

Referee Azad suspended

Referee Azad Rahman has been suspended for his faulty conduction of the Grameenphone Federation Cup final between Sheikh Russel KC and Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club last month.

"Azad Rahman will remain suspended until the next decision regarding him is taken," said Bangladesh Football Federation acting general secretary Abu Nayeem Shohag said.

"He will be served a show-cause notice asking why a penalty could not be taken against him for his mistakes during the Federation Cup final."

Azad Rahman ignored a penalty appeal from Sheikh Jamal Dhanmondi Club on 61 minute and Sheikh Russel came from behind to beat Sheikh Jamal 2-1 in the final to win their first trophy.

The Referees' Committee yesterday sat to evaluate the performances of the referees at the Federation Cup and the decision was taken at the meeting. The meeting also decided to conduct a seminar for the referees before the start of the professional football league and send referees to participating clubs to make the officials aware about new rules of regulations of the game.

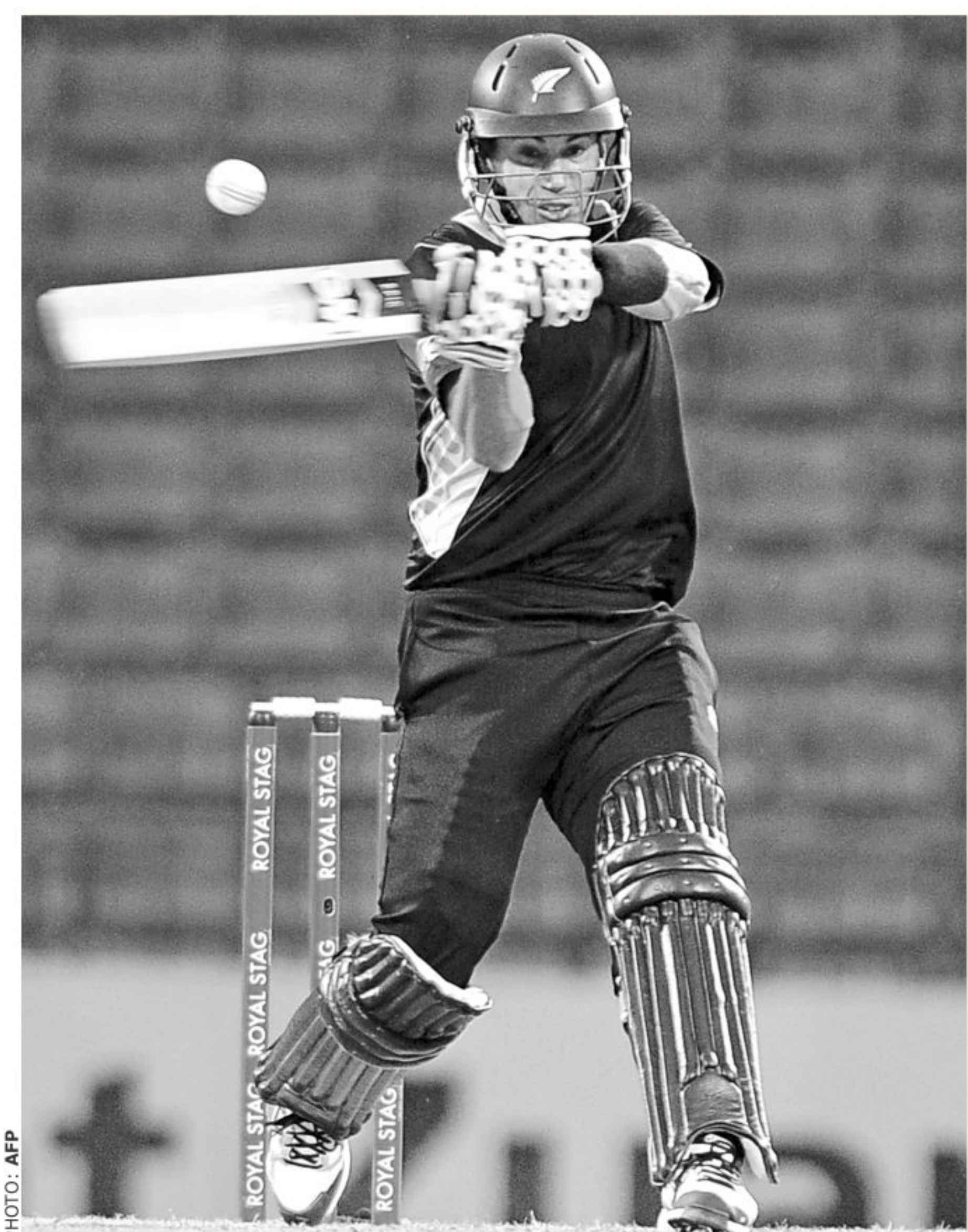

SL win rain-hit match

Sri Lanka posted a 14-run victory over New Zealand by Duckworth-Lewis (D/L) method in the rain-hit second one-day international on Sunday to gain a 1-0 lead in the five-match series.

The day-night match was keenly poised when play was called off due to rain in Pallekele as Sri Lanka were 118-3 off 22.5 overs chasing a 251-run target. They were ahead of the D/L par score of 104 at that stage.

Skipper Mahela Jayawardene was unbeaten on 43 with Angelo Mathews (seven not out). Tillakaratne Dilshan (37), Kumar Sangakkara (11) and Upul Tharanga (six) were the batsmen dismissed, while

Nathan McCullum, Kyle Mills and Trent Boult were the wicket-takers.

Opener Dilshan, who also completed 1,000 one-day runs in the year during his 51-ball knock, and Jayawardene added 59 for the third wicket after the hosts lost two wickets for 39 runs.

Skipper Ross Taylor and Bradley-John Watling earlier hit half-centuries to help New Zealand post a competitive total.

Tourists toil in Mumbai

England's bowlers got a taste of what may lie ahead in the Test series against India after they were made to toil hard for wickets in a practice match in Mumbai on Sunday.

The tourists struggled on the field as Mumbai A, replying to England's first innings score of 345-9, cruised to 232-4 by stumps on the second day of the three-day match at the DY Patil Stadium.

Cheteshwar Pujara, one of the non-Mumbai players in the home side, warmed up for the four-Test series with a polished 87 on an even-paced wicket that offered no assistance to the bowlers.

Pujara, the current number three batsman in the Indian Test team, hit 11 boundaries as he put on 163 for the third wicket with Hiken Shah (84 not out) after Mumbai A had slipped to 47-2.

The tourists, who started the day on 338-6, lost three wickets for seven runs before stand-in captain Stuart Broad declared 30 minutes after the start.

Ferrer lifts first Masters title

Spain's David Ferrer clinched his maiden Masters title when he ended Polish qualifier Jerzy Janowicz's brilliant run in Paris with a 6-4, 6-3 final win on Sunday.

Fourth seed Ferrer proved too consistent for world number 69 Janowicz, who had previously beaten five players from the top 20.

Ivanovic keeps Serbia afloat

Ana Ivanovic kept Serbia's hopes alive in the Fed Cup final as she beat Petra Kvitova of the Czech Republic 6-3, 7-5 here on Sunday.

Ivanovic, the world number 12, needed an hour and 46 minutes to see off world number eight Kvitova and reduce the holders' lead to 2-1.

Kvitova, sweating profusely and visibly weakened by a cold that forced her to pull out of the WTA Championship last week.

Vettel fights back

Sebastian Vettel produced one of the greatest drives of his young life on Sunday, starting last from the pit lane to finish third in the Abu Dhabi Grand Prix and retain his world championship lead over Fernando Alonso, who was second.

Kimi Raikkonen became the eighth race winner of the season, giving Lotus their first win since Ayrton Senna drove for them back in 1987. It was Raikkonen's 19th win of his career and his first since the Belgian Grand Prix of 2009.

But there was another desperate disappointment for McLaren's Lewis Hamilton, who had the race in his pocket when he retired with electrical problems on the 20th lap.

But it was Vettel, followed by Alonso, who were the main talking points. Vettel overcame not one but two wing-damaging incidents to his Red Bull and also changed his tyres twice but still managed to get on the podium, passing Jenson Button in the closing stages of a superb race.

Abu Dhabi and Valencia do not have a reputation for providing great action but in an enthralling season they have been arguably the best contests.

Hamilton flew out of the blocks at the start, putting behind him not only the rest of the field but the memory of a number of poor starts in recent races.

Mark Webber got off to a shocker and was immediately passed by the flying Raikkonen and Pastor Maldonado.

On the second lap Hamilton, who complained about the coldness of his tyres,

appeared threatened by Raikkonen. But soon he would start to pull away.

By the fourth lap he had got enough heat into those tyres to extend his advantage to 2.3 seconds. A long way further back, meanwhile, Vettel had made light of his wing damage to move up to 14th. Then he went off the track to pass Romain Grosjean, before being told to let the Lotus driver back in front to avoid a penalty.

The introduction of the first safety car after Nico Rosberg had crashed out in his Mercedes, hit Hamilton, because by then his lead was 3.8 seconds over Raikkonen.

But then a desperately disappointed Hamilton fell out of the race on the 20th lap, immediately after recording the fastest lap. The hugs from the McLaren team principal Martin Whitmarsh and the rest of the team when he returned to base was a very poor consolation for the 2008 world champion.

Meanwhile Webber was having one of the most eventful races of his career. He clashed with Maldonado when he squeezed the Williams driver as he overtook him – a dangerous thing to do because Maldonado is not one to yield.

Webber lost three places but five laps later, halfway through the race, he had another clash, this time with Felipe Massa. Both collisions were dismissed as racing incidents. However Webber's next clash, this time with his old crash-buddy Grosjean, proved terminal for the Australian's race.

But at the end it was not Webber but his Red Bull team-mate Vettel who was the taste of Abu Dhabi, and the German still holds a 10-point lead heading into the final two races.

Gibson targets No. 5

Ottis Gibson, the West Indies coach, wants his side to build on their success in 2012 by making it to the top five in the ICC Test rankings in 12 months' time. West Indies are currently at No. 7, above New Zealand and bottom-placed Bangladesh, their opponents in the forthcoming two-Test tour starting November 13 in Mirpur.

West Indies lost the home series 2-0 against Australia before heading to England and conceding the Test series by the same margin. But they returned home and swept both Tests against a struggling New Zealand side, in addition to dominating the limited-overs matches. They carried forward their momentum to Sri Lanka where they lifted the World Twenty20 trophy.

"We have had a pretty solid 2012 so far so we want to finish on a winning note," Gibson said in Barbados before the team's departure for Bangladesh. "The aim is to find ways of moving up the [Test rankings] table. Because Bangladesh are below us, we will only be playing for two or three points. Our aim is to break into the top five in the next 12 months if possible."

West Indies suffered a setback when the fast bowler Kemar Roach suffered a knee injury during a club game in Barbados and had to pull out of the tour. He was replaced by Fidel Edwards. Gibson

conceded that this was a blow, but was confident that Edwards, Ravi Rampaul and Tino Best would shoulder the responsibility well in foreign conditions.

Gibson said Roach's example was an eye opener for cricket boards to take steps to manage the workloads of certain players by ensuring they get enough rest as well as keep an eye on their fitness and conditioning.

"Last year during the regional tournament we took steps asking the regional boards to rest certain players who we felt needed a break. Roach's situation is unfortunate since he is on a very long break, since New Zealand," Gibson said. "He got hurt playing three weeks ago but didn't report it to anybody. In the past a lot of guys may have gone on tour with that injury, and if the injury happens in the first Test the team is a man short. We're trying to guard against that sort of stuff happening."

"You look at the amount of cricket these days, especially T20, a time will come when we need to tell a player or a regional board that this particular player needs a break. You put him in a strength and conditioning program. It's a realistic possibility that we could do stuff like that in the future."

Looking at West Indies' bowling attack, Gibson expected the spinner Sunil Narine to be a match-winner in Bangladesh, despite his inexperience in the longer formats. Narine has 12 wickets in three Tests with a five-wicket haul.
