Govt working on online news portal policy: Info secretary

The Election Commission will sit today with civil society personalities to seek their opinion on redrawing the boundaries of parliamentary constituencies and the ongoing task of updating voter lists.

Around 100 individuals of civil society were invited to join today's talks at 11:00am at National Economic Council conference room in the capital.

This is the first time that the Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad-led EC is holding such talks.

The commission also plans to hold talks with senior journalists but is yet to fix a date for this.

After receiving their opinions, the EC will finalise its course of action on redrawing the boundaries of parliamentary constituencies.

Although the commission is undecided whether to sit with political party leaders, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad several times said the EC would hold talks with them if the need arises.

Dhaka Wasa unveils sewerage master plan

Entire capital to come under network

Dhaka Water Supply and Sewerage Authority (Wasa) has prepared a 23-year sewerage master plan to bring the whole Dhaka city under its network. Currently only 30 percent of the capital is

covered by the sewerage network, speakers said at a programme at Sonargaon Hotel yesterday where the plan was unveiled. Due to an absence of sewerage system in

the large parts of Dhaka city, waste is being dumped in rivers, canals and other water bodies, causing serious water pollution.

Wasa Managing Director Taqsem A Khan said the plan would be implemented in three phases at a cost of US\$ 2 billion.

In the first phase, Pagla Sewerage

Treatment Plant will be improved so that it can use its full capacity of treating 1.2 lakh cubic metres of waste. Currently it treats only 40,000 cubic metres of waste.

In addition, the trunk sewerage from Madhubagh (near Tejgaon) to Pagla will be rehabilitated and new sewerage system will be built in Gulshan and Banani area. Wasa will also rehabilitate or construct

four lift stations at Tejgaon, Gulshan, Bashabo and Golapbagh. The first phase will be implemented by 2015. In the second phase to be completed by

2025, Wasa will construct four sewerage treatment plants in Dhaka and two in Narayanganj. Five more treatment plants in Savar, Tongi

Keraniganj, Purbachal and Gazipur will be constructed in the third phase by 2035.

Fire destroys 50 slum houses in N'ganj

At least 50 houses and two warehouses were completely destroyed by a fire that broke out at Chandmari slum in Narayanganj town yesterday morning. Witnesses and police

said the fire originated from the house of one Edu Mia in the area around 11:00am and soon engulfed the adjacent structures. On information, five

fire fighting units from Mondal Para and Hajiganj in the town rushed to the spot and doused the fire after an hour of hectic efforts.

More than half of the 100 houses in Chandmari slum were burnt to ashes in the fire incident.

Two arrested for killing trader

Detective Branch (DB) of police yesterday arrested two men on charge of killing a small handicraft trader in the capital's Pallabi on August 5. A dispute over collecting

money through extortion led to the murder of trader Mohammad Ali, 35, said police quoting the arrestees. Detained-- Jibon Ahmed

alias Joni, 24, and Md Kalam, 30, have admitted their involvementin the killing of Ali.

Acting on a tip off, police arrested the two from Baonia of Turag.

Ali was a member of a criminal gang led by one Musa and he used to collect money for Musa. However, the two got into a disagreement when Ali demanded money from an associate of Musa, police said.

Enraged Musa planned to kill Ali and after an altercation with Ali, Musa and two others shot him, they said.

On August 5, Ali was found dead with three bullet injuries.

PROPOSED COMMISSION FOR NGOS

Stakeholders fear disruption of innovative activities

The government's proposed commission to streamline non-government organisations stirred criticism among NGO stakeholders who apprehended that the new move would disrupt their innovative and voluntary activities.

New York-based Human Rights Watch (HRW), in a September 10 statement, said the government, on August 25, mentioned of launching a commission to look into NGO operations, claiming that many were involved in "terror-financing and other antistate activities.

HRW had suggested scrapping the proposed commission and apprehended that the government move would stifle civil society activity. Though the government stated that the

commission would ensure transparency and accountability in the NGO sector, the stakeholders consider the move a way to control their activities. "It is good to have an institution to regulate

the non-state organisations' activities. But if the commission's purpose is to impose too much control on NGOs, it will create a scope for corruption," said Rasheda K Choudhury, executive director of Campaign for Popular

Education, yesterday.

With different sectors, including banks and the share market, troubled with unbridled corruption, the government should not go for any new move without consultations with the stakeholders who may suffer in future, she told The Daily Star. NGO Federation of Bangladesh Chairman

Tajul Islam told The Daily Star that he heard about the government's plan informally and through the media and none from the government had formally informed the stakeholders. Refuting the stakeholders' apprehensions,

Social Welfare Ministry Secretary Ranjit Kumar Biswas said the plan was still in an embryonic stage. "There is nothing to control or regulate in

the NGOs activities, rather the commission, if formed, will facilitate the NGO activities," he toldThe Daily Star. He said there were currently around 50,000

NGOs operating in the country by obtaining registration from the Ministry of Social Welfare, NGO Affairs Bureau and The Office of the Registrar of the Joint Stock Companies and Firms.

Director General of the NGO Affairs Bureau Nurun Nabi Talukder said no discussions were yet held with the government about the formation of the commission.

Secularism must for country's progress

AK Khandker tells discussion

Planning Minister AK Khandker yesterday said secularism must

be maintained in Bangladesh for the country to progress. "If we want Bangladesh to advance, people of different religions have to treat each other as brothers. Thus, secularism must be maintained," he said.

The minister was addressing a discussion after screening of a documentary titled "Jihad Without Border" made by noted writer and war crimes researcher Shahriar Kabir in Women's Voluntary Association (WVA) auditorium in the capital.

"I believe Bangalees have spiritual power which will emerge on time and absolute secularism will be established in the coun-

try," said Khandker. However, noted historian Prof Muntasir Mamun said the future of secularism in Bangladesh is dark as communal educa-

tion is expanding. On the ongoing war crimes trial, Mamun claimed the prosecution of International Crimes Tribunals is very weak.

Also laying blame on the government, he said, "The govern-

ment itself also tolerates fundamentalism in the country." Presiding over the discussion, cultural personality Kamal Lohani said the government is showing contradictory attitude because establishing secularism is not possible keeping Islam

as the state religion. Through his documentary, Shahriar Kabir disclosed different information on "history, politics, economy and character of militancy in Pakistan."

Veteran left politician Ajoy Roy, Chairperson of Ain O Salish Kendra Hamida Hossain among others, spoke at the discussion.
