## Shahjalal airport braces for chaos

Runway repair to stop flight operations for 9 hrs every day in next 5 months

SHARIFUL ISLAM

The 24-hour Shahjalal International Airport becomes a 15-hour airport for five months from today, as its only runway gets a fresh coat of tarmac.

Airlines and passengers fear delays and

chaos as the airport would have to handle around 185 flights, including 90 international flights, and around 15,000 passengers a day within that 15-hour window. They worry that since the airport may not

have the capability to handle such a rush, things could get worse in case of inclement weather, notably fog which is quite usual during the winter.

### Tigers' teamwork crushes Windies

The Bangladesh team surpassed all expectations and confounded all pre-series predictions as they convincingly beat the West Indies by seven wickets in the first of five ODIs at the Sheikh Abu Naser Stadium in Khulna yesterday.

No one expected a team with four debutants and without their best player to pull off a win against a team decidedly stronger on paper, much less one with 58 balls to spare. The bowlers, with the ever-more-impressive debutant Shohag Gazi leading the way with the best returns by a Bangladeshi debutant, set up the victory with a spirited and disciplined effort that the West Indians had no answer to, being skittled out for 199 in 46.5 overs.

The victory was dedicated by captain Mushfiqur Rahim to the victims of the garments factory fire in Ashulia and Manzarul Islam Rana, the Test cricketer from Khulna who lost his life in a motorcycle accident on

### Pro-govt doctors set to win BMA polls

Dab alleges 'manipulation'

The pro-Awami League Swadhinata Chikitsak Parishad (Swachip) is leading in the biennial election of Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) held on Thursday.

According to the results of 44 out of 67 centres across the country, including that of the capital, Swachip-backed president aspirant Mahmud Hasan got 11,482 votes, while Pro-BNP Doctors' Association of Bangladesh (DAB)-backed president aspirant AKM Azizul Haque bagged 6,308, said Abdur Rahman Khan, president of BMA Election Commission.

Swachip's secretary general candidate Iqbal Arslan got 10,652 votes, while DAB's candidate AZM Zahid Hossain 6,731 votes in the said centres.

The election commission, however, could not give detailed information about the other candidates contesting for different posts of the 41-member central executive committee.

As of 10:15pm yesterday, the BMA election commission had confirmed receiving results of 64 centres. The election commission chief said they had not calculated all the results received but it appeared to him that Swachip candidates were leading.

He said the final results of the election would be announced today at 4:00pm at a press conference in the BMA headquarters in Dhaka.

The total number of voters for the BMA election is 32,892, of which 13,338 are in

### Palestinians win UN vote

Statehood status upgraded despite opposition from Israel, US

The UN General Assembly on Thursday overwhelmingly voted to make Palestine a non-member state, in the face of strong opposi-

tion from Israel and the US. The victory for president Mahmud Abbas triggered scenes of joy in the occupied West Bank, where thousands celebrated with bursts of gunfire and cheers in the city of Ramallah.

UN "birth certificate" for a Palestinian state and got the backing of 138 countries in the 193member assembly. Nine voted against and 41 abstained, while five did not participate. The limited diplomatic

Arabs, who have battled over it ever since, most recently in this month's deadly Gaza fighting.

Apart from Israel and the US, those voting against were Canada, the Czech Republic, the Marshall Islands, Micronesia, Nauru, Palau and Panama.

European countries such as France, Italy, Spain, Norway, Denmark and Switzerland all voted yes. Britain and Germany both abstained, with Britain say-

ing Abbas had failed to promise he would resume peace negotiations with Israel.

A Palestinian flag was unfurled in the General Assembly as the victory was pronounced.

The vote lifts the Palestinian Authority from an observer entity to a "non-member observer state" on a par with the Vatican.
