

Jagannath Hall tragedy remembered

Students, teachers, and staff of Dhaka University yesterday commemorated those who were killed in a tragic building collapse on October 15, 1985 at the university's Jagannath Hall.

Several hundred students wore black badges, observed a one-minute silence and brought out a mourning procession in memory of the victims.

On the day in 1985, the roof of the hall's assembly building (now October Smriti Bhaban) collapsed on students and employees who were watching television claiming 39 lives.

DU authorities hoisted black flags, kept the university flag at half-mast and arranged special prayers in observance of the day.

DU Vice-Chancellor Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique and the hall authorities of the university placed wreaths at the October Memorial commemorative inscription.

The VC said students, teachers and staff remember the victims of the tragedy with deep respect and sorrow.

2 killed, 12 hurt in road crashes

Two people were killed and twelve others injured in separate road accidents in Tangail and Jessor on Sunday and yesterday.

Our Tangail correspondent reports, Sonia Akter, 19, daughter of Abdul Halim of Nagarjpalai area in Tangail town, and a second year student of Fazilatunnnesa Mujib College, was killed and four others injured as a truck hit a battery-run three-wheeler in the town yesterday.

The injured were taken to Tangail General Hospital.

UNB from Benapole (Jessor) reports, Nur Ali, 40, of Magura, was killed and eight others were injured when a covered van of Bangladesh Army hit a CNG-run auto-rickshaw at Churamonkati Sakormatha in sadar upazila on Sunday night.

ATTACK ON COUPLE Motive still unknown

Neither police nor the victim couple, who were shot by unidentified criminals in the capital's Badda area on Sunday night, had any clue about the motive of the attack till yesterday evening.

The couple faced the gun attack just after receiving an amount of money from two people. However, the attackers did not take anything from them.

Nijamul Haq, 35, an expatriate living in the US, said he along with his wife Nazma Begum, 24, went there to collect the money that Foliq Khan, his expatriate friend, owed him.

When they received Tk 25,000 from two persons, two other men opened fire on them.

Nijamul could not tell who attacked them and why.

The injured couple were admitted to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

ATTACK ON BUDDHISTS

Role of law enforcers, admin criticised

Speakers at a discussion yesterday strongly criticised law enforcement agencies and administration for, what they said, playing a silent role and even instigating the September 23 attack on the Buddhist community in Cox's Bazar's Ramu.

They also condemned the remanding of Madhu Barua and Aadi Barua by police, stating that this was what Jamaat-e-Islami was hoping for.

Madhu is the mother and Aadi is the aunt of Uttam Kumar Barua, whose Facebook account was falsely used to launch anti-Buddhist propaganda that triggered the violence.

The discussion, "Jamaat's link with militants and trial of war criminals", was organised by Ekatturer Ghata Dal Nirmul Committee in the capital's WVA Auditorium.

If punitive action is not taken against Cox's Bazar's superintendent of police and deputy commissioner, such mayhem might be repeated in other parts of the country, they said.

"Law enforcers will forcibly take confessional statements from them (Madhu and Aadi)," said the committee's acting president Shahriar Kabir.

Claiming that agents of Jamaat were active in the administration, he said, "How can we expect an impartial investigation."

Around 17 militant and fundamentalist organisations are active in the Bangladesh-Myanmar border while some non-government organisations are patronising them, claimed Kabir.

Addressing the function, Information

Minister Hasanul Haq Inu said Jamaat has connections with armed activities, militancy and international terrorism and the government primarily found proof of Jamaat's link with the attack.

Voice should be raised demanding a ban on Jamaat's politics and bringing the party under war crimes trial as an organisation, he said.

International Crimes Tribunal Prosecutor Advocate Rana Dasgupta said the fundamentalist force has been launching attacks on households and temples of minority communities as part of their conspiracy to foil the war crimes trial.

"We are trying to provide some results of the trial process by next December," he said.

State Minister for Liberation War Affairs AB Tajul Islam, academician Prof Muntasir Mamun and cultural personality Kamal Lohani also spoke at the discussion.

Meanwhile, female leaders of Sector Commanders' Forum, Liberation War-'71; Rajshahi University teachers; and Khulna's artists condemned the attack and demanded exemplary punishment for the perpetrators.

The seven female leaders, in a statement, expressed deep concern over the destruction of the over 300-year-old invaluable and ancient sculptures in Ramu.

The teachers, at a human chain in the university, urged people to strengthen communal harmony among all communities in Ramu and the country.

The artists formed a human chain at Picture Palace Intersection in Khulna city where they demanded exemplary punishment for the perpetrators.

Agri co-ops, organic farming demanded

Speakers at a discussion yesterday urged the government to form agricultural cooperatives and implement organic farming to ensure risk and adulteration free food supply.

They said with government's support it is possible to develop organic farming.

Bangladesh Poribesh Andolon (Bapa), B-Safe Foundation, Hunger Free World and Prottasha 2021 Forum jointly organised the discussion, said a press release.

Mentioning Cuba as an example, speakers said 80 percent of their farming is dependent on agriculture cooperatives and organic farming.

For the interest of food security and sustainable farming, the government has to implement a method, which is both farmer

and agriculture friendly, they said.

The speakers said ensuring food supply is the country's first and foremost responsibility but food adulteration and excessive use of chemicals in foods is a major obstacle in achieving food security.

Everest conqueror Musa seeks ban on book

Ibrahim filed another petition seeking an ad-interim injunction on seven defendants, who published the book, from selling the book.

The defendants are Enam Al Haque, an article writer who made the claim, and the book's Chief Editor Shubal Kumar Banik, Editorial Adviser Mahfuzur Rahman, Editor Rahim Shah, Guest Editor Shyamal Kanti Das and Editorial Assistant Arif Najrul and Kamruzzaman Kajal.

Cabinet okays changes to bar council act

The cabinet yesterday approved the draft of Legal Practitioners and Bar Council (Amendment) Act, 2012, which strips Bangladesh Bar Council of its power to enrol law practitioners.

As per the amendment, a five-member enrolment committee will be formed with an Appellate Division judge as head.

The committee will be empowered to take decision on the enrollment of law practitioners, Cabinet Secretary M. Musharraf Hossain Bhuiyan told reporters at the Secretariat.

The attorney general, two High Court judges and a representative of the bar council will be the other members of the committee, he said.

At present, a three-member committee of the bar council takes decision about new enrolment.

Vice Chairman of Bangladesh Bar Council Khandker Mahbub Hossain said the proposed amendment was an attack on the Bar Council.

The government is going to amend the law to main the Bar Council, which is a guardian and elected body of 46,000 lawyers of the country, he said.

Khandker Mahbub, also an adviser to BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia, said the Awami League-led government was doing so as most of its candidates lost in the recent Bar Council election.

He said they would launch a movement with the country's lawyers against the government's move after getting the copy of the amended law.

Attorney General and ex-officio chairman of Bar Council Mahbub Alam said the government had proposed amendments to the Bar Council law to restore the previous provision of keeping judges in the enrolment committee.

The powers of Bar Council will not be damaged if judges are kept in the enrolment committee, he added.

They urged people to stand against all types of fundamentalism and fanaticism saying it will be the best security measure to celebrate the festival.

Bangladesh Puja Uddipan Parishad organ-

ised the view exchange meeting in the Dhakeshwari National Temple auditorium marking the 'Shuvo Mahalaya', beginning of Durga Puja.

Reading the keynote paper, Manindra Kumar Nath, the organisation's general secretary, said the Ramu incident might have been avoided if the government had taken action against the communal attackers in Hathazari of Chittagong, Satkhira and Chirirbandar of Dinajpur.

He said 28,000 pujas would be held across the country of which 202 would be held in the capital.


