Workers still in danger

Safety issues ignored, relevant laws not enforced

The government has not enforced environment and labour laws in the leather sector, owing to which workers' safety issues remain mostly ignored, says a report of the New York-based Human Rights Watch (HRW).

Workers of 90 percent of the tannery industries at

Hazaribagh in the capital have been exposed to hazardous chemicals and often put at risk of on-job accidents, leaving them partially or completely disabled, according to the report. However, the leather workers, estimated to be more

than 15,000, are the ones contributing to the annual export growth of \$41 million in this sector since 2002.

The report, "Toxic tanneries: the health repercussions of Bangladesh's Hazaribagh leather", produced yesterday was based on a field survey conducted between January and May. In the survey, the rights body interviewed 134 people, including current and ex-tannery workers and officials, slum dwellers, healthcare SEE PAGE 6 COL 1

No plan to deploy army in JS polls

CEC tells diplomats

The Election Commission has no plan to deploy army to maintain law and order during the next parliamentary polls, said the chief election commissioner at a meeting with leading diplomats in Dhaka yesterday.

"We have no plan to deploy army during the next parliamentary polls to maintain law and order. The regular law enforcement agencies should take the burden to do the job," EC Secretary Muhammed Sadique told reporters quoting CEC Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad as say-

ing at the meeting.

The CEC made the comment in response to a diplomat's query whether the EC would opt for deploying army to ensure security in the next polls scheduled to be held by the end of 2013.

In all the parliamentary polls held since 1991, armed forces -- army, navy and air force -- worked to maintain law and order side by side with the law enforcers.

Even before the 2001 parliamentary polls, the armed forces were given sweeping authority by amending electoral laws SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

A Dhaka court yesterday rejected Hall-Mark Managing Director Tanvir Mahmud and General Manager Tushar Ahmed bail in eight cases filed by the Anti-Corruption Commission for the Sonal Bank loan scam.

The ACC filed 11 cases against seven officials of the controversial Hall-Mark Group, including Tanvir and Tushar, a brother-in-law of Tanvir, and 20 officials of Sonali

Tk 140cr scam under ACC probe

8 officials quizzed

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) yesterday interrogated eight officials of Sonali Bank's Agargaon branch in connection with a loan scam of Tk 140 crore done in the controversial Hall-Mark style.

A four-member ACC probe team led by its Deputy Director Mohammad Benjir Ahmed said, "We started the investigation following a report headlined 'After Tanvir, it is Gautam' published in The Daily Star on September 13."

He said in the preliminary investigation, they found that Tk 140 crore had been misappropriated from the branch in the capital between January 2011 and April this

In a sudden move, the communications ministry yesterday decided to award the now-suspended widening work of the 40-kilometre Joydevpur-Mawna stretch of the Dhaka-Mymensingh highway to Bangladesh Army.

The army will take up the job once the prime minister approves a proposal in this regard, Communications Minister Obaidul Quader told newsmen at the secretariat.

The announcement comes at a time when the Roads and Highways Department (RHD) has been evaluating fresh tenders submitted by 11 companies for the pro-

However, a legal battle between the communications ministry and a local contractor has been pending with a tribunal over the cancellation of the original contract.

After failing to pick an eligible bidder, the communications ministry in May awarded the Tk 150 crore repair work of the Meghna and Meghna-Gumti bridges to the army.

The ministry under former minister Syed Abul Hossain had cancelled the original contract worth Tk 330 crore with Intraco BD in September last year, noting that **SEE PAGE 19 COL 4**


