Ireland captain Robbie Keane will miss Friday's World Cup soccer qualifier with Germany through injury, the Football Association of Ireland (FAI) said on Thursday, making him the sixth senior member of Giovanni Trapattoni's squad to be ruled out.

Los Angeles Galaxy striker Keane, Ireland's alltime leading goalscorer, suffered an Achilles injury this week and the FAI said he would hopefully be available for the trip to the Faroe Islands next Tuesday.

Keane joins fellow striker Kevin Doyle, central defensive partners Richard Dunne and Sean St Ledger, and midfielders Glenn Whelan and James McClean on the sidelines for the home game against the Group Cleaders.

Trapattoni will name his replacement captain and starting line-up for the game later on Thursday.

Spain could deploy Javi

Champions Spain may deploy a converted midfielder alongside central defender Sergio Ramos in Friday's World Cup Group I qualifier in Belarus, coach Vicente Del Bosque said on Thursday.

With Carles Puyol and Gerard Pique sidelined by injury, Del Bosque has only one other recognised centre back in the squad in Raul Albiol but he has barely featured for his club Real Madrid in recent months.

The other option is to use midfielders Sergio Busquets or Javi Martinez who both have experience in central defence, particularly Martinez who mostly played there last season at Athletic Bilbao before reverting to midfield for his new club Bayern Munich.

"It could be there will be players who play a different role from the one at their club and that they play out of their ideal position," Del Bosque told a news conference in Minsk when asked where Busquets might play.

"It will be because we believe they can do the job perfectly well and we won't ask them to do anything that conflicts with their particular characteristics."

Spain won their opening game 1-0 in Georgia, extending their winning streak in European Championship and World Cup qualifiers to 23 matches.

They last failed to win a qualifier in a 1-1 draw with Iceland in Reykjavik in September 2007.

Spain went on to become the first team to win back-toback European Championships with a World Cup in between and will be firm favourites to retain their global title in Brazil in 2014. After returning from Belarus, Del Bosque's men host France

on Tuesday at Atletico Madrid's Calderon stadium in a match that could go a long way to deciding who wins the group.

After climbing three spots to fourth in the latest FIFA world rankings, Argentina can further enhance their World Cup prospects when they host reigning South American champions Uru-

guay as qualifying for Brazil 2014 continues on Friday.

The showdown in Mendoza pits a pair of two-time World Cup winners together in what is the first meeting between the sides since Uruguay ousted Argentina on penalties in the quarterfinals of last summer's Copa America.

Despite being held to a 1-1 draw in Peru last month, Argentina are unbeaten in their past five qualifiers and find themselves top of the group with 14 points from seven matches, while Uruguay occupy the final automatic qualification spot as they lie fourth, two points

behind La Albiceleste. Sergio Aguero returns for Argentina after

"If they have the best attack in the world, with Messi at the head, Uruguay must have the second or third, with (Luis) Suarez and (Diego) Forlan."

"They are one of the strongest sides in the continent," added the Barcelona player.

With the qualifying competition approaching the halfway point, Mascherano suggested two victories -- Argentina play Chile four days later in Santiago -- in the next week would position the 1978 and 1986 World Cup winners well for the tournament in Brazil.

Holders Spain face a tricky trip to Belarus in World Cup 2014 qualifying on Friday when a host of top European sides take on unheralded

nations as they bid to avoid sizeable shocks en route to Brazil.

The Spanish know only too well that their Group I game in Minsk is far from a foregone conclusion after midfielder Javi Martinez's club side Bayern Munich lost 3-1 at Belarussian champions BATE Borisov in the Champions League last week.

A late 1-0 win in Georgia for the world and European champions in their group opener last month was also a reminder of the tiresome cliche that there are "no easy games", even if the Netherlands and England do have simple-looking matches.

The Dutch, the 2010 runners-up, host tiny Andorra in Group D while England, who drew 1-1 at home with Ukraine in a lacklustre second Group H game, welcome a San Marino side joint bottom of the FIFA rankings before a tougher test in Poland on Tuesday.

Steven Gerrard is suspended after a red card against Ukraine last month so Frank Lampard is set to take the armband with Chelsea club mate Ashley Cole also hoping to play despite an expletive tweet against the English Football Association.

Martinez warned not just his Spain side but the whole of Europe to the potential of banana skins, with six BATE players likely to start for Belarus. "Because they have so many BATE

players in the squad probably they will play in a similar way," Martinez told a news conference. "BATE are a team that look to play

on the counter attack, they are physically very strong and they don't give you many scoring chances."

Hummels is out and captain Philipp Lahm is suspended. "Even despite the missing players

we can handle any absence because of our team's strength," said assistant coach Hansi Flick, whose outfit host Sweden next Tuesday.

One player expected to fit for arguably the juiciest-looking clash on Friday is Real Madrid's Portugal forward Cristiano Ronaldo, who is in line to face Russia away in Group F having almost recovered from a shoulder injury sustained against Barcelona.

Defender Pepe is a doubt for Portugal with a thigh problem.

In another intriguing encounter, Belgium - many pundits' outside tip to shine when the soccer carnival rolls into Brazil in two years' time - go to Serbia in Group A but giant afrohaired midfielder Marouane Fellaini is injured.

Among other matches in European qualification on Friday, Group B rivals Bulgaria and Denmark clash while the Czech Republic are at home to Malta. Sweden go to fellow Scandinavians

Cardiac arrest survivor Fabrice Muamba has been invited by FIFA president Sepp Blatter to Zurich next month to discuss a possible role with world soccer's governing body.

The former Bolton Wanderers midfielder collapsed on the pitch during an FA Cup quarterfinal against Tottenham Hotspur in March and his heart stopped beating for 78 minutes. He recovered but was forced to retire as a player in August.

Speaking to reporters at the Leaders in Football business convention in London he said he now found going to matches tough emotionally, but was attracted to a career in sports politics.

"I like this kind of side of it, making decisions," the former England Under-21 player said. "I have a meeting with Sepp Blatter next week (October 30), hopefully he can get a job for me."

Former Arsenal and France star Patrick Vieira claims young English players no longer dream of representing their national side.

In his role as Manchester City's football development director, Vieira is in close contact with the next generation of Premier League stars and he is convinced there is no longer a desire among the sport's youngsters to make an impact on the international stage.

Vieira was always passionate about playing for France and helped his country win the 1998 World Cup and the 2000 European Championship, but the 36-year-old does not see the same determination in teenagers these days.

"When I grew up in France, I wanted to play for the French national team. That was my target, my dream, and I don't think this is the same for the under-16s, under-18s in England," he told several newspapers in England on Thursday. "I don't think the young players are dreaming of playing

for the national team any more. I don't know the answer but, from the outside, I believe that, in England, they are not as proud as they used to be." Vieira, who won 107 caps for France, has also warned it

could take more than a decade for the English Football Association's new national centre at St George's Park in Burton upon Trent, central England to show tangible results. He welcomed the move to centralise football develop-

will return to the England

squad on Sunday for assess-

ment ahead of the away qualifier with Poland on Tuesday." The injury to vice captain Lampard has opened a debate as to who will lead out England at Wembley on Friday, with usual captain Steven Gerrard

suspended for the match. The two most likely candidates to fill the role are Manchester United striker Wayne

Rooney and Manchester City goalkeeper Joe Hart.
