The two Bangladeshi golfers will be looking to improve significantly over the coming rounds if they are to avoid the cut.

"My mindset and fierce focus has kicked in just like it did when approaching a long innings in a Test match," he said in a statement. "I will focus on the

"It is very treatable. It is not aggressive," he said. "Treatment will be decided in due course after further tests and consultation

Kevin back in Eng fold

Kevin Pietersen will return to the England fold for the upcoming tour of India, the ECB announced Thursday, following his exile from the squad for sending provocative texts to opposition players.

The decision came after the star batsman met with England coach Andy Flower, Test captain Alastair Cook and other senior players and managers this week to finalise his reintegration into the side.

The Surrey batsman was cast into international exile in August after sending text messages to touring South Africa players that contained criticism of then-England captain Andrew Strauss during the Test series.

The 32-year-old was dropped for the final Test and missed the One-Day series against South Africa and England's failed defence of their World Twenty20 title in Sri Lanka, while Strauss retired from all forms of cricket.

Pietersen has since apologised for his behaviour and signed a new central contract with the England and Wales Cricket Board after agreeing to enter a "reintegration" process.

"We were keen that Kevin should hold a

series of face-to-face meetings with team management and senior players before the Test squad departs for the United Arab Emirates and India next week," said ECB managing director Hugh Morris.

"The meetings were constructive and cordial and all outstanding issues have been resolved.

"All the England players and management are now keen to draw a line under this matter and fully focus on the cricketing challenge that lies ahead in India." Pietersen is playing with the Delhi

Daredevils at the Champions League Twenty20 tournament being held in South Africa. The final is scheduled for October 28. "We are pleased to welcome a player of

Kevin's proven international calibre back into the Test squad for such an important series," added ECB national selector Geoff Miller. "As we anticipate that Ian Bell will return home for the birth of his first child

around the time of the second Test in Mumbai, the team will benefit from having an extra batsman in the squad and all players who were originally selected for the tour will fly out as planned next week. "Kevin will join up with the squad as

soon as his Champions League commitments are complete."

'Challenge not insurmountable'

"It is not only in the match-fixing issue, rather we have to be disciplined in all our activities and I must ensure that first. Everybody will be given a free rein to perform their duties but they must work in a disciplined manner," said a confident Papon, who has been involved with popular club Abahani Limited for nearly a decade and since 2008 has served as the chairman of the club's cricket committee. He is also an accomplished administrator.

"I think there is a strong foundation for our cricket and everything is in place. We just need to take the game forward. Cricket now has a strong footing but definitely I will try to eliminate loopholes, if there are any, and talk with everybody before taking a decision. At first, I need to know the details before making comments about my priorities as president," said Papon when asked about what would be his priority as president of the BCB.

Papon has taken the reins at a time when there has been much talk about the board's next election, as well as the election for the post of president as per ICC guidelines, and the new BCB boss

"I'm not in favour of selection in the president post; I prefer that the president be elected. It's always good to see a man come to a post through a voting system," opined the new president. He however sidestepped the question about whether being the President's son had helped in

him getting the BCB top job. In the board's amended constitution, the former cricketers' councillorship rights were abolished, which created widespread criticism in the cricket fraternity. Papon raised his voice in favour of the cricketers saying that he would like to see maximum representation by former players at the BCB.

"I'm completely in favour of former cricketers' holding decision-making posts in the board. I would like to see them more," said Papon.

The new president will formally take over the reins from AHM Mustafa Kamal today at the BCB headquarters in Mirpur and get down to business immediately as there are a number of pending issues that require urgent resolution.
