

USING BANGLADESH AS HEROIN SMUGGLING ROUTE

150kg heroin couriered to UK in 12 years

Detectives find at least 10 gangs involved; lax checking by courier services made the crime easy

Bangladeshi members of a transnational drug cartel smuggled around 150 kilograms of heroin to the UK through Bangladesh in the last 12 years, taking advantage of the lax security checking system of some courier services.

At least 10 local gangs have couriered the

deadly drug in around 250 consignments, hiding them in shoes, leatherjackets and books after Pakistani agents had brought them to Bangladesh from Pakistan and Afghanistan, detectives say.

Detectives learnt about these gangs and their smuggling process after the arrest of Shamsul Arefin Tuhin, a local member of the

international gang, in the capital in September.

On information from Tuhin that a Bangladeshi-born British citizen named Shah Alam Suman, a Pakistani national and some British nationals had been operating from the UK, Bangladeshi detectives sought help from

Triumphant Obama girds for battle

President Barack Obama has returned to the White House emboldened by his stunning re-election and challenging his Republican opponents to work with him to avert a looming financial crisis.

The liberal euphoria that greeted Obama's landmark election victory over Mitt Romney was short-lived as he immediately set about the daunting task of breaking down partisan gridlock in a bitterly divided Congress.

Before leaving Chicago, Obama was already on the phone trying to bridge the gap with Republican

leaders to avoid a potentially catastrophic "fiscal cliff" that could plunge the fragile US economy back into recession.

A combination of dramatic spending cuts and tax increases will take effect on January 1 without a deal on reducing the ballooning budget deficit, with Democrats and Republicans in Congress locked in a who-blanks-first standoff.

Obama spoke to Republican House Speaker John Boehner and also telephoned the minority Republican leader in the Senate, Mitch McConnell, as well as top Democrats.

China talks tough on corruption

Hu Jintao warns CPC members at nat'l congress

Calling for combating corruption and promoting political integrity, General Secretary of the Communist Party of China Hu Jintao yesterday sounded a caution that failure to handle this major political issue could prove "fatal to the party, even cause the collapse of the party and the fall of the state."

Hu Jintao, also president of China, said the issue is of great concern to the people and tackling it is a long-term political commitment of the CPC.

He called for enhancing intra-party democracy, reports Xinhua.

The top Chinese leader made the call in a keynote report at 18th national congress of the party.

The congress began yesterday in Beijing with a pledge to further open up China's socialist market economy and to bring reforms and a major leadership change in a decade, reports Reaz Ahmad from the Chinese capital.

The theme of the congress is to "hold
