# pest, disease wreak havoc on aman

Massive pest attack and stem rot disease have affected the transplanted aman (T-aman) in Taraganj upzila of Rangpur district, much to the worry of farmers.

Stem borer (majra poka) and stem rot disease have continued wreaking havoc on the aman plants, foiling farmers' attempt to prevent them by spraying insecticides.

Frustration has gripped the farmers of the upazila as they have to incur heavy loss this year because of pest attack and outbreak of the disease.

While visiting Rahimapur, Ghanirampur, Jhakuapara, Mandolpara, Kashiabari, Boraty, Kumarpara, Narayanjan, Balapara and Jalubar villages recently, this correspondent found that at least 20 to 25 percent of the T-aman plants have been badly affected.

The farmers told this correspondent that T-aman plants at different villages are turning yellowish and drying up due to attack by stem borer and outbreak of stem rot disease.

"If the situation continues, we will suffer huge losses," said Abdul Ali, 55, of Ghanirampur village under the upazila. Majumder, 45, a farmer of Ujial village in the upazila, said he has planted aman on one bigha of land this year. But he failed to prevent spread of stem disease and pest attack on his

farmland despite spraying insecticides.

He said, "Fifty percent of Taman plants on my land have already been damaged even though I sprayed pesticides thrice a day". According to the district Agriculture officials, aman has been cultivated on 9,800 hectares of land in Taraganj upazila.

Taraganj upazila official of the Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) said T-aman plants in different areas in the upazila have been attacked with stem borer (Majra poka)

and stem rot disease.

"Drought-like situation at the beginning of the season and shortage of potash fertiliser on the paddy fields are the main reasons behind the attack by stem borer (majra poka) and outbreak of stem rot disease," said Shamir Chandra, upazila agriculture officer.

He urged the affected farmers to use more potash fertiliser and spray pesticides like Sumithion, Darsban and kantop on their farmland.

# Farmers worried as Hatiya reels from deaths, destruction

The violent storm that lashed southern coastal areas of the country early Thursday left a trail of destruction on Hatiya Island under Noakhali district.

Thousands of uprooted and broken trees and electric poles were seen lying on the roads and on roadside farmlands and ponds while many houses, shops, school buildings and other structures were razed to the ground across the island. A few more bodies were

found floating on the Meghna yesterday morning. As soon as the news spread, local people, who had lost their near and dear ones in Thursday's storm, thronged the bank of the river.

Upazila administration sources said around 100 fishermen of the island, who until yesterday afternoon. Around 3000 houses,

mostly thatched and tinroofed, 100 schools and madrasas and aman on about 1,8000 acres of land in 12 unions of the upazila were damaged by the storm.

The said five unions--Carring Char, Jahajmara, Boyar Char, Noler Char and Nijhumdwip--are the worst affected areas.

Locals alleged that they did not get sufficient help from the upazila administration to remove the uprooted and broken trees from the roads. A trader of Mosjid Market

in Oskhali area alleged that the upazila administration even failed to remove a broken tree from the road adjacent to the upazila office. Locals later removed it from the road, he added.

Refuting the allegations, UNO Mahidur Rahman said road stretching from went missing during the the upazila administration Jahajmara to Nolchira in the terday, the death toll from deceased, aged about 15 and twister, remained untraced with the help of the forest last two days.

## Tortured for 2 years by master, little Munmun now cries for justice

Brutally tortured by family members of the employer, Mushfika Munmun, 13, daughter of Monwar Hossain Master of Jahanarabad village in Parbtipur upazila under the district, is crying for justice.

Munmun went to work at the house of Sarwar Hossain, a constable of Parbatipur GRP, in 2009, said family sources. "Sarwar had told me that

Munmun would stay like his daughter, and she would have to do only a little domestic work. But shortly after her going there, they started torturing her on trivial matters," Monwar said in the statement of the case he filed on Monday.

Indian Border Security Force (BSF) handed them over to Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) personnel through the check post here at night.

On Friday, BGB rescued nine other people from Puthkhali border in Benapole while they were being trafficked to India.

The BGB men also caught Arif Hossain, on charge of

human trafficking. A victim said they were being taken to India by a gang promising them better jobs there.
