

JAIL KILLING CASE Complete trial within shortest possible time

Urge Nasim

Former home minister Mohammad Nasim yesterday appealed to the Supreme Court to complete the trial of the historic jail killing case within the shortest possible time to free the nation from the associated "stigma".

Nasim, son of Captain Mansur Ali, one of the four national leaders assassinated in Dhaka Central Jail on November 3, 1975, referred to the long delay in the trial proceedings.

"This is not my personal grief but of the whole nation's," he said.

The ruling Awami League leader was speaking at a discussion, "Killing of four leaders in jail, politics of conspiracy by the anti-liberation force : present context", in Dhaka Reporters Unity of the capital.

Amra Muktijoddhar Santan organised the discussion marking Jail Killing Day.

The Metropolitan Sessions Judge's Court of Dhaka in 2004 awarded death sentence to three former army personnel and life imprisonment to 12 others. The High Court in 2008 upheld the death penalty of one, acquitted six of the convicts and did not say anything about the eight others.

The government on Thursday appealed to the SC to uphold the lower court verdict by cancelling the HC verdict.

"They were self-proclaimed killers and I myself had given testimony in this case," said Nasim, adding that the HC verdict made the trial "farcical".

"If the trial is not completed within the tenure of the present government and BNP-Jamaat comes to power, the trial would be farcical again," he said.

About BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia's reverse stance on relations with India, Nasim said, "What she said (during her recent New Delhi visit) was just for the sake of saying it. She would surely return to her party's previous stance."

Terming BNP's politics as "politics of anti-India and communalism", Nasim said Bangladesh would become an "extension of Pakistan" if Khaleda came to power again.

State Minister for Liberation War Affairs Capt (retd) AB Tajul Islam and Krishak League leader MA Karim spoke at the discussion with Amra Muktijoddhar Santan President Humayun Kabir in the chair.

India no more relies on one Bangladeshi party

Says Moudud

BNP standing committee member Moudud Ahmed yesterday said India no more relied on a single party in Bangladesh to maintain good relations with its neighbour.

"There was a gap in the past between us (BNP and Congress) for the policy of previous Congress governments which wanted to rely on a single party in Bangladesh instead of trusting people. Now their policy is changing," he said.

Moudud was addressing a meeting organised by Swadesh Mancha, a pro-BNP civil platform, in the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

He pointed out that the attitude change was first visible when Indian President Pranab Mukherjee, during his last visit to Bangladesh as a foreign minister of the Congress-led government, met and invited BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia to visit India.

"They have come one step forward towards us (BNP) and we have also moved one step forward...

"BNP wants to protect the national interest by maintaining good relations with them (India)," Moudud said, adding that in today's world nothing could be achieved with a "warlike" attitude with a neighbour.

"The only way is to talk to each other and build a relation of faith and confidence...I hope the change in the Indian policy will improve the Bangladesh-India relations and bring far-reaching results," he said.

On disputes between Bangladesh and India, including water sharing of common rivers and Tipaimukh dam, Moudud said, "Ensuring water rights is our dire need."

"India is building 33 small and 12 mega dams on the upstream of 54 common rivers. What is more worrying is that they are also implementing a mega river linking project upstream."

"Construction of the Tipai dam and water sharing of the Teesta River involves the existence of Bangladesh. We need to resolve these but by maintaining good relations."

Digital Jargon

I love to photograph children, particularly when they are immersed in their own world. The other day I saw a child walking out of an alley, lost in his thoughts. I got my camera ready. At the right moment – his expression, the light, the distance, background everything came together – I pressed the shutter. But the same instance another kid jumped in front of my camera. He had been watching from my side and decided to make his move at the critical moment.

I had just been *photobombed*.

Digital photography, which has enabled millions of new photographers, has also given rise to a new jargon.

Many digital photographers look at the picture immediately after taking it. This is called *chimping*, which is not a good idea if the events you are photographing are outside your control and changing rapidly since your decisive moment may pass in the seconds you take to look at that photo. On the other hand, chimping makes more sense in a controlled studio situation. (Before digital photography, studio photographers often used Polaroids to preview their photographs and make sure the lighting, pose etc were correct before making the final exposure.)

Sometimes a situation arises which is of such great interest that several photographers stand elbow to elbow trying to photograph the same subject. This grouping is sometimes called *the scrum or the pack*.

In the world of model, glamour and fashion photography there is the *GWC: Guy With Camera*. This is a man with a camera who is posing as a photographer to get close to the models.

In wedding photography, a guest who shows up at a function with lots of camera gear and gets in the way of the professional wedding photographers is sometimes called an *Uncle Bob*.

BIF is a favourite term of bird photographers. It means *Birds in Flight*. Perhaps some of these birds can be captured by the *Bigma*, nickname of a big telephoto lens made by the lens company Sigma.

On the other end of the scale, a point-and-shoot camera is sometimes called a *PhD – Push Here Dummy*. Of course great images have been made with all kinds of cameras.

To *photoshop* a photograph means to enhance or change it using software such as Adobe Photoshop. Professionals sometimes call this post-processing or, simply, *post*, as in "He knew the lighting was bad and was planning to fix it in post."

During *post*, a *pixel-peeper* zooms up the entire digital image on his computer checking the pixels.

Spray and pray, a term from combat, refers to a soldier rapidly firing a lot of bullets at the enemy without particular attention, hoping he gets lucky. With today's high-speed digital SLR cameras, spray and pray has migrated to photography. While many photographers disapprove of the technique, some find the technique useful in fast moving situations such as in bird, wildlife and sports photography.
