## WICB hails the players

The West Indies cricket team showed an outstanding display of tenacity, fight, courage, will-power and belief en route to their title triumph in the

just-concluded ICC World Twenty20 in Sri Lanka, president of the country's board, Julian Hunte said. "This was an outstanding display of

tenacity, fight, courage, will-power and belief. To come to Sri Lanka and beat them on their home turf in the grand final, when all was on the line, is truly remarkable," said Hunte, the president of the West Indies Cricket Board (WICB). "The entire region was behind this team

as they left home to compete to participate in this high-profile tournament," he added. West Indies defeated Sri Lanka by 36 runs

in the final of the ICC World T20 to win their 'first world title after a gap of 33 years, having won the ODIWorld Cup way back in 1979'.

The ICC World T20 is the fourth major international title for the West Indies team.

Clive Lloyd's all-conquering team won the inaugural Cricket ODI World Cup in 1975

and repeated the feat in 1979, while Brian Lara's side won the ICC Champions Trophy in England in 2004.

"West Indies cricket has a rich history and we are proud of what those who have played before have done for us and what they achieved," the WICB president said.

"Now, in this era, we have a new group of champions who have given their all and made us proud. Today, we salute our champions," Hunte added.

With this title, West Indies have become the only team to have won the 50-over World Cup, the Champions Trophy and the World Twenty20 and Hunte said he would like to thank the current side for giving the country men a great gift.

"I want to say 'thank you' to the team for what you did for the people and for West Indies cricket. Sunday, October 7, 2012 will go down in history and one of the great days in West Indies cricket.

"It was a job well done and the entire Caribbean along with West Indies cricket lovers are extremely proud of this team. It was a joy to see such a clinical performance on the field of play," Hunte said.

## Proteas pass the baton to Lanka!

South Africa's inability to win a major tournament despite having teams packed with talent has long earned them the tag of international

cricket's major "chokers". But after Sri Lanka's fourth successive loss in a World Cup final on Sunday, the African nation may believe that their Asian counterparts have now inherited the dubi-

ous title. The island nation, who won the 1996 50over World Cup, lost the 2007 and 2011 World Cup finals in the same format and the

Twenty20 final to Pakistan in 2009. Mahela Jayawardene and his men went into Sunday's match knowing full well it was

their best chance of overcoming the disappointments, playing in familiar conditions on home soil and with the support of a packed stadium.

They started brightly, cheaply dismissing the dangerous Chris Gayle, who had been touted as the man standing between Sri Lanka and the Cup, and conceding just one boundary in the first 11 overs of the West

Indies innings. But as the sixes began to fly off Marlon Samuels's thick blade in the next few overs,

Sri Lanka lost the plot. Jayawardene, involved in all four final defeats, watched helplessly as the momentum shifted in his opponents' favour and Sri Lanka never recovered.

"It was one of those days when the momentum shifted and it was pretty tough to get back in it again," the captain lamented.

Chasing a modest target of 138, the batsmen lacked self-belief and were shot out for 101 in under 19 overs, with just three of them reaching double figures as they crumbled under pressure.

The Sri Lankan crowd, who had come to celebrate a famous win, instead had to watch the West Indies players go wild with the "Gangnam Style" dance and Gayle doing a perfect imitation of the horseriding dance made famous by South Korean singer Psy.

At the start of the tournament, the Sri Lankan captain had said he would gladly take a loss in the final rather than bow out in the initial stages.

But he was not so sure after going through he pain of defeat.

Jayawardene later announced his decision to give up the captaincy in the shortest format of the game.

"It hurts a lot, because you want to do something special, not just personally, but for the public as well," the stylish righthanded batsman told reporters.

"We've been playing really good cricket but we haven't been able to cross that hurdle. So it hurts as a player, as a cricketer, as an individual.

"But we just need to move on, try, and see how well we can get over this and get back on and keep fighting again."

# Accused umps hit back

Umpires at the centre of bribery claims denied Tuesday they were willing to fix matches for cash as cricket authorities announced an urgent probe into the allegations aired in a television sting.

An undercover investigation by the private India TV channel allegedly found six umpires, including one on the international circuit, were willing to give decisions or provide inside information on teams and playing conditions in return for illicit payments.

The accusations were broadcast only a day after the West Indies' victory over hosts Sri Lanka in the final of the World Twenty20 tournament, quickly souring the atmosphere after one of the game's premier events.

None of the umpires was involved in the tournament.

The International Cricket Council (ICC) called on India TV "to turn over any information which can assist its urgent investigations into this matter.

"The ICC reiterates its zero tolerance towards corruption whether alleged against players or officials," the organisation said in a statement. Three of those named were from Sri

Lanka, while two were from Pakistan. The sixth was Nadir Shah, one of two Bangladeshi members of the ICC's international panel which officiates in matches around the world.

Grainy footage appeared to show Shah, who has stood in 40 one-day internationals and a number of Twenty20 internationals, saying he was willing to give decisions on demand.

An India TV transcript of the sting said that Shah offered to give biased LBW (leg before wicket), run-out and inside-edge verdicts.

"If the umpire is shown a favour, the umpire can do anything," Shah was quoted as saying in the transcript.

The video does not show any cash being exchanged nor did the channel broadcast any proof of the umpires delivering decisions or information.

Shah said any suggestion he was open to bribery was "absolutely rub-The Bangladesh Cricket Board

(BCB) pledged to investigate the claims. "The BCB has a zero-tolerance

policy to issues related to corruption in the game and is committed to holding a thorough inquiry," it said in a statement. The Pakistan Cricket Board said it

was gathering information and was in contact with the ICC. "We have zero tolerance towards corruption," said spokesman Nadeem Sarwar.

Pakistan umpire Nadeem Ghouri another of those named, denied any involvement. "I am surprised at these baseless allegations," he told AFP, saying he would consult his lawyers. Ghouri has umpired in Test

matches and dozens of limited-over

internationals, although he is no longer part of the ICC panel.

Sri Lanka cricket authorities were on Tuesday considering whether to suspend their three local umpires.

"We have looked at the tapes. We have got written submissions from the umpires and we will take a formal decision later today," ARM Aroos, chairman of Sri Lanka Cricket umpires' committee, told AFP.

Gamini Dissanayake, one of three Sri Lankans to be named, told the Colombo-based Daily Mirror the allegation was a "fabrication". "Obviously this is an attempt at

mudslinging," he told the daily. India TV chairman Rajat Sharma

told AFP his channel would cooperate with the International Cricket Council (ICC) in investigating the scandal. "Of course we will give the entire

unedited tape to anyone who is enquiring this," Sharma said. "We would cooperate with the ICC." Three Pakistani cricketers were last year jailed in Britain after being found

guilty of spot-fixing following a newspaper sting. Shah was among the umpires at the

inaugural Bangladesh Premier League earlier this year, a local version of India's IPLTwenty20 tournament. The competition was marred by

corruption allegations and ended up with former Bangladeshi international Shariful Haque being indefinitely banned.

### Nishikori gets going In a match featuring 45 aces and no

Japan's Kei Nishikori cruised through his Shanghai Masters opener on Tuesday just 48 hours after lifting his second Tour title in Tokyo, as America's John Isner saved three match points to progress.

Nishikori, the number 14 seed, who became the first Japanese player to win the Japan Open on Sunday, eased past China's Wu Di 6-2, 6-4 in his first-round match.

"Obviously, it's not easy to play [so soon] after winning the tournament," said the 22-year-old, who is at a career-high of number 15 in the rankings after his success in front of home fans.

"But I had a good day today. I love to play here," added Nishikori, who reached the semifinals in Shanghai last year before he lost to eventual champion Andy Murray of Britain.

Nishikori's weekend win over bigserving Milos Raonic was his first on the Tour since the 2008 Delray Beach title, sharply raising expectations that Asia had uncovered a potential world-

In a battle of two giants, eighth seed John Isner was forced to dig deep to save three match points to win a second-round match containing three tie-breaks and keep alive his outside chance of qualifying for the ATP World Tour Finals.

Isner booked his place in the third round by beating South Africa's Kevin Anderson 7-6 (7/3), 6-7 (8/10), 7-6 (9/7) in two hours and 45 minutes.

Defeated Australian teenager Bernard Tomic admitted he had given only "85 per cent" in his 6-4, 6-0 defeat to Florian Mayer.

His Shanghai flop comes just weeks after he was branded "disgraceful" by Davis Cup team captain Pat Rafter following his 6-3, 6-4, 6-0 US Open defeat at the hands of Andy Roddick. Tomic admitted he only gave "about 85

per cent", adding: "Today I gave 100 per cent in the first set. I felt in the second set, my 100 per cent wasn't even close to where it should be ... the mental skill is one of my biggest problems."

And China's Zhang Ze, who last week stunned Richard Gasquet in the China Open, could not produce fireworks for a second consecutive week, slipping to a comprehensive 6-0, 6-2 defeat at the hands of Taiwan's Lu Yen-hsun.
