London return for Scolari

Luiz Felipe Scolari will get the chance to polish up a reputation dented by a disastrous spell at Chelsea as his first match in charge of Brazil after Thursday's reappointment will be against England at Wembley.

"Great. There's no better scenario than facing England," said the 64year-old after taking the reins of the Selecao for a second time barely a week after the sacking of predecessor Mano Menezes.

"I am really fond of the English people and it's great to go back and play at Wembley," said Scolari, who knocked England out of the 2002 World Cup in the quarterfinals on the way to lifting the trophy. The match will be a

February 6 friendly and gives Scolari the chance to make a return to the capital and show that his illfated eight months in charge at Stamford Bridge which ended in the sack in February 2009 was a blip.

Inter mull selling Sneijder

Inter Milan will consider selling Netherlands midfielder Wesley Sneijder after talks over accepting a wage cut stalled.

Sneijder, a standout player in their 2010 treble season but who media reports say is newly-frugal Inter's top earner with a six million euro (\$7.8 million) annual salary, again looks set to be left out of their match with Palermo on Sunday.

"Sneijder isn't playing because the coach doesn't think he's at his best, above all psychologically," Inter president Massimo Moratti told reporters late on Thursday.

"For us it's natural to look for a way to not be forced to sell him and he has the right to not accept our offer. If it stays like that, the solution will be on the transfer market."

'I am obliged to win WC'

Luiz Felipe Scolari believes Brazil have a solemn duty to win the World Cup on home soil in 2014, but admitted that the faltering giants are nowhere near favour-

ites for a sixth world title.

Scolari is used to guiding Brazil through stormy waters having taken over a side struggling even to qualify for the 2002 World Cup before guiding them to

their most recent triumph 10 years ago. Winning the trophy again in 18 months' time would take things to a new level given that Brazil famously missed the target on the only other occasion they staged the showpiece -- losing the 1950 final in the Maracana to Uruguay.

"We have an obligation to win, we are playing at home. Don't you think our players are aware of the importance of winning the trophy on home soil?" asked Scolari after he was presented to the media in Rio at the start of his second spell in charge.

"We are not favourites right now but we intend to turn ourselves into favourites during the tournament."

The pressure looks on after two consecutive poor World Cup showings and a lost Olympic Games final to Mexico which saw predecessor Mano Menezes given the boot. But Scolari, who had a stellar second

spell in charge of Gremio and a less successful second stint with Palmeiras, says he can take the pressure. "If you don't want pressure best not to

be in the team. Go and work in an office for the Bank of Brazil," he was quoted as saying by one local newspaper.

The bank retorted by saying it "regrets the coach's unfortunate comment" which it found distasteful.

Scolari takes the helm of a side currently ranked just 13th in the FIFA standings behind the likes of Greece and Colombia.

As Brazil demand "new methods" Scolari insists he is focused.

"The objective is clear -- to win the World Cup in 2014. I don't feel under pressure. The players are the ones with pressure on them.

A year after his initial arrival Brazil landed their fifth world title -- the Pentecampeao. Now it is a Hexacampeao that Scolari

and his sidekick, 1994 winning coach Carlos Alberto Parreira, are tasked with winning -- using next summer's home Confederations Cup as a springboard. "I am happy to work with people who

have confidence in me and happy to have at my side someone to share in this task -that is, Parreira," said Scolari.

"The World Cup project is starting off strongly," said the man named 'Felipao'.

"Our sole commitment is to seek out

and offer the best for our football and it is in this vein that we have chosen these two great champions, respected not just in our country but worldwide," Brazilian Football Confederation (CBF) president Jose Maria Marin said.

Scolari, whom Chelsea sacked midseason in early 2009, was out of work after parting company with Palmeiras last September -- the team were later relegated.

Former players are divided on whether Brazil can go back to a glorious future under him.

Ronaldo, whose goals landed the 2002 World Cup title, said: "Congratulations to him. It's a great challenge for him."

Zico, star of the early 1980s, also favoured the move.

"Felipao (Scolari) has won so many

Single-mindedness is now the name of the game for the new tandem.

"I'm not talking about there being a 'Scolari family -- but we're going to foster an atmosphere of unity," Scolari stressed.

Parreira earlier told Brazilian media that "it's time to put other problems aside and focus on winning the World Cup."

Ribery has full faith in Bayern

France winger Franck Ribery has said he is "100 per cent sure" that Bayern Munich will finish the season as Bundesliga champions ahead of Saturday's crunch showdown with Borussia Dortmund.

Bayern host defending Bundesliga champions Dortmund, third in the league, at Munich's Allianz Arena with the Bavarians currently 10 points clear at the top of the table and Ribery in superb form with four goals in nine games.

Although Bayern held an eight-point lead at one stage last season, Dortmund still eventually won their second league title, with Munich finishing second. But Ribery has said the club will not make the same mistake again.

"I am 100 per cent sure that we will be German champions," Ribery told German daily Bild after Bayern failed to win any silverware in the last two seasons.

"We have to be careful and not allow any mistakes against the smaller clubs, like we did last year. We had an eight point lead last season, but Dortmund were still German champions. I am sure we have learnt our lesson."

Ribery is under contract until 2015 and having joined Bayern in 2007.

Mourinho's derby test Rafa seeks first win

European champions Chelsea may be third in the Premier League but that will be little consolation to

interim manager Rafael Benitez as he takes his side across London to West Ham on Saturday.

Two successive goalless draws is not what owner Roman Abramovich wanted after sacking Roberto di Matteo, the man who brought the European Cup to Stamford Bridge for the first time courtesy of last season's Champions League triumph.

And those performances, against Manchester City and derby rivals Fulham, have done little to alter the hostility felt towards Benitez by a large section of Chelsea fans on account of the Spaniard's outspoken comments about the Blues when he was Liverpool manager.

Even wins may not be enough to appease those sections of the Chelsea faithful who remain implacably opposed to his appointment.

But a win, not to mention a goal, at
