

After the Liberation War, Akhand returned to Bangladesh and joined Bangladesh Radio as a music composer, singer and musician.

He has toured several countries of

Europe for performances. Akhand presently performs with the band 'Happy Touch' on stage and composes songs.

#### Sabitri Chattapadhyay in Dhaka

The once-hugely popular heroine of Indian Bangla films, Sabitri Chattapadhyay was in Dhaka recently. On a threeday trip, on invitation from Bonhishikha, Sabitri was amazed at the hospitality of the organisers, and the people of Dhaka, in general.

Sabitri played the female leads opposite the legendary Uttam Kumar and Soumitra Chatterjee in many blockbusters. When asked about Uttam Kumar, Sabitri said the stories would take days, and that she'd share them maybe some other time. Sabitri had nine sisters, of whom eight are deceased.

Despite her advancing years, Sabitri said she has not stopped acting, because she has kept herself young at heart -- and despite having no academic background in the field, she has learnt from life.

Sabitri, an avid reader, still picks up a novel whenever she gets time. She lamented the recent demise of Sunil Gangopadhyay, who remains a favourite.

Sabitri is currently working in TV serials in Kolkata, and has two upcoming films. When asked about her recent favourite film from Kolkata, she mentioned "Auto-

And then, the inevitable question: will Sabitri come back to Bangladesh? The call of the roots is not one that can be ignored, and she will be here whenever invited, said an emotional Sabitri.

The technique used in raku is burning China white clay in a low temperature with sawdust and dry leaves, followed by instantly cooling it in water so that a carbon texture is formed over the surface. Aside from everyday use, raku has become popular for its aesthetic value in both Asia and the West.

A number of untitled artworks are on display at the exhibition. Some of these demonstrate novelty, creativity and aesthetics. The artiste trio tried to go beyond the traditional aspects of ceramics, distinctively capturing both the modern and the post-modern features.

Bikash Kanti Karmokar's depiction of a cat family is exquisite. The artwork boasts of scintillating colours, texture and of course, the distinguished expressions of the cats. Bikash's other works represent thoughtful cranium with hands.

## Humayun Ahmed, seen through Nasir Ali Mamun's lens

The avid admirers of the late Humayun Ahmed saw his popularity surpassing that of Sharat Chandra Chattopadhyaya.

Recently, Ahmed's fans had the opportunity to get a glimpse of some intriguing moments from the late writer's personal life at a photography exhibition, titled "Ananta Jiban Jodi". The exhibition at Gallery Chitrak in Dhanmondi, Dhaka, from November 9 to 16, featured around 100 photographs of Ahmed captured by noted photographer Nasir Ali Mamun. Mamun is known as the "portrait man" for his excellence in portrait pho-

The exhibition was part of the celebration of Ahmed's 64th birth anniversary. The fortnightly magazine 'Onnodin' arranged the exhibition.

Not all the photos taken by the "portrait man" are portraits. Rather, they showcase informal, never-before-seen moments -at casual family gatherings or busy public events. Moments like Ahmed taking photos of his family members while his son Nishad tries to interrupt, or Ahmed signing autographs for a reader at the Ekushey Book Fair, or Ahmed wandering around at the Bangla Academy premises with others become memora-

One might feel a sudden surge of emotions when looking at a black and white image of Ahmed with his daughter Shila, or a close shot with his mother Ayesha Faiz. Mamun had brilliantly captured the past.

The exhibition mostly featured photos taken since 2005, either at Nuhash Palli or at Ahmed's Dhaka residence "Dakhin Hawa". Some of the photos also show his gaunt face while in New York for treatment.

Many are aware of Ahmed's friendship with another celebrated Bengali author, Sunil Gangopadhyay, and have seen a photo of the duo seated together by the pond at Nuhash Palli. That photo, along with a couple of others, featuring the duo is on display. Coincidentally, both of them died the same year After seeing the photos, it became apparent that Mamun



written and directed by a DU student, Naorin Sazzad, will also be staged at the festival


