



LAUNCH TRIPS BEFORE EID

Fares high, no cabins available

Many passengers were scrambling for cabin tickets at the Sadarghat launch terminal yesterday as some influential people in connivance with the launch owners have booked most of the cabins well ahead of the Eid-ul-Azha.

Some launch staff told passengers that all the cabins for the trips for four days before the eid have been booked. The eid comes off on October 27.

A few other staff, though, would offer tickets for higher fares than usual.

Launch owners claimed that the privileged section of the society like the bureaucrats, politicians, lawmakers, businessmen and police officials had approached them for booking cabins well before the tickets were put on sale on Monday.

"As they are influential, we can't turn them down. We have to book the cabins to make them happy," said a SEE PAGE 19 COL 4

BNP, allies to skip EC talks

The BNP-led opposition is set to boycott the dialogue with the Election Commission on redrawing the boundaries of parliamentary constituencies and finding out ways to make the next election free and fair.

The opposition leaders yesterday said they were agitating for the restoration of the non-partisan caretaker government and would not sit with the EC until their demand was met.

Given the situation, a consensus among political parties through the EC's talks seems improbable. The electoral dialogue is scheduled to be held after Eid-ul-Azha.

Prices of essential commodities like onion, garlic, ginger and spices have soared up in Khatunganj, the wholesale market of Chittagong, significantly, only a week ahead of Eid-ul-Azha, due to supply crunch.

Onion was sold at Tk 22-24 per kg last week, now the wholesalers are charging Tk 30-33. Imported Indian onion like Nasika and South are being sold at Tk 26-28 and 30-33 per kg respectively.

Malala back on her feet

Malala Yousafzai, the Pakistani schoolgirl shot in the head by the Taliban, has been able to stand with help for the first time, doctors treating her at a British hospital said yesterday. She is unable to talk because a breathing tube has

been inserted into her windpipe but she can communicate by writing, said Dave Rosser, the medical director at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham, central England. Despite the news of Malala's progress, he warned

that she is "not out of the woods yet", her doctors' chief concern being an infection in the bullet track through her head.

Malala was shot on a school bus in the former Taliban stronghold of the Swat valley on October 9 as a punishment for campaigning for the right of girls to an education, in an attack which outraged the world.

On Monday she was flown in an air ambulance from Pakistan to Birmingham, Britain's second city, where she is being cared for in the hospital that treats British soldiers seriously wounded in bomb blasts and shoot-

Petrol from air!

A British firm has produced the first "petrol from air', it emerged yesterday, in a pioneering scientific breakthrough that could end mankind's reliance on declining fossil fuels.

Air Fuel Synthesis in Stocktonon-Tees, Teesside, claims to have made five litres of petrol since

August using a small refinery that synthesises the fuel from carbon dioxide and water vapour.

Experts have hailed the incredible breakthrough as a potential 'game-changer' in the battle against climate change and solution to the globe's escalating energy crisis.

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
