

Tajuddin and Syed Iqbal exhibition in Canada

Promenade Gallery at Mississauga, Ontario has organised an art exhibi tion titled "Colour of Bengal" featuring the works of Toronto-based Bangladeshi artists Tajuddin Ahmed and Syed Igbal.

The exhibition was inaugurated on August 30. The artists' last joint exhibition was held at Tivoli Art Gallery in Gulshan, Dhaka. Bangladeshi educationist

Borhanuddin Khan Jahangir inau gurated the exhibition as chief guest. Charles Soussa, Minister of Citizenship and Immigration (Canada); Jay Sarkar, president and chairman of Sartrex Corporation; Barrister Paltu Kumar Sikder and Councillor Jim Tovey were present as special guests on the occasion. Asma A. Mahmood, director of the gallery, presided over the

Both the artists have established individual styles and preferences in themes, but what connects them is their deep love for the motherland. Tajuddin Ahmed began his career

as a semi-abstract painter and his themes at the current exhibition include enigma in nature, nostalgia, expressions of emotions, and his beloved Old Dhaka. His acrylic paintings carry some of his personal traits like smooth ground, imposing colours and sensual lines. The painter is more concerned with managing space and forms. Some bizarre objects can also be found in his paintings. Tajuddin grew up in Old Dhaka

and the rapid changes in the city; socio-economic, political and cultural structures; architectural upgrade, common people and their way of life have tremendously impacted his work. His work highlights an interaction between object and space. The strength is brushstrokes that are bold at times and delicate at others. Space has been created on the canvas. Colours like red, blue, golden yellow and cobalt

appear flatly in his works. The tonal plus linear approach gives his work a different quality and distinct look. Syed Iqbal is a self-taught

painter. He has illustrated many children's books. Most of his paintings delineate abstract forms where layers of colours mingle with unfamiliar forms. Some of his works are concept-based where he explores myths and folklore with references to Hindu deities such as Krishna,

Kali and Durga. Iqbal's canvas is a space where rich texture and thick colours join one another. His works feature a soothing blend of yellow, black, ash

Darkness seems to be Iqbal's favourite subject. His use of darkness in his paintings is quite distinct. Depicting light on a certain space makes the paintings more alluring. He has used Roman alphabets to give the works a mysterious

The paintings at the show have been taken from both private and public collections, including the Bengal Foundation and the Bangladeshi Foreign Office in

The exhibition will continue till September 13.

Maksud Jamil Mintu Music maker

SHAH ALAM SHAZU

Maksud Jamil Mintu, a renowned composer and music director, is recognised for his countless popular numbers. He won a National Film Award for the song "Ekta chhilo shonar konya" in the movie "Srabon Megher Din". The creator of many title songs and background scores for TV plays, Mintu continues his journey in the music arena full steam ahead. The talented composer recently spoke to The Daily Star (TDS) on a gamut of issues.

TDS: What in your view are the major differences between the contemporary and past music

Mintu: The main difference is in the recording process. Contemporary composers Habib and Balam follow the same pattern of tunes that we used to create in the past. But the latest creations are technologically richer. We didn't have technologically advanced studios back then, so producing quality sounds was tough. That is the major difference. Another change is the use of traditional instruments in folk songs. Such instruments were the primary devices in the past, with electric guitars and drums as supporting gears. But nowadays the same songs are being done with a western touch.

TDS: Songs from yesteryears used to find a firm place in listeners' minds. Why are new songs unable to achieve that?

Mintu: Many contemporary artistes are producing good music, but they lack the technical know how. In the absence of quality sound, even a song by a good composer fails to attract attention. So the listeners forget the tunes easily.

TDS: What is the first thing that comes to your mind while creating a new song?

Mintu: At the beginning I contemplate the message the song will convey. Then I ponder how the music can complement the lyrics. I feel that once I read the lyrics, the tunes automatically come to me. This is how I create a song. The initial tunes are hardly ever changed in the later stages.

TDS: How did you become a composer? Mintu: I played the guitar after my graduation in 1979. I went to BTV and played with Anisur Rahman

Tonu. Later, in 1982, I began working in movie playbacks with Ahmed Imtiaz Bulbul. My first taste in film music was in "Megh Bijli Badol", where I played the guitar for the background score. TDS: Later you also

began composing and directing music for films? Mintu: Yes. I first worked as a music director in Motin Rahman's "Agun Jalo". The movie featured the song "Elomelo Batashe", recorded by Baby Naznin. I also worked as composer and music director in several movies by Humavun Ahmed.

TDS: Why are you not a regular in the audio

Mintu: I stopped working in the audio business because the producers

profited from our works but failed to recognise our talents. Although we were a key part of their business, we never received proper recognition. So I left the audio scene, only to return in 2009. I came back on a request from Asif Akbar. After a 19-year hiatus, I made an album for Subir Nandi titled, "Shonar Konya". TDS: Tell us about your popular movie numbers.

Mintu: The movie "Srabon Megher Din" had tracks like "Ekta chhilo shonar konya", "Aaj amar Kushum ranir bibaho hoibo", "Ogo bhabijaan nao baowa" and "Amar bhanga ghore". I also worked on the music for the film "Dui Duwari". It featured "Mathae porechi shada cap" sung by Agun, and Selim Chowdhury's "Shohagpur graame ekta". I also composed the songs "O amar ural ponkhi re" and "Chandni poshor raite jeno" for the movie "Chandra Kotha". Subir Nandi and Selim Chowdhury recorded the songs respectively. I also composed and directed music for "Shyamol

TDS: You have also composed many title tracks for TV plays. Can you amplify on that?

Mintu: My first such experience was in the 1988 drama by Al Mansur, titled "Jekhane Dekhibe Chhai". I also made title tracks for Selim Al Deen's "Gronthikgon Kohe" and Abdullah Al Mamun's "Shirsho Bindu". I received the most recognition for my theme music in Humayun Ahmed's "Kothao Keu Nei". Later, I went on to do the theme music for over 500 TV plays, which included Humayun Ahmed's "Aaj Robibar" and "Nokkhotrer Raat"



The six-day theatre festival to celebrate the 60th birth day of veteran theatre actress and activist Lucky Enam, as well as her four decades in Bangladeshi theatre ended on September 9 at the National Theatre Hall Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy.

The festival featured six plays directed by the actor director, while a photo and poster exhibition, multime dia projection featuring Enam's works on television and a seminar were other highlights. Enam's troupe Nagarik Natyangan, that staged five of the six plays, organised the festival in association with Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy.

On the final day, National Theatre Repertory staged its third and latest production "Bideha", an all-women play that highlights the agonies of the Biranganas and tries to narrate their plights to the young.

Young playwright Shahman Moishan's story follows Birangana Halima and Shantikumari (played by Lucky Enam and Momena Chowdhury respectively) who share their agonies with each other, as both have endured trauma and lifelong stigma. The production introduces another character, a young non-resident Bangladeshi who is a war child (played by Jyoti Sinha).

As "Bideha" narrates a shattered promise of the

Liberation War, the organisers picked another play on the theme, "Sheishob Dingulo" -- a chronology glorifying the historic event. The Dr. Enamul Haq play narrates the wartime hardship of a middle class family and narrates the glory of a group of freedom fighters. The play was staged on the penultimate day. Other staged plays showcased diversity of Lucky

Enam's directorial approach and her troupe's commitment towards theatre activism. While Arthur Miller's social satire "Pussy Cat and a

Real Man" [which commenced the festival on September 4] fulfilled the quota of world classics, an adaptation of Manik Bandopadhyay's intriguing story of love, rage and other human instincts "Pragoitihashik" showed the richness of Bangla literature. Many would consider the play as the best of the festival

and one of the best productions by the theatre troupe. The festival also featured a Rabindranath Tagore adaptation "Muktir Upaye" and a Dipak Sen play An over 200-member committee consisting of almost

all the recognised theatre personalities and activists was formed to arrange the festival. Veteran theatre personality and a friend of Enam, Ataur Rahman, was the convener of the committee.



Kim Ki-duk's **Pieta** wins Venice



South Korean movie "Pieta", an ultra-violent story of a loan shark confronted by a mysterious woman claiming to be his mother, scooped the Golden Lion award for best picture at the Venice film festival on Saturday.

The other big winner on the night was Paul Thomas Anderson's "The Master", loosely based on the early days of Scientology, which earned him a Silver Lion for best director and a joint best actor award for Philip Seymour Hoffman and Joaquin Phoenix.

Critics praised Pieta's visceral portrayal of a twisted story of love and revenge, difficult at times to watch but also absorbing and moving in equal measure. Director Kim Ki-duk sang a traditional Korean song

"Arirang" as part of his acceptance speech, and later told reporters: "This is a song that we Koreans sing when we are sad, when we feel alone, when we feel desperate, but also when we're happy.' Asked how he felt about receiving the award, he picked up the Golden Lion and kissed it.

Hoffman, playing a character based on Scientology founder L. Ron Hubbard and Phoenix as his troubled, Kim Ki-duk holds the Golden Lion prize for best movie "Pieta". volatile protégé, were clear front runners for the acting

prize and both are expected to be in the frame when Oscar nominations are announced. Hoffman rushed back to Italy to accept the awards on

Austria's Ulrich Seidl picked up the Special Jury Prize runner-up award for "Paradies: Glaube" (Paradise: Faith). Hadas Yaron was named best actress for her performance in "Fill the Void". The screenplay award was won by Olivier Assayas of France for his 1970s political drama "Apres Mai", and Italy's Daniele Cipri was named winner of the cinematography category for "E Stato Il Figlio". Notable films that did not figure among the prizes included Terrence Malick's "To the Wonder".
