Muffat breaks world record

France's Olympic gold medallist Camille Muffat set a new world record in the short course women's 800m freestyle event at the French

championships on Friday. Muffat timed 8min 01.06sec, smashing the previous mark of 8:04.53 set by Italian Alesia Filippi in Rijeka, Croatia, in December 2008.

At the London Games this summer, the 23-yearold Muffat claimed gold in the 400m individual freestyle with a new Olympic record, as well as silver in the 200m freestyle and a bronze as part of the 4x200m freestyle team.

Best hopes to continue his good run in the next Test match scheduled to begin in Khulna on November 21.



Rangana Herath bagged a five-wicket haul to put Sri Lanka in a strong position on the opening day of the first Test against New Zealand in Galle on Saturday.

The left-arm spinner finished with 5-65, his 11th haul of five or more wickets in a Test innings, as Sri Lanka dismissed New Zealand for 221 in the first innings before reaching 9-1 in reply at stumps.

Nightwatchman Suraj Randiv was unbeaten on three while opener Tharanga Paranavitana had yet to open his account. Debutant opener Dimuth Karunaratne was trapped leg-before by fast bowler Tim Southee for no score.

Sri Lankan paceman Shaminda Eranga, playing only his second Test, was the other bowler to impress as he took two wickets off three balls in a lively opening spell to eventually finish with 3-51.

New Zealand squandered the advantage of batting first on a good wicket at the Galle International Stadium

after winning the toss as they faltered against pace in the morning and then against spin.

Opener Brendon McCullum (68) and middle-order batsman Daniel Flynn (53) were the only batsmen to apply themselves well on a slow turning track before both fell to Herath in the afternoon session.

New Zealand were struggling at 40-3 following Eranga's double-strike in the morning before McCullum and lefthanded Flynn steadied the innings with a 90-run stand for the fourth wicket.

McCullum played some aggressive shots in the afternoon, hitting offspinner Suraj Randiv and Herath for sixes. He fell immediately after hitting his second six, bowled by Herath.

Herath got his third wicket when he had Flynn caught behind after the batsman had hit seven fours in his 152-ball knock.

Sri Lanka's fast bowlers did the early damage when they took three wickets in the first session, with Eranga striking twice and Nuwan Kulasekara once. Eranga had opener Martin Guptill (11) and Kane Williamson caught in the slips, while Kulasekara bowled skipper Ross Taylor (nine) in his fifth over.

Chittagong opener Mahbubul Karim constructed an accomplished 154 to grind down holders Rajshahi on the second day of the fourth round of the National Cricket League at the Sylhet Divisional Stadium in Sylhet yesterday. His century carried his team to 299 for three and a lead of 60 by the close. Mominul Haque was batting on 54 and Chittagong will want him to score big today to bat Rajshahi out of the match.

The match between Dhaka and Rangpur at the BKSP saw a similarly batdominated day as Dhaka ended the day on 271 for four, just 12 behind Rangpur's first innings 283 all out. Opener Abdul Majid scored 90 to anchor the innings and was ably supported by number three batsman Saikat Ali who scored 52.

Away at the Shaheed Chandu Stadium at Bogra, Khulna did not add to their overnight 355 for nine as their last wicket fell on the second ball of the day when Murad Khan fell to Dhaka Metro's Arafat Sunny. Metro's reply saw Marshal Ayub lead his team towards the target, but too many wickets were falling at the other end as Abdur Razzak picked six wickets. Metro finished the day on 305 for nine with Marshal still batting on 87.

The match moving fastest towards a result was the one between Sylhet and Barisal at the Abdur Rab Serniabad Stadium in Barisal. Sylhet lost their last two wickets for the addition of 13 runs to their overnight score of 193 for eight, but struck back by bundling out Barisal for 131. Bangladesh were thrashed by 5-0 by Thailand in their FIFA International Friendly match at the Rajamangala Stadium in Bangkok yesterday. Thailand striker Teerasil Dangda scored a hattrick while striker Phichitphong Choeichiu netted one and midfielder Naphat Thamrongsupakon netted one each for the hosts.

Bangladesh were on the backfoot right from the word go as they conceded three goals within the first 20 minutes. Pichitpong scored the opening goal in the 5th minute before

Teerasil doubled the lead 12th and made it 3-0 in the 20th minute. The striker completed his hattrick in the 52nd minute before midfielder Tamrongsupakorn

sealed a comfortable victory for hosts in the 74th minute.

This is the worst defeat for Bangladesh against these opposition, whom Bangladesh only managed to beat twice in their 14 meetings so far, the last of which came way back in 1989. Bangladesh coach Saiful Bari Titu said that Bangladesh were silly to concede the first two goals which demoralised his side, adding that the opponents were far stronger than his side.

Bangladesh played their best eleven in the side while Thailand, once getting to a comfortable lead, started to make substitutions and made as many as 10 changes in the match.

This was the second ever FIFA friendly match for Bangladesh after their 1-1 draw away to Nepal in September. As part of ascertaining the standard of the national side, Bangladesh will play one more friendly against Malaysia on Tuesday.

England were bundled out for 191 in the first innings with Ojha taking five for 45 while Ravichandran Ashwin took three wickets, prompting India to enforce the follow-on.

But the script changed remarkably in the second innings as skipper Alastair Cook (74 batting) and Nick Compton (34 batting) steered England to 111 for no loss at close on an eventful third day with the visitors still trailing by 219 runs.

"Everyone doubted whether we could compete with them before this Test. Overall we are satisfied because we took the lead and all the players contributed whenever they could. So at the end if we could have played a little better we could have possibly won it. And one must consider the fact that this kind of situation has not happened regularly for us," said Mushfigur.

"Apart from the last two sessions, we consistently played good Test cricket which was a positive. But when we lost 5-6 wickets in the [afternoon] session, that's when the game went away from us. If we had wickets we could have gone for an all-

out win in the final session," he added. The wicketkeeper batsman however admitted that the batsmen let them down

in the match. "Our plan was to dismiss them early so that we would find a way to chase it. In that way our bowling was awesome, but it was our batsmen who let us down. But it was a combination of both good bowling and the wicket. For instance Shakib's delivery was unplayable. And some of the shots played by our top order batsmen weren't that good," he explained, adding: "We have very little experience of chasing targets in the fourth innings, so we crumbled. If we play

more we'll get more experience." The Bangladesh skipper also gave credit to his bowlers, especially praising the performance of Shohag Gazi, the offspinner who showed how important it is to play first-class cricket with due attention like he did for the last couple of years.

"I thought on this flat wicket bowling them out once is a very good achievement when they had many in-form batsmen. Shohag Gazi bowled really well and got wickets. Rubel also bowled well and got wickets. Our bowlers gave 100 percent. But still there is room for the bowlers to improve as we gave them too many boundaries and there were some slip ups from our side," he opined.
