Labour rights still worry US

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But frustrations mount as the reviewers mentioned a lack of progress in dealing with issues cited in the petition, such as workers' rights, he said.

Bangladesh has been enjoying the duty-free facility for exporting some non-traditional items under the renewed GSP since September last year.

"This GSP review could send a negative signal on Bangladesh's commercial relations with America if the review results in the suspension of some or all of Bangladesh's GSP privileges," he said.

He, however, hoped that Bangladesh would identify and implement constructive measures to address the concerns raised in the GSP petition, so the petition can be resolved satisfactorily.

Mozena was speaking at a monthly luncheon meeting of Foreign Investors' Chamber of Commerce and Industry (Ficci) at the Westin hotel in the capital. AFL-CIO (American

Federation of Labour and Congress of Industrial Organisations) filed the petition against Bangladesh's having access to GSP on the grounds of Bangladesh's failure to ensure workers' basic labour rights.

The US ambassador said Bangladesh could make such "respect for labour rights" a great asset.

"I would hope that Bangladesh -- owners,

government, workers -would come together to participate in a better work programme with the support of the International Labour Organisation," he said. said.

Urging the government to launch the work programme quickly, he said the programme provides a ready means to address and resolve the labour issues that raise concerns for buyers.

He said this is a critical point in the history of the garment and household textile industries in Bangladesh.

"This is the moment," he added, "when Bangladesh will decide whether or not to become the world's largest exporter of RMG and household textiles, whether or not to become the next Asian Tiger."

With the support from all stakeholders, the country could address and overcome the challenges constraining the RMG sector and those relating to labour, he said.

Terming the partnership between the two countries "strong and growing", he said the US will do its part in helping Bangladesh become a middle-income country and the next "Asian Tiger".

Mozena referred to a recently released World Bank report that said Bangladesh could become an alternative to China in the garment and household textile sectors.

"Indeed, Bangladesh to Bangladesh," he said. could replace China as the largest exporter of readymade garments and household textiles," he

There are so many other areas where Bangladesh is poised to become a major global player -- production of generic pharmaceuticals, leather footwear and other leather products, information technology, shipbuilding, frozen shrimp, jute and silk, he added.

Mozena said everyone is aware of the constraints that include capacity challenges of ports, roads, railroads, energy, power and the challenges of corruption, inadequate rule of law, and the possibility of political instability.

"These are real challenges, but Bangladesh can overcome each of them, he remarked.

Referring to a meeting between the American Chambers of Commerce of Bangladesh and Hong Kong last week, he said the RMG, household and footwear industries are leaving China as it surges up the development ladder, making labour there too expen-

"The buyers are scouring Asia, looking for new sources of these products. There are a growing number of options, including Vietnam, Indonesia Cambodia and, increasingly, Myanmar. But these buyers want most to come

The buyers, however, are concerned about the slow pace at which infrastructure challenges are being addressed, about political instability and about the labour situation here, he said.

Indeed, these challenges can and should be overcome, and will be overcome, as Bangladesh surges to the top as the number-one RMG and household textile exporter in the world, he said.

"This is no dream; this is no mythical vision. This is a reality waiting to happen. And you are the key to making it happen,' Mozena noted.

The funeral took place amid a heavy Hamas presence, although the family had no known affiliations with any militant group.

Neighbours told reporters that the Dalou family had no connections with militant organisations and that the father -- who was not at home at the time of the air strike - owned a grocery shop.
