



Get law, stop JS boycott

Demands TIB

Transparency International Bangladesh yesterday called for a law to end the culture of parliament boycott by the opposition.

The absence of a party from the House should be restricted to 30 days in a five-year term with no more than seven successive working days, the anti-graft watchdog

At present, the constitution allows a lawmaker to remain absent from parliament for 90 consecutive sittings before his seat falls vacant, but it says nothing about collective absence.

TIB made the demands while unveiling a research work titled "Declaration on Parliamentary Openness" at Brac Centre Inn in the capital. The programme was organised to mark International

Day of Democracy. On the same day in Rome, 85 observatory groups from 60 countries, including TI, presented their findings on issues involving parliaments.

At the programme in Dhaka, TIB demanded a code of conduct for lawmakers and a law to prevent conflict

BANGLADESHI WORKERS IN S KOREA

Frequent change of jobs blocking others' prospect

Irregular status of more than 5,000 Bangladeshis in South Korea remains a serious obstacle to sending more workers to the lucrative job market of a major Asian economy.

South Korean employers are not keen to hire Bangladeshis as they are

of the view that Bangladeshi workers frequently change companies, affecting their factories, said a high official of Human Resources Development (HRD) Service of South Korea.

In 2011, Bangladesh had a quota of 4,400 workers, but only 1,768 could avail themselves of jobs in

Korea, said Choon-Bok Lee, vicepresident of Global Workforce, HRD Korea, during his recent visit to Dhaka.

"We would request the Bangladesh Government to help in this regard so that those completing their term of service return home,"

51 'disappeared' since 2011

Meeting told of law-enforcers' link; rights boss warns govt

The state should play a more pro-active role to end "enforced disappearances" in the country as it is duty-bound to shoulder the ultimate responsibility of such incidents, said the National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) chairman yesterday.

DHAKA-MAWA HIGHWAY 26 illegal speed bumps removed

In an unprecedented move, the Roads and Highways Department (RHD) has removed 26 illegal speed bumps from a 50km stretch on Dhaka-Mawa highway to cut travel time and fuel consumption.

About a similar number of bumps are still on the highway.

Munshiganj RHD officials said it took them years to convince the locals, mostly the politically influential, of the need for removing the bumps.

These speed bumps not only slow down the traffic but also cause huge economic loss. Once a vehicle is forced to slow down to negotiate a bump, its fuel consumption and travel time increase with the vehicle suffering heavy pressure on various parts. Losses caused by these bumps could be very high at national level, said an RHD official.

Md Ataur Rahman, executive engineer at RHD's Munshiganj office, told The Daily Star that the removal of illegal bumps was


Power price cut if voted to power
