



Ashraful Hasan and his canvas: Capturing uncertain times

Galleri Kaya in Uttara has organised a solo art exhibition titled "Trauma and Time", featuring the works of a promising artist Ashraful Hasan. The exhibition focuses on deforestation. The painter mainly highlights the extinction of greenery in our country He also focuses on the relationship between nature and human being. At the exhibition, most of his paintings are a mingling of trees and human figures. Fragment is another feature in Hasan's works. His previous exhibition was held at the same gallery in 2011.

On the occasion of the exhibition, Galleri Kaya organised a press conference on October 11 at the gallery premises. Artist Hasan, Goutam Chakraborty, director of Galleri Kaya spoke at the programme. Chakraborty said, "The present exhibition deals with an artist's quest of nature and human civilisation. At the current exhib tion, his works are more sensitive, refined and stronger." About 37 artworks are on display at the exhibition. The works include 11 paintings (acrylic and oil), lithographs, etchings and drawings (cha coal and pen). "The present exhibition show the artist's wider dynamism as it includes drawings and lithographs beyond his typical works in acrylics," added Chakraborty.


Hasan said, "Through the exhibition, I want to explore the hard

reality of nature. My paintings also reveal my emotional contacts with nature as I was brought up in pastoral ambiance." His works also feature the evident clash between Mother Nature and the developing world.

this exhibition, the painter has tried to depict the frustration decaying within the silent nature and also humans, at the same time. The meticulous strokes with perfect shades of colours give a unique effect that gives the paintings a photographic image. Acute observation power and expression make his works more appealing. There is a tendency to create an object and its expressive quality in his paint ings. He exhibits highly refined insight in handling his craft. Trees are depicted as a camouflage for human form. Trees are characteristics in Hasan's paintings to communicate his concern for the environment and the impact it has on the urban psyche. In some other works, the environment created seems isolated where barren trees are present as reference to the decay of urban life.

Hasan holds a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Painting) from Government Art College, Chittagong. He received Master of Arts in Painting, Department of Fine Arts, Chittagong University.

The exhibition will continue till October 23.

Che as a role model for the younger generation. Almost 45 years after his death, Che continues to inspire people. No other image has been

reproduced as many times in history. Black and white photographs of Che can be found on posters, T-shirts, mugs, wallets and cigarette lighters all over the world, they said.

The speakers narrated the life and achievements of Che who was born on June 14, 1928 in Rosario, Argentina. Graduating as doctor, Che embarked on an arduous journey after meeting Cuban revolutionary Fidel Castro in 1955 in Mexico. He travelled to Cuba to participate in the guerrilla war to overthrow the US-backed Cuban dictator Fulgencio Batista. The guerrillas achieved victory on January 1, 1959.

In 1966 he went to Bolivia to disseminate the socialist revolution. On October 8, 1967 he was captured by the Bolivian army.

Ernesto ("Che") Guevara was executed by Bolivian troops near the town of La Higuera on October 9, 1967. The operation was planned by the CIA and organised by US Special Forces.

Thai, Lebanese films share top award at Busan fest

A low-budget, experimental production from Thailand and a gripping Lebanese drama shared the main award at Asia's largest film festival, which draws to a close on Saturday.

Jurors for the New Currents award a the Busan International Film Festival described first-time Thai director Nawapol Thamrongrattanarit's "36" as "breathtaking" while praising the "extraordinary sympathy" director Maryan Najafi was able to draw from her audi ence throughout her entry "Kayan".

Both productions receive \$30,000 for the award, which offers two first prizes and is open to first- or second-time Asian filmmakers.

Nawapol's film -- made for just \$20,000 -- is set around 36 static images and tells the story of a young woman struggling to relate to her own memories. "The first time I screened this film it

was in a conference room for about 20 people so I was honoured to be invited to Busan," said Nawapol.

posed to do with this film -- from using child actors to borrowing sets -- but we persevered," said Najafi.

The 10-day BIFF closes Saturday with the official awards presentation and the world premiere of Bangladeshi filmmaker Mostofa Sarwar Farooki's comedydrama "Television", which focuses on a clash of generations in a rural village.

Festival organisers said more than 220,000 people had attended this year's 17th edition, a record for the event.

A singing career without parallel

65th birth anniversary of Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan

People often spoke of famous Pakistani singer Nusrat Ali Khan (October 13, 1948-August 16, 1997) in the same breath as iconic reggae artist Bob Marley and even dubbed him the Elvis of the East. There's more. According to the Guinness Book of World Records, Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan holds the world record for the largest recorded output by a Qawwali artiste -- a total of 125 albums as of 2001.

On his 65th birth anniversary it is opportune to remember the iconic and indefatigable qawwali singer who gave Sufi music a whole new meaning with intense performances that could carry on for several hours. The "Shahenshahe-Qawwali" was also recognised for taking the international audiences by storm with his introduction of gawwali music

Among the western singers who he teamed up with were Peter Gabriel (on the sondrack to "The Last Temptation of Christ ") with Canadian musician Michael Brook (on the albums "Mustt Mustt" and "Night Songs") and with Pearl Jam lead singer Eddie Vedder on two songs for the soundtrack to "Dead Man Walking". One of these songs was reused on the soundtrack of the well known film "Eat, Pray, Love". Khan was now a name to reckon with

in his home country and the rest of the world. Before his death he went on to sing in several Pakistani films and recorded a song for two Bollywood movies, "Aur Pyaar Ho Gaya" and "Kachche Dhaage". He sang the title song of the film "Dhakhan" and also

in other parts of the world. Khan was born in Faisalabad Pakistan. At the young age of 16 he made his first public performance at his father's chehlum. Continuing a long family tradition, he became head of the family qawwali party in 1971. The early 1980s saw him make his internation breakthrough when he was signed on by Oriental Star Agencies, Birmingham, UK.

Khan went to captivate audiences the world over as he released hit after hit of movie scores and albums in Europe, India, Japan, Pakistan and the US. He also performed widely in 40 countries. Expanding his ambit to collaborations with famous Western artistes, he became a renowned world music artiste.

Khan and AR Rahman teamed up to great effect. Khan sang "Gurus of Peace" to "Vande Mataram", composed by Rahman and released to celebrate India's 50th anniversary of Independence. Later Rahman was to release "Gurus of Peace" which featured "Allah Hoo" by Khan.

Aged 48 his life was cut short by a sudden cardiac arrest at a hospital in London. His body was sent back to Faisalabad, Pakistan and the public came out in large numbers to mourn his death at his funeral.
