

# Radha Raman songs hold away over the audience

## Musical programme at Shilpakala Academy

Two accomplished artistes -- Chandrabati Roy Burman and Bishwajit Roy -- of Radha Raman Sangskriti Chorcha Kendra performed songs of the mystique bard Radha Raman Dutta at the National Music and Dance Centre auditorium of

Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy on September 15 Bangladesh Sangeet Sangathan Samannay Parisad arranged the event as part of their regular fortnightly musical programmes. The artiste duo representing two generations performed 10 songs each at the programme.

The octogenarian Chandrabati Roy Burman is a pioneering singer of Radha Raman's compositions. The artiste set off the soiree with the song "Shyam Tumi Aaona Kene Rosho Brindabon-e' Her expressions and gestures during the performance epitomised the image of a consummate artiste. Very few artistes can claim to have such

"Chandrabati Roy Burman's rendition of Radha Raman songs is original in regard to tune, as she took music lessons from her grandmother Rajeshwari Roy Burman who is thought to have a master-disciple relationship with Radha Raman Dutta," Bishwajit Roy mentioned prior to the per-

Bishwajit Roy's repertoire included "Aaij Kenorey Praner Subal", "Ore O Roshik Naiya", "Hori Gunagun Krishna Gunagun", "Kunjey Mi Go", "Kemon Achhey Kamolini Rai", "Bhromor Koiyo Giya" and more.

Flutist Hossen Ali produced the familiar melodies every now and then with the performances His accompaniment with Bishwajit's rendition of the song "Amarey Ashibar Katha Koiya" was memorable. Radha's yearning for Krishna is beautifully

Prior to the performance, director of Music and Dance Department of BSA, RA Mahmud Selim welcomed all and spoke in brief on Radha Raman Dutta.

Radha Raman Dutta (1833-1915) was an influ-

ential Sylheti folk music composer and poet, from the Sunamganj district. His work led him to be considered as "the father of dhamail songs". The youngest son of poet Radha Madhab Dutta, Raman displayed a musical temperament from childhood. The early death of his father led him to seek the approval of religious mentors throughout his life. Raman's Vaishnavism (worship of Krishna) shaped his musical work and led him to a life of asceticism. Raman was also heavily influenced by the Sufism that infuses Baul culture. His music is widely performed by modern Bengali musicians.

Celebrated Rabindra Sangeet guru (men tor), Shailajaranjan Majumder was recalled in his home district at a programme to announce the making of a documentary on the great music teache

The programme, titled "Rabir Kiron Shailajaranjan", was organised by Mymensingh Press Club at its auditorium on September 13.

SB Biplob, a young television and film director and researcher from Mohangan has made the documentary. Biplob started shooting the documentary in 2006 at Shailajaranjan's village home at Baham, in Mohanganj. The director continued filming in Bangladesh and India till this year.

The film was shot at different spots of Bangladesh including Mohanganj, Netrokona, Mymensingh, Chittagong and

Biplob also shot the documentary at different places in Kolkata and Bolpur,

sity, Bidyasagar College, Rabindra Bharat University, Rabindra Sadan, Visyabharati, Rabindra Museum, Kalabhaban and Shantiniketan.

The film is at its fag end; the editing of the documentary is on and according to plan, the documentary will be released in December in Bangladesh and Kolkata, said Biplob.

The director also said that Shailajaranjan, a renowned son of Mymensingh region, remained a relatively unknown figure, especially for the younger generation. "I made the documentary to uphold the contributions of Shailajaranjan to our music," said Biplob.

Shailajaranjan gave notations to some 200 songs composed by Tagore. Of them "Badal Din-er Prothom Kadam Phool", "Aaji Jhar Jhar Mukhar Badar Din-e", "Hriday Amar Nachere Ajike", "Ogo Tumi

Paradeshi", "Mon Mor Megher Shongi" and "Amader Shantiniketan" are well known Shailajaranjan won several prestigious

prizes of India for his musical prowess. A discussion was held as part of the

State Minister for Cultural Affairs, Advocate Pramod Mankin, was the chief guest. The function was addressed among others by veteran journalist AZM Imam Uddin Mukta; Professor Atiqur Rahman; Professor Rebeka Yasmin; cultural personality Shah Saiful Alam; poet Shamsul Fayez; Assistant Police Commissioner Shima Sarker; theatre artiste and playwright Farid Ahmed Dulal and singer Snehashish

Chowdhury. Professor Reaz Uddin Ahmed, vicepresident of Mymensingh Press Club, presided over the discussion.

Dr. Monjurul Alam Champak, professor of Bangladesh Agricultural University emceed the event.

For his brilliant performance in the field of music, Tagore gave Shailajaranjan the charge of Sangeet Bhaban and the latter enlightened generations of aspiring singers with his superb grasp of classical

# A man of many hues

Syed Mujtaba Ali's 108th birth anniversary

Dr. Sved Mujtaba Ali (1904-1974) was a Bengali author, academician scholar and linguist. September 13 marked the 108th birth anniversary of the versatile

Ali was born in a prominent

family in Sylhet. His father, Syed Sikandar Ali, was a sub-registrar. Ali studied at various educational institutions on account of his father's frequent transfers. As a school student, Ali wrote a letter to Rabindranath Tagore, who promptly sent an inspiring reply and invited him to study at Shantiniketan. He had the honour to be taught directly by Tagore.

From 1929 to 1932, Ali studied at universities in Berlin, London and Paris. He earned a PhD in comparative religious studies from Bonn. In 1934-1935, he studied at the Al-Azhar University in Cairo. Subsequently, he taught at colleges in Baroda (1936-1944) and Bogra (1949). After a brief period at Kolkata University (1950), Ali became secretary of the Indian Council for Cultural Relations and editor of its Arabic journal 'Thaqafatul Hind'. From 1952 to 1956 he worked for All India Radi at New Delhi and Patna. He then joined the faculty of Visva-Bharati University (1956-1964).

Ali was a brilliant conversationa ist and storyteller. When Ali was is his mid-40s, the Desh editor encouraged him to write "Deshe-Bideshe" and it instantly catapulted him to fame.

The multilingual Ali knew 15 languages: French, German, Italian Arabic, Farsi, Urdu, Hindi, Sanskrit, Marathi, Gujarati, Pashtu, English and several dialects of Bengali. After Partition in 1947, Ali went

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activist and a supporter of Bengali as the national language of East Pakistan. In 1948, as principal of Azizul Huq College, Bogra, he wrote an essay, "The State Language of East Pakistan", which was printed in 'Chaturanga' of Kolkata. At the time the West Pakistani rulers were trying to impose Urdu as the only state language of East Pakistan while Bengali was spoken by most of the people. The government of Pakistan sought an explanation from Ali, wh promptly resigned and moved to

The great scholar breathed his from India to then East Pakistan, his last in Dhaka on February 11, 1974.

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motherland. He was a language

He was an outspoken critic of the British rulers. His writings are profuse in sarcastic comments about

the colonial rulers. He published 25 immensely popular volumes of novels, stories, essays and columns. He smoothly mixed Arabic, Farsi and Sylheti words in his works. Then he dipped it in his great wit, brilliant satire and incomparable scholarship. He was always interesting and never dull. He researched extensively on religion but was secular and progressive. He was cosmopolitan as well as deeply rooted in the Bengali ethos.
