Kagawa faces anxious wait

Japan midfielder Shinji Kagawa faces an anxious wait to discover the extent of the knee injury he suffered in Manchester United's 3-2 Champions League win over Braga on Tuesday.

Kagawa twisted his knee midway through the first half at Old Trafford, but played on until halftime before being replaced by Portugal winger Nani.

United manager Sir Alex Ferguson admitted he is uncertain how severe the injury is, but he confirmed Kagawa will be checked out by the club's medical staff on Wednesday.

It would be a significant blow for Ferguson if Kagawa is ruled out for a prolonged period as the 23-year-old Kobe-born star has made a strong start to his career at United after a pre-season transfer from German champions Borussia Dortmund.

"He twisted his knee and we had to take him off at half-time," Ferguson said.

"He struggled on for 20 minutes or so after the injury. We will assess it in the morning. It is too early to say what damage, if any, there is."

Robben's swift U-turn

Bayern Munich's Arjen Robben has quickly dispelled any notion he is considering retiring due to constant injuries despite admitting he has thought about quitting in an interview with Dutch television.

"Yes, in the disappointment and the frustration that it is taking so long to make a come back, I have had such thoughts" he told German daily Bild on Tuesday.

"It's really frustrating when you do everything for your job and your body can not keep up.

"But I also said I have far too much fun playing football and scoring goals to retire of my own free will. "Don't worry, I will soon

be back again. Retirement? Absolutely not!"

The 28-year-old's words put in context those he used in an interview with Dutch television NOS as he recovers from a hamstring injury he suffered at the end of September having been injured at least once every year since 2004.

"I have wanted to give away my football boots and finish (my career)," Robben has said having admitted ideas of retirement "haunt my thoughts and not just now".

After Bayern's 1-0 win at Lille on Tuesday in the Champions League, coach Jupp Heynckes has even said Robben may be fit for Sunday's Bundesliga match at Bayer Leverkusen.

fourth minute of stoppage time from Jordi Alba to beat Celtic 2-1 after the 1967 European champions had taken the lead at the Nou Camp through Javier Mascherano's own goal after 18 minutes before Andres Iniesta's brilliantly-worked equaliser just before halftime.

Alba told Spanish TV he was lucky to be in the right place at the right time.

When Tito Vilanova stepped up from assistant coach to replace Pep Guardiola at Barcelona at the end of last season there were mutterings that he might not be as effective a motivator as his charismatic close friend.

Judging by a series of stirring fightbacks, including Tuesday's 2-1 Champions League home win over Celtic, Vilanova's players have lost none of the hunger Guardiola instilled in them during his spectacularly successful four years in charge.

Barca had to come from behind to beat Spartak Moscow 3-2 at home last month and Jordi Alba's 94thminute winner against Celtic put them five points clear of the Scottish champions at the top of the group after three of six matches.

They also rallied to win at Sevilla and Osasuna in La Liga, reversing a two-goal deficit for a 3-2 success in Seville, and both Vilanova and sporting director Andoni Zubizarreta paid tribute to that fighting spirit.

"This is a team that keeps trying until the end, until the very last minute," Vilanova told a news conference.

"It's not easy when the other team's 10 outfield players are all in their penalty area defending," the 44-year-old Zubizarreta added in an interview with Spanish televi-

sion: "This is a team that wants, that desires, that tries and it's something to feel proud of. "We had several chances to score before and when

(David) Villa hit the post in the last minute you thought that was it. But these players always have something in reserve." The other side of the coin is that Barca's unusually

leaky defence is shipping the goals that force them to chase games in the first place.

Part of the reason is that Spain centre backs Carles Puyol and Gerard Pique have been sidelined by injury but there have also been some disturbing lapses and goal keeper Victor Valdes is not looking as solid as he has in coach contracts (and therefore recent years.

Lyon have to sell to survive

French club Lyon will be forced to sell two or three players just to balance the books, according to chairman Jean-Michel Aulas. The club's accounts

showed a shortfall of 28 million euros (\$36.2 million) in June this year and Aulas said they will need to part company with some more star names to wipe out the defecit.

"We have plans to sell three players, two in the winter transfer window and one next summer, for 30 million euros (\$38.6 million). That will also cut our playing staff and the wage bill. Negotiations are already well under way, but they cannot be finalised until the end of the window," he said. Lyon, French champi-

ons for a record seven years in a row from 2002, have already sold off big earners Cris, Kim Kallstrom, Aly Cissokho and France international goalkeeper Hugo Lloris in the summer. But a deal to take defender Anthony Reveillere to Paris Saint Germain collapsed at the last minute.

"He could be one of the players who could leave, unless we come to an agreement to extend his contract," Aulas said. "We will review the situation with coach Remi Garde at the end of the season."
