Aminul Islam Bulbul still recalls, not without trepidation, the hot flash of anger that he experienced when seated beside the West Indian Gordon Greenidge

during a press conference in 1999.

Greenidge, then the coach of a Bangladesh side taking their nascent steps into world cricket had publicly remarked that the impending Test status was too early for Bangladesh. "I felt a surge of fury," recalls Islam when contacted at his current residence in China. "I felt he [Greenidge] was wrong."

Understandably then, those comments would prove to be the beginning of the end for Greenidge whose stint with Bangladesh would

end in acrimonious circumstances. It seemed that the West Indian was the lone warning voice amongst a surge of euphoria that eventually saw Bangladesh join the ranks of the cricketing elite by appearing in their first Test match on November 10, 2000.


