicolas Almagro 7-6 (7/4), 6-4, 6-1. Berdych has lost 11 of 15 career meetings to top seed Federer.

Murray broke Raonic with a drop volley winner for a 5-4 lead and held to take the first set after 36 minutes. In the second set, Murray broke for a 3-2 edge when Raonic netted a forehand and held serve from there

Forwards in the national booters' training camp are seemingly under pressure to ensure their places in the national squad after coach Shaiful Bari Titu hinted that he might chose a single striker in the two exhibition matches against Nepal.

# 'Pistorius is wrong'

Sprinter Oscar Pistorius's claim on Sunday that his rival, Brazilian Alan Oliveira, had an unfair advantage is not just painfully ironic, the data does not bear him out, states the

Guardian sportblog.

Talk about irony. Within minutes of being upset by Oliveira in the final of the men's T44 200m, the South African claimed that he was "not running a fair race". The crux of his argument, which he also stated before even losing the final, is that his rivals were artificially extending the length of their legs: "It's very clear that the guys have got very long strides".

To add to that case, he was quoted after the final as saying: "I can't compete with Alan's stride length."

Now, let me (the blogger) start by saying there is a lot more to running than stride length. If all it took was big strides, then the running world would be dominated by the tallest men, and shorter runners like Tyson Gay would stand no chance.

What matters is not just stride length, or height, but rather the length of the leg relative to height, and the ground contact length, which is a function of the leg length (partly). Plus there is force applied to the ground, leg turnover rates and all those things, but let's take one component at a time here.
