What is Hay? Why does it matter?

OMETIMES big ideas are born in ordinary places.
The Hay Festival was one of them. Founded by Peter Florence's father around a kitchen table in the small Welsh town of Hay-on-Wye, the Hay festival, now 25 years old, is the pre-eminent global festival of literature and ideas.

Hay Festivals now take place all over the world. There are annual festivals in Colombia, Mexico, Spain, Lebanon, and many other locations. When the festival decided to come to Dhaka—on the suggestion of the former director of the British Council—we weren't sure what sort of audience we would get, or even if there was a hunger for a bilingual festival celebrating the diversity of Bangladeshi literature.

As it turns out, we were overwhelmed with the response. Not only did the audience enjoy listening to and interacting with the writers who came from afar, but they were also to interact with Bangla writers they had long been fans of. We realized that such a forum—a place where writers could speak frankly, even intimately, with an audience, answering questions about their work, their writing lives, and the things that inspire them—was an exciting new format for a Bangladeshi audience. The audience's enthusiasm led Hay Festival Director, Peter Florence, to declare the Dhaka festival "one of the most exciting debuts we've ever had."

We in Bangladesh are proud of our literary heritage. Literature is a central part of our identity, and we celebrate our literary heroes—Nazrul and Tagore in particular—with



We hope to demonstrate to ourselves, and to the rest of the world, that Bangladesh doesn't just have a rich literary tradition, but a vibrant and living literary culture. Please join us on Friday and Saturday (16-17 November 2012) for our bi-lingual, cross-cultural, inter-generational celebration of literature and ideas.
