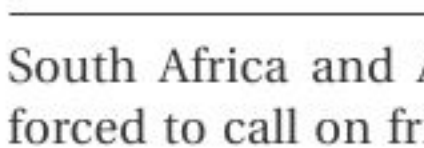

Top spot still at stake

Aussies must win, SA can afford a draw

South Africa and Australia will both be forced to call on fringe players when the number one ranking in Test cricket goes on the line in the final Test starting Friday in Perth.

After a tame draw in the series opener in Brisbane, South Africa's batting heroics in Adelaide, led by a defiant unbeaten century from debutant Faf du Plessis, ensured the second Test also ended all-square despite a tense and dramatic last day.

And it means both sides will tread the WACA ground with the chance to end the series as the top team in Test cricket.

A win for South Africa, or a draw, would see the Proteas retain their position atop the rankings, while an Australian victory would put them back in the number one spot they last held more than three years ago.

Complicating matters are several forced changes as the competitive nature of the first two Tests takes a heavy toll, with just a three-day break between matches.

South Africa are likely to be without all-rounder Jacques Kallis, who played a crucial role in saving the Adelaide Test with the bat and exacerbated a hamstring injury. But skipper Graeme Smith is

leaving the door open.

"He is definitely not going to bowl but he could play as a batter," said Smith.

All-rounder Ryan McLaren, who played one Test against England in 2010, has been added to the squad as cover.

The tourists are also waiting on the fitness of seamer Vernon Philander, who was a late withdrawal from Adelaide with a sore back.

Rory Kleinveldt replaced Philander at the last minute and after dismissing the Australian top three in the second innings is hoping for a berth in Perth.

Spinner Imran Tahir faces the axe after a demoralising outing in Adelaide.

Australia go into the Test without young quick James Pattinson, ruled out for the rest of the summer with a side injury.

Pattinson joined fellow paceman Pat Cummins (back) on the long-term sidelines and there is concern that experienced fast bowlers Peter Siddle and Ben Hilfenhaus will struggle in Perth after their final day exertions in Adelaide.

The Australia selectors have added three fast bowlers to a 14-man squad for the final Test.

Uncapped pair Josh Hazlewood and John Hastings, who have both represented Australia in limited overs cricket, come in along with forgotten quick Mitchell Johnson, while Mitchell Starc, 12th man in the first two Tests, looks to win promotion.

delights his backers.

In yesterday's match against the West Indies he scored 43 off 57, in itself not a huge achievement, but he seemed the only one at ease with the venom that the West Indians spewed. When the fast bowlers dropped short, he seemed to have ample time to rock back and play the pull. He would not often have faced bowlers of this speed, but the time available to him seemed to set him apart.

And equally encouraging perhaps is his demeanour off the field. He comes off as shy from a distance, but talking to him reveals something more beneath -- a strain of defiance perhaps, more likely a refusal to get flustered whatever the question, a trait he displays during batting. Refreshingly, he was not over-excited about his big break.

"I feel how I normally feel. I don't get too excited; if you get excited then that may open the door for conceit and pride," deadpanned the little man. When pointed out that he should be excited as he has just achieved a cricketer's dream, his answer revealed that just making the national team was not going to be enough. "Dreams vary from person to person. I may have bigger dreams, maybe that's why I am not over-excited."

When asked about the man he was

replacing -- who he lists as one of his idols alalong with Mushfiqur Rahim and Tamim Iqbal from Bangladesh, and Australian skipper Michael Clarke from the international arena -- he was almost embarrassed as he said, "Shakib Bhai (Shakib Al Hasan) is Shakib Bhai, I am nowhere near him, I don't even think like that."

Chief selector Akram Khan said that Mominul was picked because of his consistency and that the team management and selection panel thought that a batsman should take Shakib's place.

"Among the batsmen who are in form, we have seen that his (Mominul Haque) consistency is good. Mominul has played well recently as well as over the last one-and-a-half years. Although Shakib is an all-rounder, the team management thought that an extra batsman is needed," said Akram. "Of course there is no one to fully replace Shakib. As I said he plays two parts for us, as a bowler and a batsman. We do have a lot of part-time bowlers to try and fill the void."

It does not do to get too excited about a new prospect, and Mominul may well fail in his first test as an international cricketer. However, as he showed yesterday, he is not out of his depth facing the West Indians. At any rate, his addition will add a new level of interest when the series gets underway on Friday.

much out of the game by the end of the first innings when the tourists amassed 361 in 50 overs. "The guys supported me. There were a lot of runs on the board so you can try different things. The game was already over by the 35th or 40th over. The guys had a good run out and those sitting it out are well rested for the ODI series that's coming up."

The five-match ODI series starting on Friday will also see the new ODI rules -- two bouncers per over, a maximum of four fielders allowed outside the 30-yard circle during non-Powerplay overs of which there will now be two blocks instead of

three -- in effect. Pollard believed that the reduction in the number of fielders allowed outside the circle will make things more taxing for bowlers, while also benefiting the power hitters in his team.

"The bowlers have to watch their p's and q's. They can't let it stray because there's not many guys outside. Having said that, the rules have been set and players have to just follow so I think it is a matter of something that we have to get used to," he said.

"We have a lot of power hitters. Clearing the boundary and the ball falling in gaps are important for us. So hopefully we can capitalise on it until there's any further change."

Kiwis strongly placed

Tim Southee and Doug Bracewell rocked Sri Lanka with two wickets apiece to boost New Zealand's chances of posting a series-

levelling win in the second and final Test on Wednesday.

The hosts, needing 363 to win, were struggling at 47-4 in their second innings at stumps on the penultimate day when 17 wickets fell at the P Sara Oval in Colombo.

Fast bowler Southee, who took five wickets in the first innings, continued to trouble the Sri Lankan batsmen as he removed openers Tharanga Paranavithana and Tillakaratne Dilshan in his lively opening spell.

Paceman Bracewell then grabbed two big wickets when he bowled Kumar Sangakkara (16) and had skipper Mahela Jayawardene (five) caught behind.

New Zealand skipper Ross Taylor, who scored a hundred in the first innings, top-scored with 74 after his team had lost three wickets for one run off four balls.

New Zealand, leading by

168 runs, declared their second innings at 194-9 to set a challenging target for the hosts, who lead the series 1-0 following their 10-wicket win in the opening Test.

The tourists slipped from 74-2 to 75-5 before Taylor and debutant Todd Astle (35) steadied the innings with a 97-run stand for the sixth wicket.

Paceman Nuwan Kulasekara had Kane Williamson (18) caught by Paranavithana in the slips and then trapped Daniel Flynn leg-before with the last two balls of his eighth over.

Left-arm spinner Rangana Herath then struck with the second delivery of the next over, having Kruger van Wyk caught by Paranavithana at leg-slip for a duck.

Taylor played a responsible knock and reached his half-century with just one four when he fluently drove off-spinner Suraj Randiv through the covers, while Astle provided valuable support.

Astle was unlucky to be caught after the tea-break as his attempted sweep off Randiv hit the boot of a close-in fielder before going to Dilshan at short

mid-wicket.

Southee earlier finished with 5-62 for his third five-wicket haul in a Test innings and left-arm paceman Trent Boult with 4-42 as Sri Lanka were bowled out for 244 in their first innings in reply to New Zealand's 412.

New Zealand needed just 7.4 overs of pace in the morning to claim the last four wickets for 19 after the hosts had resumed at 225-6, with Boult taking three and Southee one.

Thilan Samaraweera fell at his overnight score of 76 while Randiv (39) made just five in the morning. The pair added 97 for the seventh wicket.

Exim Bank 22nd National Men's Handball Championship gets underway tomorrow at two separate venues of the capital, with 28 teams participating.

Initially 24 teams, split into eight groups, will play in round-robin league at the Shaheed (captain) M Mansur Ali National Handball Stadium and Suhrawardi Indoor Stadium in Mirpur. Champions of each of the eight groups will be joined by last year's top four finishers -- Boarder Guard of Bangladesh, Bangladesh Police, Chittagong Metropolis and Chapainawabganj -- in the second round which has also been divided into four groups. Champions of each of those four groups will play in the semifinals.

Exim Bank will provide Tk 10 lakh out of an estimated budget of Tk 11.2 lakh.

ECB lessens Andy's load

Ashley Giles will take over as England limited-overs head coach, the England and Wales Cricket Board (ECB) announced Tuesday as officials try to ease the burden on team director Andy Flower.

However, the ECB stressed Flower, the former Zimbabwe batsman, will remain team director and "continue to be responsible for the preparation and playing strategies for the England men's cricket teams supported by Ashley Giles".

There have been concerns about the workload being carried by Flower for the past five-and-a-half-years, which has seen England win home and away Ashes series, and there were fears he could be lost to 'burn-out'.

Flower will continue to tour with the England Test side during both home and away series but will no longer be responsible for the day to day leadership of the England ODI and T20 sides, with Giles now taking on that responsibility.

Giles, a former England left-arm spinner who was an Ashes winner as a player in 2005, is already a member of the England selection panel and as a coach helped guide Warwickshire, the club he represented during his first-class career, to this season's County Championship title.

But as a result of his new role Giles will now give up his position with the Midlands county.

Both Flower and Giles will remain England selectors in a panel currently chaired by former Test off-spinner Geoff Miller.
