

At least half of the 12 participating nations will consider themselves strong contenders to lift the trophy in Colombo on October 7, with the others

hopeful of living up to the event's reputation for shocks. From defending champions England, the powerful West Indies and formidable

South Africa to Asia's top three -- former winners India and Pakistan, and Sri Lanka -- the field is strong and deep. The others won't be taken lightly

either, if a string of sensational results in the tournament's three previous editions are any indication. While many purists are uncon-

vinced by Twenty20, and fear the impact on Test cricket, there's no doubting its entertainment value.

India, initially reluctant to embrace the newest format, won the inaugural event in South Africa in 2007 under rookie skipper Mahendra Singh Dhoni after senior pros Sachin Tendulkar, Rahul Dravid and Sourav Ganguly opted out.

It was in the same tournament that Zimbabwe stunned Australia, Bangladesh upset the West Indies, and India brushed aside England, South Africa, Australia and Pakistan in successive games to grab the title.

The men to watch out for are plenty. Australian spinner Brad Hogg, aged 41 and South African all-rounder Jacques Kallis, 37 next month, will look to rubbish the theory that Twenty20 is a young man's game.

Ace Indian all-rounder Yuvraj Singh is assured of a warm welcome from the stands, having battled cancer earlier this year to return to the big stage.

Also vying for the spotlight will be prolific Pakistani spinner Saeed Ajmal, dashing Australian opener David Warner, local boy Lasith Malinga, England's Jonny Bairstow and South Afri-Sri Lanka's frontline batsman can Richard Levi.

New Zealand will this coming week enter their fourth ICC T20 World Cup in Sri Lanka with little real previous success, but will still hope to pull off a surprise or two in the tournament.

According to explosive batsman and wicketkeeper Brendon McCullum, the Black Caps are determined to make a mark and redress their poor record.

They have made just one semifinal, in 2009, and built a seven win-nine loss record in the tournament so far.

The team looks promising on paper, with opener McCullum sitting atop the world international T20 batting rankings and Martin Guptill placed fifth.

The team's bowling stocks look strong, too -traditionally considered with Kyle Mills, Tim Southee and Nathan McCullum in decent form.

Round robin play will pit the Black Caps

against Bangladesh (on Friday) and Pakistan (Sunday), and they need at least one victory to ensure passage through to the Super Eight pool

Being tactically "proactive" in their warmup games against Australia, who they played in Colombo last night, and South Africa, will lay a good base for the team, stuff-co.nz quoted McCullum, as saying.

"The teams we're playing in the competition are going to be a lot different to the two warmup games against Australia and South Africa,'

he added. "But I still think, whilst it would be nice to try different combinations and try a few of your tactical elements in those games, I still think it's about being able to be proactively mixed in your tactics and stay in front of the opposition,' he, however, said.

New Zealand has beaten Bangladesh in the shortest form of the game in Hamilton in February 2010 and Pakistan thrice. But it has lost to Pakistan on five occasions.

# Lara dedicates it to father

## The West Indian legend inducted into Hall of Fame

Brian Lara, who was inducted into the International Cricket Council's Hall of Fame at the Awards ceremony in Colombo on Friday evening, dedicated the honour to his late father Bunty Lara, who died before his son played a

Lara also credited his brother Winston and sister Agnes during the function at the Water's Edge Resort, saying they'd played important roles in his development as a cricketer.

"This person you see today before you accepting this Hall of Fame honour is someone he [Bunty Lara] moulded. He ensured that I had everything I needed to succeed as a cricketer and in life, even in trying times," Lara said. "He made a special effort to make sure everything was there.

"I had to work hard ... but I knew I had strong support. My biggest pain was that he did not see me play a Test match, but having the West Indies team in Trinidad at his funeral was a special tribute to the man who made sure I was given the tools to play this glorious game and make such a lasting contribution." Lara ended his 17-year international

career as Test cricket's leading run-

52.88 in 131 matches, a record that has been beaten since. However, he still holds the record for the highest individual score -- 400 against England in Antigua in 2004. He had held it before as well, when he scored 375, also against England in Antigua in 1994, to go past Garry Sobers's 365. He also holds the record for the highest firstclass score: 501 not out for Warwickshire against Durham in 1994.

In the 299 ODIs that he played, Lara scored 10,405 runs at an average of 40.48. In 2004, when captaining West Indies, he led the team to victory in the Champions Trophy against England at The Oval.

"As a boy, you never really thought of Hall of Fames, you never really thought of records. Growing up in the '70s my heroes were Clive Lloyd, Viv Richards and Roy Fredericks as a left-hand batsman. I am happy I was able to spend 17 years in the West Indies and was able to contribute in a way worthy of this honour," Lara said. "It is nice to share it with my family.

"Tonight I had my brother and my sister here with me. Agnes is the one who took me to my first coaching clinic when I was six, and Winston was a role model as a stylish right-handed batsman ... so to have them here is very special."

Lara said his most memorable series was the four home Tests against Austrascorer, with 11,953 runs at an average of lia in 1999, when he scored 213 in

Jamaica and 153 in Barbados to help West Indies draw the rubber 2-2.

"The 213 against Australia in Jamaica is definitely my best innings,' he said. "You have to understand the climate at that time. Going into that match, landing in Jamaica and knowing that everything was on the line -your captaincy, the series, respect and adoration by your fans. The mental strength I mustered during that week was something that when I looked back, it was very hard to measure anything against that.

"The performance was something I cherish and the fact that we won the match to level the series, after we were bowled out for 51 the week before in Trinidad, felt great. I thought the way I handled it was special. It is something I will never ever forget ... it's a day's cricket I will be talking about for a very long time. The 153 in Barbados the following week was rated higher by Wisden and the cricketing gurus but the double century in Jamaica was my best effort.'

Lara, 43, joined 16 West Indian cricketers -- Lance Gibbs, Gordon Greenidge, George Headley, Michael Holding, Rohan Kanhai, Clive Lloyd, Malcolm Marshall, Viv Richards, Andy Roberts, Garfield Sobers, Clyde Walcott, Everton Weekes, Frank Worrell, Courtney Walsh, Joel Garner and Curtly Ambrose -- in the ICC Hall of Fame.
