Aware that one more defeat will ensure their exit from the tournament, New Zealand need nothing less than a big win against the West Indies in their make-or-break Super Eights match of the ICC World Twenty 20 here on Monday.

Two defeats in a row have brought New Zealand to this position, where there is not scope for error.

However, a mere win will not help the cause of the Kiwis and they will have to win with a big margin and hope that England lose their last match on

Monday. With that result, Sri Lanka will be through to the semifinals and the other three teams - New Zealand, West Indies and England -- will be equal on two

points each. The net-run-rate then will come into play and the team with better run-rate will advance along with the hosts.

West Indies have a cushion of one win under their belt and one more victory would keep them in the semifinal hunt.

A West Indies victory today and England defeat later in the day will push the Caribbean side and the hosts to the semifinals.

The Kiwi batsmen have performed consistently but their bowling has been a cause of concern. Despite making some competitive scores they failed to defend those totals.

The defeat via eliminator against Sri Lanka in the first Super Eights match came after scoring a very challenging 174 for seven.

West Indies too rely heavily on their batting and it has been a roller-coaster ride for the Caribbean side in the tournament so far. They had done exceedingly well before suffering a crushing ninewicket defeat on Saturday.

Key for the Kiwis here would be to target the West Indies top-order. It happened

against Sri Lanka when the explosive Chris Gayle failed to get going and all of West Indies struggled.

Kiwi spinners will also have to play an important role if they aspire to remain alive in the competition.

Brendon McCullum and Gayle are the batsmen to watch out for and their performance will play a crucial role in the

fortunes of the two teams.

Sixteen teams -- ten from the Bangladesh Premier League and six teams from the qualifying round of Federation Shield -- have been split into four groups and top two teams from each group will advance to the quarterfinals which means that the an early elimination for one of the favourites is highly unlikely.

Considering the groupings, the two perennial foes Abahani and Mohammedan have no chance of facing each other before the final of the season's curtain-raising tournament.

For the first the qualifying round of the Federation Cup was held outside Dhaka in an effort to encourage the minnows to compete against the top-tier clubs. However, the qualifiers will be facing discrimination in terms of fielding foreign footballers as only ten clubs of the professional football league are eligible to Noakhali FA. field four foreign players in each match while the qualifiers will have to bank on the local players.

"The qualifying teams have not been allowed to field foreign players because they

generally are not allowed to play foreign players whichever level they play," explained BFF's senior vice president Abdus Salam Murshedy adding that they were hoping to find some quality players from those clubs coming through the qualifying round.

The fact is the football's governing body did not respond to the demand by local players of reducing the number of foreign players in the professional football league while not allowing foreigners in the lower league teams, thus an inequality amongst the participating teams of the Federation Cup.

For many it is a chance for them to watch their heroes from up close while some are at the ground only because they are passionate about the game and there are many who see it as an outing to be enjoyed with the family.

Businessman Mohammad Amdan had come to the match with his three sons, one of whom is an Indian supporter while the others support Pakistan. "I always try to come to the stadium whenever I get the chance. I like India and my elder son (Mohammad Ayub) also, as his mother came here from India but my other two sons support Pakistan. Actually we always love to watch cricket and we are great fans of the Sri Lanka cricket team," said a smiling Amdan.

And most importantly, the overwhelming impression was that the ICCWorld Twenty20 2012 is great fun for cricket fans in Sri Lanka.

The Pakistan team here is under surveillance all the time. Every evening a report on their daily activities is sent to the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB).

"We have set-up a vigilance division to keep a check on our players. Its officers are now travelling with team. Every day they send a report to our security and vigilance division head. If the division feels that there's something I must know, it sends me copy of the report," PCB chairman Muhammad Zaka Ashraf told this newspaper.

Three security officers, said to have strong credentials with different law enforcement agencies, are here with the team for the World Twenty20.

"These officers are to make sure that our players do not meet or interact with unknown people. We have introduced a very tough code of conduct. There is a curfew hour in the evening. You can see the results yourself. The team is now very disciplined and because of that, it is doing well," said Ashraf, a banker and industrialist.

More than its starstudded team, Pakistan cricketers were hitherto easily accessible to the Indian media. Right-arm fast Umer Gul's response to this correspondent shows how things have changed. "Brother, we are not

allowed to speak to anyone, the soft-spoken Gul said.
