
Speakers at a discussion urged the government to include specific terms and conditions required for the professionals involved in serving the mentally ill people in Mental Health Law 2011.

HOLDING NEXT GENERAL ELECTION PM asks secretaries Govt fails to keep civil rights pledges to work impartially

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked the top bureaucrats to work impartially to ensure holding the next parliamentary election in a free, fair and credible manner.

Directing secretaries to help democracy's continuation, she said the election would be arranged in consultation with all stakeholders, so they would have to play sincere role.

The premier was speaking to the secretaries at a meeting at Bangladesh Secretariat.

She sought cooperation from them to prevent repetition of the 1/11 and ensure that no-one could take over state power through the "back door".

Hasina, also president of Awami League, asked the bureaucrats to show zero tolerance to corrupt officials and employees in their respective offices.

All the 59 secretaries, who attended the meeting, assured her of their all-out support to construct Padma bridge.

Cabinet Secretary M Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan briefed journalists after the four-

hour meeting.

At the meeting, the premier rejected the secretaries' plea for omitting a clause in the Anti-Corruption Commission (Amendment) Act-2012 that prior permission would not be needed for investigating corruption against government officials and employees.

Hasina said if the ACC found no corruption, then what if the provision was there. She also asked the secretaries to imple-

ment her party's election manifesto. "Review the manifesto and implement those [pledges] still undelivered."

The premier directed the officials to digitise land management system and asked them not to show the excuse of legal barriers to people.

During the meeting, the officials noted that the secretariat was suffering from shrinking space following an increase in the number of ministries.

A total of nine senior secretaries also requested the premier for a new pay scale for them. Hasina said she would look into the matter.

Says NHRC chairman

Despite making progress in protecting citizens' economic, social and cultural rights, the government has some failures in defending civil and political rights, said National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Chairman Mizanur Rahman at a seminar's end yesterday. The government is pledge-bound to show zero tolerance

towards extra-judicial killings, forced disappearances and custodial tortures but in reality, there is no reflection of the pledges' implementation, he said. NHRC organised the two-day national seminar, "Univer-

sal Periodic Review" (UPR), in a Dhaka hotel to discuss on its draft UPR report, to be submitted before United Nations Human Rights Council by October 9. "In the report, we called upon the government to imple-

ment the promises," he said.

Addressing the seminar, Cabinet Secretary M Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan said, "In many areas we have good laws. But we have constraints in implementation and enforcement."

NHRC Member Kazi Reazul Hoque summarised the seminar's recommendations, which includes strengthening NHRC and protecting the rights of children, the physically challenged, indigenous people, minority communities, migrant workers, refugees and other vulnerable groups.

It also recommended women empowerment, an end to the culture of impunity and sustainable environmental development.

Cylinder, Pipeline Gas

JS body suggests reducing Sylhet BCL men price gap

The parliamentary standing committee on power, energy and mineral resources ministry yesterday recommended reducing the huge price gap between cylinder gas and pipeline gas.

"It's totally illogical that the price of cylinder gas is much higher than that of pipeline gas. This is also discriminatory against the users of cylinder gas," Maj Gen (retd) Shubid Ali Bhuiyan, chief of the committee, told The Daily Star after its meeting at Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban.

The price of a gas-filled cylinder is over TK 1,600, while monthly cost for consumption of gas supplied through pipelines for a single household stands at around Tk 400, he said. "It is totally discriminatory and

illogical."

Shubid Ali, also an Awami League lawmaker, said the committee asked the ministry to find some mechanism to bring a balance between the prices of pipeline gas and cylinder gas.

The committee did not give any direction to the ministry whether to increase the price of pipeline gas or to decrease the price of cylinder gas, he said. "We have asked the officials concerned to

sit with experts and stakeholders to find out how to bring the balance between the two prices." The parliamentary watchdog also recom-

mended that the government goes for openpit mining method whenever it takes the decision to extract coal.

VANDALISM FOR EXTORTION on 4-day remand

A Sylhet court yesterday sent to four-day remand two Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) men in connection with a CNG station vandalism case.

They are Sylhet district unit BCL Vice-President Salim

Ahmed Chowdhury and activist Saad Ullah. They were arrested from a hotel in the capital on September 16. The court also ordered police to quiz four others--Kabul, Sayem, Shamim and Zainul who were also earlier arrested in

the case, at the jail gate. Managing director of Surma Autocare CNG Filling Station in the city's Shibganj area, Abdul Hasib Bhuyian, filed the case on September 5.

In the case statement, the complainant said Salim and 14 others attacked his staff and vandalised his station that night after he denied paying Tk 5 lakh as extortion.

Later, Sylhet CNG station and tank lorry owners and petroleum dealers had said they would start an indefinite strike from September 23 if the main accused of the case were not arrested within that time.
