Michael Hussey and Glenn Maxwell hit fighting halfcenturies to help Australia beat Pakistan by three wickets in the third and final oneday international Monday, taking the series 2-1.

Hussey scored 65 for his 39th fifty and Maxwell hit a 38-ball 56 not out as Australia successfully chased down a challenging target of 245 in 47 overs, with three wickets in hand, spoiling Pakistan's chances of beating them for the first time since 2002.

Opener Mohammad Hafeez top-scored with 78 in Pakistan's fighting total of 244-7 after they were put into bat in Sharjah.

Hussey added an invaluable 51 for the fifth wicket with Matthew Wade (22) after Pakistani spinner Saeed Ajmal (3-37) had threatened to wreck their innings, reducing Australia at one stage to 108-4.

But once Ajmal came on the Australian innings faltered as the off-spinner dismissed David (Hussey), Clarke (32) and George Bailey in his first five-over spell but Hussey then foiled Ajmal in his second spell.

Pakistan were also sloppy in the field as they dropped four catches and their wicketkeeper Kamran Akmal spurned one stumping.

Earlier Hafeez's 97-ball knock -- his first fifty against Australia in eight matches -helped Pakistan post a challenging total.

Hafeez put on 129 for the opening wicket with Nasir Jamshed (48) and it looked as if Pakistan would post a big total but they were once again derailed by some sustained pace bowling by Mitchell Starc who finished with 4-51.

Jamshed, who hit 97 at Abu Dhabi, was again at his fluent best as he hit six boundaries during his 75ball knock.

four boundaries and two sixes. Starc, who took a career best 5-42 in the first match, then came into his own. The lanky left-arm paceman had Asad Shafiq (27) and Umar Akmal (nought) in the same over before ending Misbah's short 25 runs innings in the 47th over.

Azhar Ali made 27 not out to give fillip to Pakistan's total. Surprisingly, Australia -- considered weak against spin on the Asian pitches -- have lost only one bilateral limited overs series in the sub-continent and Middle East in 20 years. They lost to India in a three-match series in 2010.

Pakistan and Australia now play three Twenty20 internationals -- all in Dubai -- on September 5, 7 and 10.

Three-time champion Serena Williams stormed to a double bagel 6-0, 6-0 rout of Czech Andrea

Hlavackova to reach her 10th US Open quarterfinal on Monday in a ruthless display of her title credentials.

The 30-year-old American allowed the world number 82 just eight points on her serve and finished the last-16 clash with 31 winners against just seven unforced errors, backing up her 57minute win with eight aces.

Williams, a 14-time Grand Slam title winner, and the reigning Wimbledon and Olympic champion, has dropped just 12 games in four matches at the Open this year.

She hasn't lost a game in her last three sets played while Monday's mauling was the fifth time in her career she had handed out a double bagel.

Williams will on Wednesday face Ana Ivanovic for a place in the semifinals after the Serb 12th seed defeated Bulgaria's Tsvetana Pironkova 6-0, 6-4.

The other quarterfinal will feature Italian compatriots, best friends and doubles partners Sara Errani and Roberta Vinci battling for a semifinal spot. Errani, the 10th seed, defeated last year's

semifinalist, German sixth seed Angelique Kerber 7-6 (7/5), 6-3, while Vinci saw off Polish second seed Agnieszka Radwanska 6-1, 6-4. It will be the first time two Italian women

have made the last eight at the same Grand Tuesday's first quarterfinals see top seed

Victoria Azarenka facing defending champion Samantha Stosur while 2006 winner Maria Sharapova takes on France's Marion Bartoli.

Ivanovic booked her first Grand Slam spot in four years -- and first ever at the US Open -by defeating Bulgaria's Tsvetana Pironkova 6-0.6-4.

Ivanovic has never taken a set off Williams in her three defeats; two of those losses came at the US Open in 2006 and 2011.

The 24-year-old Ivanovic's last major quarterfinal came on the way to her one and only Grand Slam triumph at the 2008 French Open.

Time's up for Sachin?

Sachin Tendulkar is facing unprecedented calls to retire after a string of failures fuelled speculation that time had finally caught up with India's cricket icon.

Tendulkar, who is now 39, has shouldered the hopes of a nation for 23 years, in the process becoming the world's leading rungetter in both Test and one-day cricket with 100 international centuries.

But a string of recent poor scores -- combined with the manner of his dismissals -has turned sections of the media and a once adoring public against him. Sunil Gavaskar, the first man to reach the

10,000-run milestone in Tests, suggested during this week's second Test against New Zealand in Bangalore that Tendulkar's reflexes were on the slide. "The dismissal that was most disturbing

was that of the 'master' when he was bowled through the gate," Gavaskar wrote in his syndicated column. Pressed further, on air during the second

Test, Gavaskar said: "With age, the feet don't come to the pitch of the ball, the eyes don't pick up the ball early." Former India captain Mohammad

Azharuddin also said Tendulkar's feet were not moving well in the crease and he was constantly playing across the line.

"It is clear his reflexes have slowed down," Azharuddin said.

Tendulkar has scored a record 51 Test centuries but he has now gone 25 innings without a hundred in the five-day game since making 146 against South Africa in Cape Town in January, 2011.

His top score in the recent series against the lowly Kiwis was 27, prompting The Times of India to post pictures of three of his dismissals -- all bowled -- on its front page under the headline: 'What's wrong with India's batting genius?' An online poll in the Hindustan Times

said 56 per cent of respondents agreed that it

was time for Tendulkar to retire.

The Mail Today asked in a front-page banner headline if it was the "End of the road for Sachin?" And the usually conservative Hindu newspaper also wondered if "Father Time was catching up with the maestro".

Tendulkar has consistently dismissed any thought of retirement and told reporters last week that he still loved the game and enjoyed playing at the top level.

He is the last remnant of a fabled Indian middle order after both Rahul Dravid and VVS Laxman retired in the last 12 months. Sourav Ganguly, the other member of the quartet, quit in 2008. Ganguly, who played alongside Tendulkar

for almost two decades, said speculation over Tendulkar's future in the game was uncalled for. He insisted that Tendulkar is still good

enough to play at international level, ahead of visits by England and Australia later in the season. "I honestly feel the time has not come for

him to go," Ganguly said. "He is a legend and takes pride in his game and no one knows his game better than him. Ganguly said lack of match practice con-

tributed to Tendulkar's cheap dismissals against the Black Caps, and he expected him to be back in peak form when the four-Test series against England starts in mid-November. "His ability has not declined, he just has

not had enough time out in the middle," said Ganguly. "The problem is with his shot selection and that is because he has not played for the last few months." Tendulkar had a rotten time in England

and Australia last year, scoring just four halfcenturies in 16 innings as India went down 4-0 against both rivals. Alarm bells began ringing when

Tendulkar took a year to move from 99 to 100 centuries, finally reaching the landmark during the Asia Cup one-day international against Bangladesh in March. Hopes that the floodgates would then

open have since evaporated.
