## 27 sued, finally

After two and a half months' investigation, the Anti-Corruption Commission yesterday filed 11 cases against 27 top officials of Sonali Bank and Hall-Mark Group for misappropriating over Tk 1,568 crore in depositor's money.

The sum, which was funded loan meaning given in cash, is part of the more than Tk 2,600-crore credit that the controversial group in collaboration with some bank officials swindled out of the bank using forged documents, according to the investigation.

Seven of the accused are Hall-Mark officials, including its owner Tanvir Mahmud, while the rest are Sonali Bank officials, including its former managing

director Humayun Kabir.

The ACC would now try to arrest the accused, said Mir Mohammad Zainul Abedin Shibli, deputy director of the commission, after filing of the cases with Ramna Police Station in the capital.

The cases were filed under anti-money laundering and corruption prevention acts, said Shibli, who led a six-member inquiry team.

"If convicted under the anti-money laundering act, the accused may get up to 10 years in prison and their moveable and immovable properties might also be confiscated," he told a press briefing at the ACC headquarters.

#### UAE stops giving | 22 BNP men all types of visa

Foreign ministry unaware of the 'temporary move'

The United Arab Emirates has temporarily stopped issuing all kinds of entry permits for Bangladeshi passport holders as Dhaka has failed to resolve the UAE's security concerns over identification and fake documents, Gulf News reports.

However, officials at the foreign ministry and the Bangladesh embassy in Abu Dhabi said they were yet to know about any such move.

Earlier in August, the UAE imposed stringent measures because of the increasing number of Bangladeshis there, many with fake documents, expired passports and visas. The UAE had considered this large number of people

as a security threat. Maj Gen Nasser Al Awadi Al Menhali, an assistant undersecretary at the ministry of interior in the UAE, confirmed that there would be no new visit visa, resident

The High Court yesterday granted anticipatory bail to 22 opposition leaders and workers and directed the government not to harass or arrest BNP leader Mirza Abbas without due legal process.
