Regal shehnai sets off the musical voyage

Ustad Ali Ahmed Hussain Khan kicked off the festival with a shehnai performance set on Raga Hansadhwani. Hansadhwani belonging to thaat Bilawal, represents all 'shuddha swar' (pure notes). Hussain's performance produced perfect 'gamak' (profound waves of melody) coupled with 'taan'. Two shehnai artistes Hassan Haider Khan and Ahmed Abbas Khan accompanied Hussain during the performance. Renowned tabla artiste Pandit Samar Saha embellished the performance with several tabla 'lahora', 'rela' and 'laggi'.

Raga Bageshree blossoms

Ustad Shahid Parvez Khan on sitar played a melodic game of Bageshree, a raga pertaining to the thaat Khamaj. The artiste's stunning performance seemed to make the gentle dewy breeze blow over Madhabilata flowers. Shahid Parvez's 'alaap', 'gaut', 'bistaar', 'jhala' and 'tehai' seemingly made the moon smile. An immaculate Dhrupad performance


Dhrupad is the oldest existing form of classical music. Khayal, thumri and tappa have been created from this form of music. Pandit Uday Bhawalkar offered a dhrupad set on Raga Jog. Pratap Awad accompanied the performance on 'tewra taal' (seven-beat) and 'sul taal' (ten-beat) on pakhawaj. Uday Bhawalkar's rendition of 'gamak' and 'gamaki alaap' were set on 'vilambit', 'madhya' and 'drut laya', and covered three octaves 'mandra', 'madhya' and 'taar saptak'.

A Juganbandi to remember

Pandit Tejendra N Majumdar on sarod, with Pandit Subhanka Banerjee on tabla, created a musical euphoria. The duo presented a 'jugalbandi' that the Dhaka music connoisseurs will remember. Showcasing the splendour of Raga Lalit, Pandit Majumdar played a composition on 'rupak taal madhyalaya'

According to the Pandit, he learnt the raga from Ustad Ali Akbar Khan and Pandit Ravi Shankar, but rarely performs it. For the special performance at the Dhaka festival, Pandit Ajoy Chakrabarty also composed a new bandish, "Raatbhar gunijan gaaye bajaye, Aaj anandmay

Tracing the heritage of classical music

At the back end of the stadium was a quaint open-air exhibition, with portraits and short biographies of the legendary musicians and dancers who had their roots in, or performed in what is now Bangladesh -- covering from the Mughal era to the stalwarts of the 20th century Ustad Allauddin Khan, Pandit Ravi Shankar, Ustad Ayet Ali Khan and Ustad Vilayat Khan. Music enthusiasts thronged the exhibition, walking through the rich history and legacy of classical music in Bangladesh.

Books, magazines, CDs

There was a small exhibition on another part of the stadium grounds, showcasing the various activities, exhibitions and other events of Bengal Foundation. A stall carrying Bengal Foundation's publications and CDs was also nearby, alongside stalls of the publication houses Prothoma Prokashoni and Daily Star Books.

Refreshments

For a programme scheduled to go on until dawn and expected to be attended in large numbers, there were ample supply of refreshments -- traditional pitha and other snacks, and full fledged dinner, all placed in order at one side. There were also seating arrangements for eating, under a canopy.

Among others, Bangladeshi artiste Ustad Shahadat Hossain Khan played Raga Jilf on his sarod. Bangladeshi tabla artiste Zakir Hussain accompanied the performance on 'vilambit' and 'drut teen-taal'. Talented vocalist Omkar Dadarkar rendered a melodious khayal set on Raga Hameer. Sanjay Adhikary on tabla, Gourab Chatterjee on harmonium and Sarwar Hossain on sarangi accompanied the performance. Waseem Ahmed Khan also rendered a khayal based on Raga Chandrakaunsh. Sanjay Adhikary on tabla, Pandit Jyoti Guha on harmonium and Sarwar Hossain on sarangi assisted the performance.

The event organisers have not only meticulously planned, but the execution was efficient too. Today's programme has been dedicated to the memory of pioneering choreographer and dancer Pandit Uday Shankar. Prothom Alo is the strategic partner and The Daily Star is partner of the festival. Uday Shankar

Modernising dance in the Subcontinent

World-renowned dance artiste Uday Shankar's father, Pandit Shyam Shankar, was a native of Jessore district. Uday was born in 1900, in the city of Udaipur, while Shyam Shankar was serving the Maharaja of Jhalawar as his private secretary. Shyam Shankar was a connoisseur of performing arts. To him dance was both art and wor ship. Uday himself was instinctively inclined to dance and painting. He was sent to Mumbai in 1918 to receive training at the famous J.J. School of Arts and then to Gandharva Mahavidyalaya. For higher training, Uday Shankar went to Royal College of Arts, London, where he received both theoretical and practical training in oriental and western painting and dance Sir Rothenstein, President of the Royal College of Arts, introduced him to leading performing artistes of Britain. With a scholarship from the Royal College of Arts, Uday went to Rome for further training in Uday's training at home and abroad and

his interactions with the leading contempo rary dance artistes of India and Europe equipped him for performance at crosscultural levels. The great Russian ballerina, Anna Pavlova, engaged him to create two dance items with Indian themes: Radha-Krishna and the Hindu Marriage.

Uday's compositions demonstrated his extraordinary imagination, knowledge and perception. His association with Pavlova nspired him to design modern Indian ballets where movement and costume, theme and decoration, music and song had to be propor tioned and blended to fit the modern stage. With Pavlova, Uday performed numerous shows in a coast-to-coast tour of the USA.

Uday Shankar returned to India in 1929 Barbiere, a pianist in Paris, and now a dance ern taste and sensibilities. partner and disciple of Uday. Together they toured India and presented shows, drawing Compiled by Correspondent

enchanted audiences everywhere. With him also came Alice Bonner, an influential Swiss sculptress and art historian. With Bonner, Uday visited all parts of India in search of folk dance and instruments. He was fascinated and inspired by the highly stylised classical forms and varieties of Indian folk dances. He chose Kathakali and made it popular all over India, particularly in Bengal. With the cooperation of Alice Bonner, he established in Paris a dance and music company called 'The Compagnie Uday Shankar de Dance Musique Hindous'. From 1930 to 1942 his troupe gave 889 performances all over Europe. His engaging performances brought a new awakening in the Western world about the richness of South Asia's dances and music. In 1939, with the encouragement of Tagore

Uday established an institute called 'Shankar India Cultural Centre' at Almora, in the foothills of the Himalayas. The gurus whom he invited to teach at the centre with him were Shankaran Nambudirei for Kathakali, Kandappa Pillay for Bharatanatyam, Amobi Singh for Manipuri and Ustad Allauddin Khan

Uday Shankar's national and international recognition brought respectability, status and dignity for dance. He made dance in India and in Bengal as respectable as music and

Uday Shankar finally settled in Kolkata in 1960. In 1971, he was decorated with Padma Vibhushan for his unique contributions to the renaissance of Indian performing art. The Visva-Bharati University conferred on him the Deshikottama in 1975. Uday Shankar was a compulsive innovator. Drawing on classical and folk dances, he created his own style, which was essentially mystic and transcendental. He blended mythological and modern with a new vision. 
bond girls and previous 007 agents. Local models featured in a brief fashion show, while pop singer Mehreen rendered the "Skyfall" theme song, originally recorded by
