convener of the committees on identifying the unutilised lands of the state-owned enterprises and on scrutinising the draft of the financial reporting act.

A cabinet meeting held on October 22 decided that the cabinet division and finance ministry would issue an order in this regard in a couple of days, said the official.

According to the meeting decision, SA Samad, executive chairman of the Board of Investment, would replace Mashiur in the two bodies.

Earlier, the adviser was also dropped from the cabinet committee on purchase and the cabinet committee on economic affairs.

In September, Mashiur was sent on leave to fulfil the condition of the World Bank for reviving its funding for the Padma bridge project. He will remain on leave until October 30.

However, an official concerned said the leave might be extended until the Anti-Corruption Commission probe into the corruption allegations in the Padma bridge project ends.

### Sudan a 'terrorist state': Israel AFP, Jerusalem

Sudan is a "dangerous terrorist state," a top Israeli defence official yesterday said after the Sudanese government accused Israel of carrying out a deadly missile strike on a military factory in Khartoum.

Sudanese officials say the attack on the Yarmouk facility south of Khartoum, which took place at around midnight on Tuesday and killed two people, was carried out by four radarevading aircraft.

Israel, which has long accused Khartoum of serving as a base of support for militants from the Islamist Hamas movement which rules Gaza, has refused all comment on the claim.

"Sudan is a dangerous terrorist state. To know exactly what happened (there), it will take some time to understand, Amos Gilad told Israel's army radio.

Hasina will ask Law Minister Shafique Ahmed to dispel the businessmen's tions. concerns, said Ashraf, also the LGRD and cooperatives minister. "She [Hasina] has informed the meeting about it," he said.

"There will be a detailed discussion with the businessmen over the law and there will be no provisions in it, to which the businessmen have any objection," Ashraf said.

The government will hold an elaborate discussion on the proposed amendment at the next cabinet meeting and in parliament, it was told at the meeting at Gono Bhaban, the prime minister's official residence.

The presidium, the highest policymaking body of the ruling party, observed that the proposed amendment has been misinterpreted by some businessmen in the

Earlier in the day, Commerce Secretary Ghulam Hussain said the amendment to the Companies Act would not be required as the existing law itself allows the government to appoint administrators to private companies.

However, the final decision on whether to proceed with the move to change the law will come after a meeting with businesspeople, legal experts and other stakeholders on October 30, he told The Daily Star after a meeting with legal experts at his office in the capital.

"It is possible under the existing law to appoint an administrator [by the government] to any company that cheats people or engages in illegal financial activity," he said.

Tension arose in the private sector when the commerce ministry moved to bring changes to the law to appoint administrators to the controversial Destiny Group as its top bosses had been sent to jail for their alleged involvement in illegal financial transac-

With the businesspeople and legal experts reacting sharply to this, the ministry is now seeking opinions from stakeholders.

On appointing administrators to Destiny Group accused of illegal banking, the commerce secretary said the government in line with the opinions of legal experts would apply section 233 of the law and move to appoint administrators to the companies which had done illegal financial transactions and cheated people.

The existing law has a provision that allows the ministry to go to court for special permission to appoint administrators to those companies.

The government in future would apply the proposed multi-level marketing (MLM) law for the companies like Destiny, the official

A three-member panel headed by a senior legal expert will identify the companies that need to be governed by administrators, he

The members might be a senior jurist, chief of the Federation of Bangladesh Chambers of Commerce and Industry and the commerce secretary, he said.

"It's just a proposal."

The administrators to Destiny Group will certainly not be government officials Hussain emphasised.

The one-room school --Sromojibi O Shishu Shikkhaloy -- set up at Shere-Bangla Town Hall building offers informal education and does not follow any specific curriculum. Classes are held in two shifts -- from 6:00am to 8:30am and from 4:00pm to 6:00pm, six days a week. To discourage dropouts, the children are given tiffin twice a week.

Since its opening, the total cost of the school stands at Tk 50,000. Of the amount, Tk 40,000 was spent on purchasing education materials and furniture and Tk 10,000 on buying tiffin for the children, said Aminul.

All the money came from the trio's income from private tuition save for Tk 2,500 which was donated by Enamul Haque, chairman of Big Energy, a local NGO. Another NGO, Friends and Society, gave a board and two tables.

"We decided to do it with our own money," says Aminul.

On hearing of the idea, Abdul Mannan, an assistant imam at a local mosque, lent a helping hand. He is a parttime teacher there and offers his service when any of his three friends is sick or cannot come to the school for any other reason.

lay ahead after the school was set up. As the parents of these children are extremely poor, they are more interested in sending their kids to work. So the three friends went from house to house to convince the parents and managed to get 28 students at the start. More students started to come form the second month.

"We thought that with education these children would be able to earn more and lead a better life," said
