Demand rights groups

Eleven rights bodies yesterday demanded punishment for the authorities of private housing companies who are filling up water bodies violating detailed area plan (DAP) in the capital.

They also demanded transparency in Rajdhani Unnayan Kartripakkha's process of giving approval to the housing projects. They made the demands in a letter sending to the secre-

tary of the Housing and Public Works Ministry, says a press release of Transparency International Bangladesh (TIB). Referring to a report headlined "Illegal Housing Projects,

Government making those legal" published in The Daily Star on July 31, it says Rajuk started the process of giving private housing companies approval to some illegal projects. The 11 rights bodies are Ain o Salish Kendra, Association

Punish grabbers Four buses set on fire after road crashes

Mobs set four buses ablaze after a garment worker was killed and a minor girl injured in separate road accidents in Gazipur and Chittagong yesterday.

In Gazipur, garment workers blocked the Dhaka-Mymensingh highway for an hour after their co-worker Md Hazrat Ali, 20, was run over by a bus at Chhoydana in Sadar upazila around 8:15am.

Hazrat, son of Babar Ali of Karimganj upazila in Kishoreganj, died on his way to a local hospital, said Abdul Baten, superintendent of police (SP) of Gazipur.

Hearing the death news, workers from Eva Sweater Factory vandalised vehicles and blocked the highway, he said.

They also set fire to three buses--one of Cholachol Paribahan and two of Balaka

Service--around 9:00am, the SP added. On information, Firefighters rushed to the spot and doused the flames.

Our Chittagong correspondent reports, a mob blocked the Dhaka-Chittagong highway for two hours after a minor girl was hit by a bus at Ponthichila near Sitakunda

upazila headquarters. Umme Habiba, 6, a class-I student of Ponthichila Islamia Dakhil Madrasa, sustained severe injuries in the head and legs.

Humayun Kabir, officer-in-charge of Baro Aulia Highway Police Station, said a Chittagong-bound bus of Choice Service hit Habiba while she was on her way to the madrasa around 11:00am.

Agitating locals vandalised the bus and set fire to it immediately after the accident.

Habiba was taken to Chittagong Medical College Hospital.

Two killed by trains in capital

Rising campaign

Eminent feminists and rights activists representing different organisations took part in the launching ceremony at Goethe Institut, Dhaka.

Rights activist Khushi Kabir said 160 countries, including the ones in South Asia, had already started numerous activities leading up to the 15th anniversary of V-Day, an international movement to stop violence against women.

The anniversary will be observed on February 14, 2013. Numerous awareness programmes will be organised across the country on the occasion.

"On February 14, 2013, One Billion Rising will shake the Earth. The launch is a call on all stakeholders to join the initiative," said Khushi Kabir.

One in three women on the planet is or has been beaten up or raped during her lifetime, she said. According to this calculation, she said, one billion women would be subjected to violence in their lifetime. "One Billion Rising is a global revolution to stop that.'

The launch featured poetry recitals, reading out stories, gonosangeet (movement songs), and dance.

Eminent citizens and cultural personalities like Hamida Hossain, Shaheen Anam, Salma Khan, Sara Zaker, and Rokeya Rafique Baby, among others, attended the event.

Wasfia Nazreen, climber of Mount Everest, and Salma Khatun, the country's only woman locomotive driver, were also present. All of them participated in a choral rendition of the gonosangeet, "Ano Mukti".

The organisations joining the initiative include ActionAid, Adcom, Ain o Salish Kendra, Brac, Manusher Jonno Foundation, Nijera Kori, and Oxfam.

Reduce constituency numbers of Dhaka

Civil society personalities urge EC

Some civil society personalities and nongovernment organisation representatives yesterday proposed to reduce the capital's parliamentary constituency numbers to protect the interests of rural areas.

Redrawing the parliamentary constituencies on population basis would cause the capital's constituency numbers to rise, depriving the rural areas, they said.

Holding talks with Bangladesh Election Commission in the conference room of National Economic Council of the planning ministry, the discussants asked the EC to consult political parties on their opinion on

redrawing the boundaries. Some cited a proposal by the past ATM Shamsul Huda-led EC to reduce the capital's constituencies from 15 to 10 to prevent rural

areas from losing parliamentary seats.

Before the last delimitation of boundaries in 2008, the capital's parliamentary constituency numbers was eight. It stood at 15 in 2008 and the EC had to reduce the seats in rural areas to meet the capital's demand.

Addressing the discussion, Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad said redrawing the constituencies on population basis may cause the capital's constituency numbers to rise to 25.

Barrister M Amir-Ul Islam demanded that the EC holds talks to know the opinions at grassroots level.

Barrister Rafiqul Haque, former Dhaka University vice-chancellor Prof Maniruzzaman Mia and former adviser to a caretaker government Rasheda K Chowdhury also participated in the talks.

MOMIN KILLING CASE

Verdict yet to be implemented

Although more than one year has passed, verdict in the Kamrul Islam Momin murder case is yet to be implemented as two convicts with death penalty and four others with life term imprisonment in the case are still on the

Momin, 22, a student of Dhaka Commerce College, was shot dead in front of his residence in the capital's Ibrahimpur area on September 13, 2005.

Momin's elder brother Shamsul Islam said, "We urge the government to implement the verdict immediately and arrest the absconding killers."

On July 20, 2011, the Speedy Trial Tribunal-4 of Dhaka sentenced former officer-in-charge of Motijheel Police Station AKM Rafiqul Islam and two others to death for their involvement in the murder.

The tribunal also sentenced six people to life term impris-

onment in the case.
