### Players train in coach's absence

The Bangladesh national cricket team players took part in an

unofficial practice session organised by captain Mushfiqur Rahim at the Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB) National Cricket Academy (NCA) ground yesterday. With the BCB yet to receive a proper training schedule

from head coach Richard Pybus and the National Cricket League almost certain to be delayed, the players decided to go through a few routine exercises.

"Some of the spinners were going through their training courses with Saqlain (Mushtaq), and Mushfigur (Rahim) thought it would be a good idea to bring them together for some stretching," said NCA head coach Richard McInnes. The group, apart from players from the academy, included the likes of Mashrafe Bin Mortaza and vice-captain Mahmudullah Riyad.

When asked if the board had assigned McInnes to handle the affairs of the national players during his absence, the Academy coach stated that he was just 'overlooking' the activities at the ground. "Pybus and I work very closely. He is on leave at the moment, but he's working from South Africa. As for the matters here, I am just a mere caretaker," said McInnes.

Earlier, the BCB officials had sent a mail to Pybus requesting him to organise an early camp for the national players.

### Muktis maul Noakhali in rematch

Veteran midfielder Azmal Hossain Biddut struck twice while Jewel Rana, Faisal Mahmud, Shihab, Mohammad Biplob and Shaymal Ahmed Rony netted one goal for Muktijoddha Sangsad while Murad scored a consolation goal for Noakhali FA.

Following the power outage at the BNS on Saturday, the match between Muktijoddha and Noakhali FA was called off with Muktijoddha Sangsad leading 2-0 until the 73rd minute. It looked like the rematch might turn into a potential banana skin as the

Muktis failed to make much headway in the first half with a re-jigged team missing the likes of national stars like Zahid Hasan Emily, Mithun Chowdhury, Mamunul Islam, Shakil Ahmed, Ariful Islam and Rezaul Karim who hand all left the All Reds this season. But the scenario totally changed in the

second half and Muktijoddha Sangsad just toyed with the team from outside the capital and opened the floodgate six minutes into the second half through Jewel Rana before Biddut struck two successive goals inside six minutes to make it 3-0. Faisal Mahmud joined the party with a

curving cross that found the back of the Noakhali net in the 61st that forced Noakhali to bring a change under the post but the new goalkeeper Minhaz could not stop Muktijoddha and was sent off two minutes from time after handling the ball outside the box.

Substitute Shihab and Biplob widened the margin scoring in 74th and 75th minute before Noakhali pulled back one goal with Murad converting a penalty in the 79th minute.

Winger Shaymal Ahmed Rony sealed the match by scoring from a goal-mouth melee five minutes from time.

### Press term SL chokers

Sri Lanka's press was distraught on Monday after the host nation lost the World Twenty20 final against the West Indies, with criticism focused on the team's record of crumbling under pressure.

Millions of fans had prayed that Mahela Jayawardena's side would not choke in the Colombo clash, but the result was the fourth defeat for the country in major tournament finals since 2007.

"Silence of the Lion," said the privately-run Ceylon Today. "West Indies carry out their threat and dance on a Sri Lankan graveyard."

"Samuels pummels chokers," said the Daily Mirror in a reference to Marlon Samuels who won the man of the match award, making 78 runs off 56 balls.

#### **Cricket Bolt's** 'first love'

Jamaica's Usain Bolt vowed Monday to defend his Olympic sprint titles in Rio but, buoyed by the West Indies' World Twenty20 triumph, declared that cricket was his "first love".

Bolt, who said in August that he was considering swapping sprinting for the long jump to provide a fresh challenge ahead of the 2016 Games, said he had decided to defend the titles he won in Beijing and London.

"Rio is about going and defending my titles," the reigning 100m, 200m and 4x100m relay Olympic champion told reporters during a visit to New Zealand. "I don't want to try any

different events at Rio because at Rio I will just defend my titles to show the world that there is a possibility that I can do it again -to do the three-peat, that is the focus." Speaking a day after the

West Indies overcame Sri Lanka in the World Twenty20 final to claim their first world title in 33 years, Bolt said he loved cricket.

"It was my first love but I
