Windies touch down today

The West Indies cricket team are scheduled to arrive in Dhaka today at 8:00 am to play what will be their fifth series against hosts Bangladesh. A glance at the matches between the two teams reveals a comparatively better statistic for Bangladesh than its record against the other Test playing nations.

So far, the teams have faced each other eight times in the Test arena with the West Indies winning four of them. The two matches that Bangladesh won took place in 2009 in West Indies when the Tigers swept aside a weakened West Indian line-up 2-0. However, the West Indies had their revenge last year, thrashing the Tigers at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium by 229 runs after a Chittagong draw to take the series.

In One Day Internationals (ODIs), the visitors have come out victorious in 14 of the 20 face-offs. The latest series took place last year in October when the West Indies won the ODI series 2-1.

The scenario leading into the upcoming series however isn't remotely similar to the team's previous visits. West Indies arrive in Bangladesh as the world Twenty20 champions and will definitely be exuding confidence.

In Sunil Narine, they have got a spinner who has deceived the best in the world. He is bound to be at his destructive best on the slow pitches of Bangladesh. Throw in spinners Narsingh Deonarine and Verasammy Permaul, who recently had a good run in Bangladesh with the West Indies High Performance team into the mix and it makes for a pretty lethal spin-attack. Chris Gayle's return to the national fold in June has changed the fortunes for the visitors in all versions of the game and he along with Marlon Samuels will play a pivotal role in their team's batting line-up.

The West Indies have won two out of the eight Test

Rain disrupts 2nd round

Rain and clouds dominated the National Cricket League (NCL) yesterday as the third day of three out of the four games of the second round were washed off due to incessant rainfall. The match at the Sheikh Abu Naser Stadium in Khulna was the only game which saw the light of day. Although the match between Rangpur and Khulna was briefly halted, the day did see 70 overs.

Continuing from their overnight score of 112 for 4, the hosts were bowled out for 249 runs. Mohammad Mithun was Khulna's mainstay, scoring a fluent 89, an innings which saw 15 boundaries. Alauddin Babu continued his good run and added three more wickets to his name yesterday, to finish with 6 for 56.

However, whatever lead the visitors gained was nullified after their batting order collapsed in the second innings. The Rangpur batsmen

struggled to read the home team's spinners as they ended up losing 7 wickets for just 66 runs on the board yesterday. The seven wickets were

Siddikur finishes on 76th

Bangladesh's premier golfer Siddikur Rahman finished 76th in the WGC HSBC Champions which concluded at the Mission Hills Golf Club in Dongguan, China yesterday. The 27-year old golfer carded an even par round in the last day to tally 13-over-par 301 over the four rounds. Siddikur carded three birdies and three bogeys on the day to match the par score on the final day. PFCA kicks off for professionalism

A nine-member convener committee for the Professional Football Club Association (PFCA) was formed in a bid to strengthen professionalism in every sector of club, players and football federations. But instead of focusing on internal professionalism, the officials highlighted the typical issues like league schedules, players' payment and sub-standard refereeing following their first meeting at a city hotel yesterday.

The initiative of forming a club association is certainly a positive move, provided the intent is to bring internal professionalism into the running of a football club. But the reality is that the clubs hardly function with paid employees, hardly ever

conduct internal audits, do not sign players to long-term agreements and most importantly, have no long term growth agenda as regards developing youth systems or coaches. Instead, the meeting only served to highlight the current problems the clubs themselves have been facing.

There had been another club association before the start of the professional football league in the 2006-07 season but that association had a poor reputation of depriving the booters through 'gentlemen agreement' and introducing 'pool quota'. Hence, there was an obvious question to the clubs officials from the journalists whether the club association is going to control the players again.

But according to the line of the officials, the formation of this club association has no such ill-motives and is rather for the
