Tearing out the soul

It has all the telltale signs of a preplanned attack. A very focused operation that targeted Buddhist homes and establishments. The Muslim houses nestled between the Buddhist houses were left untouched.

The attack spanned over six hours. The attackers swept across Ramu, demolishing temples and houses neighbourhood

after neighbourhood. And all this while, the role of the police and local administration remains veiled in mystery.

And, most interestingly, nobody in Ramu -- neither the Muslims nor the Buddhists -- seems to know who the attackers were. They are either telling the truth or are intentionally hiding the identities of the attackers. But one thing is

Carpenter Nidarshan Barua was standing at Chaumuhani station, the main square of Ramu. He saw a group of people making fiery speeches against the Buddhists. Many others were coming in pickups and trucks to join the crowd. It grew to a few

thousands. By his reckoning, it had become a 6,000-strong crowd. The mob wanted to attack the Buddhists. Ramu Upazila Chairman Sohel Sarwar Kazal came and tried to pacify the mob. 166 detained in Chittagong, Cox's Bazar

Law enforcers have so far arrested 166 people in connection with Saturday's violence at Ramu in Cox's Bazar that later spread in the port

Of the arrestees, 93 were picked up from Cox's Bazar and 73 from Chittagong, Home Minister Mohiuddin Khan Alamgir yesterday told the media in the capital.

ASSESSING PADMA GRAFT PROBE

WB to appoint external panel

2 missions due this month

The World Bank will appoint an external panel to assess the investigation carried out by the Anti-Corruption Commission into the corruption allegation in the Padma bridge project.

Two WB missions are likely to arrive in Dhaka this month for the purpose, its Country Director for Bangladesh Ellen Goldstein said yesterday.

The statement came in response to the media queries about the postponement of the visit of aWB team in regard to the project, said aWB official. The WB cancelled its \$1.2 billion credit for the Padma Multipurpose

Bridge Project in June, saying it had proof of a corruption conspiracy involving Bangladeshi officials, executives of a Canadian firm and private individuals. On September 20, it declared its decision to engage anew in the project.

A team of four to five members was scheduled to arrive in Dhaka **SEE PAGE 6 COL 5**

The government yesterday raised fares of both passenger and freight trains by around 50 percent in a bid to reduce the railway's annual loss, which is currently Tk 800 crore. The previous move to increase train fares was nearly 20 years back.

Train fares go

Bangladesh Railway (BR) until September 30 used to charge passen-

gers 24 paisa per kilometer, which has been increased to 36 paisa. The fare hike came into effect yesterday, BR Director General Abu Taher said.

He, however, could not give any information about the fare hike in freight train charges.

The railway minister on June 12 sent a proposal to the prime minister to raise the train fares. She approved the proposal on August 27.

BR has been pressing for 200 percent hike in train fares, considering the fuel price hikes in the last 20 years. But the parliamentary standing committee on railway ministry suggested a 50 percent hike, sources in the railway said.

In 1992 when the train fares were last increased, diesel, used to run trains, sold for Tk 13 per litre, which is now Tk 61 a litre.

Slinging bowler Lasith Malinga took a career-best five wickets as Sri Lanka beat England by 19 runs to reach the World Twenty20 semi-finals and send the defending champions crashing out Monday.

Malinga took 5-31 as England, chasing a daunting 170-run target, were restricted to 150-9 in the Super Eights match at Pallekele stadium before a packed and rowdy 30,000 crowd.

The victory meant Sri Lanka and the West Indies reach the semifinals after the hosts won all their three matches in the Super Eights. West Indies earlier enjoyed a dramatic Super Over win against New Zealand.

Court flip-flops on Destiny

Reverses its order to freeze 252 accounts within an hour

COURT CORRESPONDENT

Just an hour after ordering to freeze 252 bank accounts of controversial Destiny Group and Destiny-2000 Ltd, a Dhaka court yesterday withdrew the decision.

Judge (in-charge) Md Akhtaruzzaman of the Senior Special Judge's Court ordered the freeze in the morning upon two petitions filed by Anti-Corruption Commission Deputy Director Mojahar Ali Sardar and its Assistant Director Toufiqul Islam.

The group officials could launder or transfer money from those accounts if those were not frozen, the plaintiffs argued in their petitions.

On September 12, the same judge cancelled the bail to five Destiny Group officials, including its managing director Md Rafiqul Amin. But the regular judge, Md Zahirul Haque, stayed the cancellation order the next day.

Akhtaruzzaman might have withdrawn his yesterday's order apprehending a similar situation, said sources SEE PAGE 7 COL 4
