



## Baira threatens to stop export of manpower

Asks govt to cancel state arrangements for Malaysia

The platform of private recruiting agencies yesterday threatened to close manpower export if the government did not withdraw its decision to send workers to Malaysia under state arrangements.

The announcement came at a press conference of Bangladesh Association of International Recruiting Agencies (Baira) in the capital's Ruposhi Bangla Hotel.

The agreement between Dhaka and Kuala Lumpur was signed on September 12 to avert the problems created earlier because of the involvement of private manpower agencies and the brokers, and to ensure that the workers are not exploited by unscrupulous middle-

But the Baira leaders claimed that this decision would create a big obstacle in manpower export and therefore, a declining trend might emerge.

"The move to send workers to Malaysia will fall in the brokers' trap due to the government officials' inexperience to pick the workers from suitable sectors and inadequate facility to train them up," said Ali Haider Chowdhury, general secretary of Baira.

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# No compromise


Mamata rigid on demand, says govt must reverse decisions on major economic reforms

A day after withdrawing support to the Congress-led UPA government, Trinamool Congress Chief Mamata Banerjee yesterday ruled out any compromise regarding her demand for reversing of the decision on major economic reforms taken by the Indian government.

Meanwhile, the Congress, which falls short of parliamentary majority after the exit of Trinamool Congress from the United Progressive Alliance (UPA), is struggling to shore up support for the government led by Prime Minister Manmohan Singh.

"I will stick to my position," said the chief minister of the Indian state of West Bengal, adding all six ministers from Trinamool would resign if the federal government did not backtrack on its decision to hike diesel price, limit the use of subsidised cooking gas and allow foreign SEE PAGE 19 COL 2
