Women,
men win

Bangladesh men's and women's teams both won their respective matches of the 10th round of the 40th World Chess Olympiad in Istanbul, Turkey on Friday.

The men's team beat Thailand by 3.5-0.5 points, thanks to victories by GM Abdullah Al Rakib, GM Enamul Hossain Razeeb and GM Niaz Mursheed. However, the highest rated Bangladeshi GM Ziaur Rahman drew his board. The men's team now have 12 match points and 23.5 games points and are placed 49th with the last round to be played today. Bangladesh take on Bosnia & Herzegovina in the last round. China, Armenia and Russia share the lead with 17 match points each.

In the women's section, Bangladesh beat Ireland by 3-1 points on Friday with Sharmin Sultanah Shirin, WIM Rani Hamid and Nazrana Khan Eva winning their boards. WFM Zakia Sultanah lost her board. Bangladesh women's team have 11 match points and 22.5 games points and take on Turkmenistan in the last round. China and Russia lead the women's section with 17 match points each.

INDO-PAK SERIES
PCB demands
visa for fans

Pakistan's cricket chief on Friday urged the visiting Indian Foreign Minister SM Krishna to ensure fans would get visas so they can see the first series between the two countries in five years.

India has invited Pakistan to play three one-day internationals and two Twenty20 games in December-January. The rivals have not held a series since 2007, after cricket ties were snapped following the 2008 attacks on Mumbai.

Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) said its chairman Zaka Ashraf met Krishna in Islamabad to discuss travel arrangements for the series.

"Ashraf requested Krishna for the support of the Indian government to facilitate in the issuance of Indian visas for the Pakistani fans wanting to watch the Pakistan-India series this year," a PCB press release said.

Krishna had directed India's High Commissioner in Pakistan to extend maximum cooperation, the PCB said.

"A cricket series between Pakistan and India is very important for the fans on both sides of the border," said Ashraf.

"So it is extremely important that they are facilitated any way possible by the governments and the cricket boards of both the countries."

Rankings

Bailey

Australia captain George Bailey was left scratching his head as to how his side was now ranked below Ireland in the Twenty20 rankings after their super over defeat in the second Twenty20 international against Pakistan on Friday.

He questioned the rankings system in which now Ireland are a place above them.

"That does not look good but I am still not sure how the rankings work," said Bailey of the Twenty20 rankings introduced last year and currently topped by South Africa.

"So Ireland goes past us when we haven't played Ireland in a T20. If Ireland is a better side than us then I guess it will show in a couple of weeks in Sri Lanka," said Bailey of the World Twenty20 championship starting on September 18.

Australia are in Group B of the 12-team competition and open their campaign against Ireland in Colombo



Serena-Victoria finale

Three-time champion Serena Williams cruised into her sixth US Open final on Friday with a 6-1, 6-2 mauling of Italian Sara Errani and will tackle world number one Victoria Azarenka in the final.

Williams, the Wimbledon and Olympic champion, will be looking to capture a 15th Grand Slam singles title in Saturday's title match which she has reached for the loss of just 19 games and without dropping serve.

She will take a 9-1 winning record into the final against top-seeded Australian Open winner Azarenka, who came back from a set and a break down to beat 2006 champion Maria Sharapova 3-6, 6-2, 6-4 to reach her first New York final.

In a rematch of the Australian Open final where Azarenka beat Sharapova to win her first Grand Slam title, the 23-year-old from Belarus rallied to defeat the Russian third seed.

"I was just trying to grab the first opportunity," Azarenka said. "Maria is such a great player. She came out firing and didn't give me a chance to get into a rhythm. I just kept fighting with all my heart."

No women's top seed has won the US Open since Justine Henin five years ago. No top seed has won any Grand Slam women's crown since Williams in 2010 at Wimbledon.

This is the first time a US Open women's final four has included the year's prior Grand Slam champions -- Azarenka, Wimbledon and Olympic winner Williams and Sharapova, who completed a career Grand Slam with her Roland Garros title.

Earlier Hafeez hit three boundaries in Cummins' first over of the match but fellow opener Imran Nazir was bowled for nought in Mitchell Starc's second over.

Hafeez and Jamshed shared a solid 76-run partnership for the second wicket as both charged the Australian bowling with some aggressive batting. Jamshed hit four boundaries and a six during his 36-ball knock.

He fell to a superb catch by Dan Christian off Cummins, as the fielder lunged backward and held the ball with left hand.

Hafeez hit six boundaries during his 42-ball knock.

Kamran hit six boundaries during his knock, helping Pakistan to 90 runs in the last 10 overs.

Earlier, tight bowling from the Bangladeshi spinners restricted Afghanistan to 99 at the end of fifteen overs. Mashrafe Bin Mortaza was the most expensive, giving away 33 runs in his three-over spell while fellow pacer Shafiqul Islam conceded 27 runs in three overs, but the Afghan batsmen struggled to score against the spinners.

Shakib Al Hasan claimed two wickets for 13 runs in three overs while Abdur Razzaq took one for 16 but it was Elias Sunny who really had the Afghan batsmen in a web, giving away only nine runs in three overs taking one wicket.

Mohammad Shahzad was top-scorer with 29 off 25 balls with four boundaries while Nabi added an unbeaten 26 off 20 balls that featured two boundaries.

Kevin struck off the rolls

There was no place for Kevin Pietersen among the 10 England players awarded central contracts on Friday by the England and Wales Cricket Board for the 2013 season.

Pietersen has been in England exile since being dropped following the second Test against his native South Africa in Leeds last month.

But the ECB did not completely close the door on Pietersen being added to the list for what will be an Ashes year, saying in a statement Friday: "In respect to Kevin Pietersen discussions are ongoing and they remain private."

Officials, already frustrated by availability rows, were furious when it emerged Pietersen had sent "provocative" texts to South African players -- some allegedly critical of then England captain Andrew Strauss.

China keep volley gold

China beat the United States 3-1 to take the London 2012 women's sitting volleyball gold medal -- then jokingly threatened to beat up their assistant coach for pushing them so hard.

In a match at the ExCeL exhibition centre's South Arena 2 on Friday between the world's top sides, China won 22-25, 25-15, 32-30, 25-15, with Sheng Yuhong the best player by far, top-scoring with 38 points.

China have won all three gold medals since women's sitting volleyball was introduced to the Paralympics at Athens 2004.

"We made the country proud," Sheng said.

"Now we are going to punch the assistant coach for being too tough on us during training. We need all the girls' strength to take him down. Then we will have a rest. We need it!"

Kari Miller of the United States said: "China is a great team -- very steady."

"We have to train harder and learn to be as steady as China. It's great to have the opportunity to battle great teams. It helps us to grow."

Ukraine took the bronze medal after beating the Netherlands in straight sets.

Sitting volleyball is played on a smaller court than regular volleyball, and with a lower net. Players can also block and attack the serve.

Each team can have two players classed as having "minimal disability" on their squad, though only one can be among the six on the court at any one time during the best-of-five-sets matches.

Meanwhile, Germany beat Australia 58-44 in the women's wheelchair basketball gold medal match to condemn the Gliders to a third Paralympics final defeat.

Germany made it seven wins out of seven at the London 2012 Games to take the gold at the North Greenwich Arena before a 13,000-strong crowd on Friday, going one better than the silver they achieved at Beijing 2008.

Australia won the bronze four years ago, having taken silver at Athens 2004

and Sydney 2000.

"We have had many tournaments over the last seven years and we have won medals, not gold, but we have been doing this step by step," said Germany coach Holger Glinicki.

"We had a silver medal in Beijing and now we are at the end, we have reached our pinnacle."

Australia coach John Triscari said: "The ball would not go in the hole. It was one of those games where the shots did not drop. I thought our defence was still pretty tough, but down the stretch their shots dropped but ours didn't."

"It is a funny game this. If the ball does not go through the steel thing with the rope on it you do not win."

"I am not crying. I am still proud of my girls. It is disappointing that we did not get the gold medal, but I am so proud of the girls and they did a remarkable job."

The Netherlands delivered their best performance of the competition in their 71-47 defeat of the United States, the defending champions, to win the bronze medal.
