Dhaka, Delhi eye tangible progress

Bangladesh and India have agreed over stepping up efforts to make "tangible progress" in fast-tracking a resolution on pending bilateral issues.

Foreign Secretary of Bangladesh Mijarul Quayes yesterday said it was necessary for both countries to "fast track implementation of the decisions" taken during the visits of the two prime ministers to New Delhi in January, 2010, and to Dhaka in September, 2011.

Quayes was speaking to the media in Gurgaon, a satellite town of Delhi, after he met Indian Foreign Secretary Ranjan Mathai on the sidelines of Indian Ocean Rim-Association for Regional Cooperation (IOR-ARC) confer-

Mathai is likely to visit Dhaka either by November-end or in the first week of December, Quayes said.

He said Mathai was "keen on making some tangible progress during his visit" and that there was no lack of commitment from either side to resolve the pending

Employers added 171,000 people to

their payrolls last month, the Labor Department said yesterday. The government also said 84,000 more jobs were created in August and September than previously estimated.

However, the unemployment rate rose to 7.9 percent, after a surprising threepoint drop to 7.8 percent in September, the same level when Obama took office in January 2009.

The employment data was the last major report card on the economy before Tuesday's presidential election. Polls



ACC set to sue BTCL officials

The Anti-Corruption Commission is set to lodge five cases against about 20 officials of the BTCL and owners of international gateway (IGW) exchanges for embezzling around Tk 250 crore.

An ACC official said the cases would be filed following approval by the commission.

The BTCL officials in league with the IGW exchange owners swindled the amount, he added.

An IGW exchange works as a gateway between a national telephone network and other international gateway exchanges, thus providing cross-border connectivity.

According to their licence terms, the IGW operators would share almost 52 percent of their revenue with the state-owned Bangladesh Telecommunication Company Ltd (BTCL).

ACC Chairman Golam Rahman said as the IGW operators did not pay the BTCL's share of the revenue, the commission has decided to sue the companies.
