

A see-off drags on

Biman flight chaos continues

Two weeks into a flight schedule disorder, passengers of Biman Bangladesh Airlines, bound for Middle Eastern and East Asian countries, continue to face delays.

The national flag carrier has been struggling to ferry its

passengers to their destinations in time amid a shortage of aircraft as it has concentrated all its efforts on flying hajj pilgrims to Saudi Arabia. The number of stranded passengers has now come

down to some 1,200, Biman officials said, adding that

they hoped they would be able to clear the backlog in the next three days at best. A DC-10 joined the fleet, which would start flying from today, said Mohammad Shahnewaz, director of the airlines, sales and marketing. A new Boeing-767 will also

join the carrier today, with immediate flying plans. Nearly 5,000 passengers have experienced delays in their flight schedules since the chaotic situation began on September 10. In contravention of international practice, they were not given accommodation and food,

which caused financial pressure for them. Nasrin Akhter, a 45-year-old housewife, came from Narail to the Dhaka Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport on Saturday in the hope that she could see her SEE PAGE 19 COL 4

Girl brutally murdered at home

Unidentified criminals killed a schoolgirl by slitting her throat at her house on Bhagolpur lane in the capital's

Hazaribagh yesterday. The victim, Tasnin Rahman Karobi, 13, was a sixth grader at Birshreshtha Munshi Abdur Rouf Rifles College

at Pilkhana. Tasnin's maternal aunt Shetu Ahmed found the blood-stained body around 5:30pm in a room of the victim's apartment on the second floor of a

seven-storey building. Shetu went downstairs to ask Tasnin to have food with her, but saw the main door of the apartment

open. The schoolgirl was lying on a bed with her throat slit. A bloodstained kitchen knife was beside her head and a piece of galvanised iron

Witness recalls killing of father

It was 1971 and the war was on.

Hours after leaving his home with his mother, Ashish Chowdhury learnt from an uncle that his father, elder brother and some relatives had been killed by the . Pakistani occupation forces accompanied by Salahuddin Quader Chowdhury.

"It was April 13, 1971," Ashish began the account of his life's most tragic inci-· dent before International Crimes Tribunal-1 yesterday.

He was about 10 years old then, living : in their village home at Jagotmollapara of Raozan Upazila in Chittagong. Fearing an attack by the Pakistani army

on the day, his father Premangshu Bimol Chowdhury asked his son and wife Jotsna Rani Chowdhury to leave the village and take shelter in an aunt's house at Binajuri village of the upazila.

"Around 2:30pm [on April 13, 1971] my uncle Arvinda Singha came to my aunt's house and said something devastating had happened," said Ashish, giving his testimony in the war crimes case against BNP lawmaker SQ Chowdhury.

"We broke into tears."

CEC asks officials to work neutrally

"I am directing all election officials, including members of the law enforcement agencies, to carry out their duties sincerely and neutrally so that none can threaten voters or exercise muscle power," CEC Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad said while addressing a views exchange meeting with the three aspiring candidates of the by-polls.

The Election Returning Office of Kapasia organised the meeting at the Upazila Parishad auditorium with the Gazipur deputy commissioner in the chair.




