EVICTION FROM GRABBED RAILWAY LAND

Minister orders, secretary stops

The railways secretary yesterday stopped the demolition of a resort that had been built on illegally occupied railway land in Pakshey, although the railway minister had given clear instructions to evict it only ten days ago.

The decision was made based on an advocate certificate collected yesterday by the resort owner from his lawyers. According to the certificate, the High Court on Monday had stayed the demolition for six months, but the written order of the court was yet to be released.

BNP-blessed businessman Akram Ali Khan Shanzu built the Pakshey Resort, the biggest illegal structure on the railway's west zone, occupying eleven acres of land in Pakshey divisional railway colony area during the tenure of the BNP-led fourparty alliance government.

On September 1, Communications and Railways Minister Obaidul Quader, during a visit to Pabna, asked the authorities concerned to demolish all illegal structures on railway land.

Sultana Kamal tells of their role in 1971 war crimes




