Yuvi back from the brink

First India-New Zealand T20I today

Indian all-rounder and World Cup hero Yuvraj Singh will don national colours for the first time since battling cancer when a twomatch Twenty20 series against New Zealand starts on Saturday.

The 30-year-old left-hander underwent chemotherapy in the United States in March and April to treat a rare germ-cell tumour between his lungs which was diagnosed late last year.

Yuvraj, who was man of the tournament in India's World Cup triumph last year, has not played competitive cricket since two home Tests against the West Indies last November.

But the selectors recalled him as soon as he was declared fit by doctors at the National Cricket Academy in Bangalore where he had begun light training in July.

"It is hard to believe that I will be playing for India again," Yuvraj said ahead of the first Twenty20 game against the Black Caps in the southern coastal town of Visakhapatnam.

"A few months back I had trouble climbing four steps, now I can't wait to take the field. It is like starting a new life," said the all-rounder. Veteran spinner Harbhajan Singh, also mak-

ing a comeback after being out of favour with the selectors for a year, said he was delighted to see close friend Yuvraj back in action.

"Now this is what we call a comeback," said Harbhajan. "There can't be a bigger inspiration in cricket than Yuvi. It is a privilege to be back in the dressing room with him."

The match on Saturday and the second game in Chennai on Tuesday will serve as a tune-up for the World Twenty20 that starts in Sri Lanka on September 18.

The Black Caps are hoping to end their Indian tour on a high by winning the Twenty20 games after being whitewashed 2-0 in the recent Test series.

All-rounder Jacob Oram, who did not play in the Tests, said the two games were timely ahead of the tournament in Sri Lanka.

"We are here to win but whatever happens we have to make sure we learn from the series because it's great preparation, Oram said.

"You are not going to get a tougher com petition than playing India in India. Fiftyover champs but perennial T20 favourites as well.'

New Zealand will be boosted by the return of influential all-rounder and former captain Daniel Vettori, who missed the Tests due to a groin injury.

Tickets for the first game at the 27,000capacity Andhra Cricket Association stadium have been sold out despite forecasts of bad weather on Saturday. **TEAMS**

England Twenty20 captain Stuart Broad has insisted the absence of Kevin Pietersen will not overshadow the upcoming series with South Africa and the defence of their World Twenty20 title in Sri Lanka.

Pietersen remains in international exile as the row over the "provocative texts" he sent to South African players, some allegedly critical of England teammates rumbles on.

The South Africa-born batsman, England's man of the tournament when they won the World Twenty20 in the Caribbean two years ago, did announce his limited overs retirement earlier this season but then changed his mind and made himself available for all formats again.

However, Pietersen's replacement, Alex Hales made 99 from 68 balls against the West Indies in Nottingham during Engand's last Twenty20 match, in Nottingham in June.

England now face South Africa in three Twenty20s, starting at Chester-le-Street, the home of north-east county Durham, on Saturday.

Broad told Sky Sports News on Friday: "The planning started, for these (Twenty20) games and the (Twenty20) World Cup, from

Trent Bridge. "KP (Pietersen) had made himself unavailable for the World Cup and his

replacement came in and got the highest score for an English batsman. "The planning had already been set in

place, Alex Hales came in and did very well and that's what we've been focusing on.

"We've got a great squad here and we're really excited about the next month," the allrounder added. "We've got guys who are hungry and keen to develop their skills, and going to Sri Lanka we're very excited to do that."

The latest series of matches between England and South Africa will see the teams contesting the number one ranking in the third of cricket's three international formats this season.

South Africa won the three-Test series 2-0 to take the International Cricket Council mace.

But England remain top of the 50-over rankings after a series that ended in a 2-2 draw following the tourists' seven-wicket win in Nottingham on Wednesday.

"It's the start to our World Cup campaign and we're looking to gain momentum throughout this series," said Broad.

"The Test and one-day series didn't go exactly according to plan but we've got the responsibility to do that over the next week.

"South Africa, I think, are number one in the Twenty20 format, so we know we're up against a tough team but we've played some really good Twenty20 cricket over the past

"We need to develop on that and move forward ahead of Sri Lanka."

England called up James Anderson on Wednesday as cover for Steven Finn after the fast bowler suffered a back problem while fellow seamerTimBresnanis also an injury doubt.

"We've got a couple of niggles, it tends to happen at the end of an English season, so we're probably going to look to be careful and look after the quicks a little bit," said Broad.

"We've got a tough month coming up and there are a couple of niggles but nothing too major.

"We had 15 so we had to bring in some body who's not in the squad. Jimmy's been a regular bowler for us -- he's not played Twenty20 cricket for a while and not played a lot of domestic Twenty20 cricket because of the international schedule but we know what he offers and we know he's got the skills to deliver."

Hingis picked for Hall of Fame

Swiss former world number one Martina Hingis, a winner of five Grand Slam singles titles, has been nominated for induction into the International Tennis Hall of Fame.

Hingis, 31, was announced as a nominee on Thursday along with 1991 Wimbledon champion Michael Stich of Germany and Czech Helena Sukova, one of the greatest doubles players of all time.

Other nominees included veteran Thelma Coyne Long of Australia, who won 19 grand slam titles from the 1930s to 1950s, and former players Charlie Pasarell of the United States and Ion Tiriac of Romania who each became successful tennis promoters.

Hingis, who won the Australian Open and Wimbledon at the age of 16, quit tennis for the first time in 2003 at the age of 22, suffering from ankle injuries.

Britain's Jonnie Peacock on Thursday sprinted to glory in the Paralympics' showpiece final, stripping "Blade Runner" Oscar Pistorius of another title with a lightning-quick 100m.

The 19-year-old, who holds the world record of 10.85sec in the straight sprint, again proved he is the fastest amputee runner in the world by taking gold at the Olympic Stadium in east London in a new Paralympic record of 10.90sec.

Pistorius, 25, was just out of the medals in fourth, clocking 11.17sec behind compatriot, friend and roommate Arnu Fourie, who took bronze in 11.08sec and US sprinter Richard Browne, who won silver in 11.03sec.

A stunned Peacock described his win as "amazing" while the South African star was magnanimous in defeat and said the Briton's performance was just the start of a stellar career.

"I can't imagine how happy he must be to do this in front of his home crowd," he told Britain's Channel 4 television. "Well done, it's a great time for him. He's still young and he's got a great future ahead of him."

Organisers had billed the T44 race for single and double below-the-knee amputees as the race of the Games, predicting that all eight finalists could go under 11 sec for the first time.

Ganguly eyes coaching role

Former India captain Sourav Ganguly has pushed himself forward to become the next coach of the national side, telling cricket chiefs that next time they should turn to a homegrown candidate.

The Zimbabwean Duncan Fletcher, who took over from South Africa's Gary Kirsten last year, has been under pressure after heavy Test series defeats against England and Australia.

A poor showing in this month's T20 World Cup in Sri Lanka could make his position untenable.

Ganguly backed Fletcher to continue in the hot seat but said he would be ready to fill the job whenever a vacancy occurred.

"If the BCCI (Indian cricket board) feels that I can be a good coach, I will be ready," he told the Hindi news channel Aaj Tak. "I feel I can create a differ-

Makarova win mixed doubles

Russia's Ekaterina Makarova and Brazil's Bruno Soares completed an unlikely run to the US Open mixed doubles title by beating fourth-seeded Kveta Peschke of the Czech Republic and Marcin Matkowski of PolandonThursday.

Makarova and Soares committed to the tournament at the last minute and the unseeded duo rode the partnership to a grand slam triumph when Peschke failed to return a baseline backhand from Makarova to end their tiebreak 12-10 after splitting the first two sets 6-7, 6-1.

"The best feeling," said Soares, who became the first South American men's player to win the event after coming from a set down and facing a championship point at 9-10 in the tiebreak.

Soares played two grand slam events last year with Makarova but had since teamed up with Australian Jarmila Gajdosova, with whom he played the last four

grand slams. But as the entry deadline time approached, the Brazilian found he would not gain direct entry into the field because his combined ranking with Gajdosova was too low.

Makarova, a mixed doubles runner-up with Jaroslav Levinsky at the 2010 Australian Open, had asked Soares about competing at Flushing Meadows but he told her he was already committed.
