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Go for deep sea port

Ctg roundtable urges govt to discard go-slow policy

Civil society members and businesses should put pressure on the government to construct a deep-sea port to make the country a regional trade hub, speakers told a roundtable yesterday.

They urged the government to respond promptly to the Chinese proposal in this regard and negotiate with other neighbouring countries.

Forum for People's Voice, a civil society platform, hosted the roundtable on "Port and deep-sea port in the context of regional cooperation" in the city's Hotel Agrabad.

Former adviser to a caretaker government Hossain Zillur Rahman and former director general of Asian Development Bank's South Asian Department Sultan Hafeez Rahman were the keynote speakers at the event.

Hossain Zillur said Chittagong has the potential to become a connectivity hub since it is a gateway to landlocked southern Asia, southern China, Nepal, Bhutan and northern Myanmar.

Iran terror group off US blacklist

The move seems significant amid mounting nuke tension

The United States on Friday removed an Iranian opposition group based abroad, the People's Mujahedeen of Iran, from its blacklist of designated terror groups after years of intense lobbying.

The move, ending a complex legal battle fought through US and European courts, came just days ahead of an October 1 deadline set by a US appeals court by which Secretary of State Hillary

Clinton had to decide on the fate of the group.

Hillary has decided "to revoke the designation of the Mujahedeen-e-Khalq (MEK) and its aliases as a Foreign Terrorist Organization (FTO) under the Immigration and Nationality Act and to delist the MEK as a Specially Designated Global Terrorist under Executive Order 13224," the State Department said.

The MEK, whose leadership is based in


Death of any unarmed civilian on the border is a worry for Bangladesh, Maj Gen Anwar Hussain, director general of Border Guard Bangladesh, told newsmen during a joint briefing at the Pilkhana headquarters. "This kind of death is not desirable as it affects the

friendly relations between the two countries," said Anwar.

His counterpart UK Bansal, however, claimed that the BSF personnel use minimum necessary force to save their lives.

India has assured Bangladesh of bringing down to "zero level" the killings along the border, he added.
