unchanged elsewhere over the country.


Day temperature may remain nearly unchanged over the country. The sun sets in the capital today at 5:11pm and rises tomorrow

# Govt yet to hand over control to district councils

Complains Santu Larma

Adivasi leader Jyotirindra Bodhipriya Larma yesterday said the past governments had not handed the control of any important issues, including law and order and land management, over to the councils of three hill districts as promised in the 1997 peace accord.

These issues are very necessary for the full implementation of the deal, he told a discussion on "15 years of the CHT peace accord", organised by Manusher Jonno Foundation at the capital's Brac Centre to review its current status.

"If the government wants, it can hand over the issues within six months," said the Adivasi leader, popularly known as Santu Larma. People of the Chittagong Hill Tracts are still hopeful of the accord's full implementation during this government's tenure, he added.

On Friday, Larma, chief of Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity (PCJSS), told a press conference that a meeting between secretaries to different ministries and the CHT ministry decided to hand over the issues within August 30.

According to the peace agreement, management of 33 issues are supposed to be handed over to the three CHT district councils. Apart from law and order and land

management, these include education, agriculture, dispute resolution, and unreserved forests. Meanwhile, State Minister for

CHT Affairs Dipankar Talukdar yesterday refuted Larma's claim that this government had not handed over any important issues to the CHT district councils. He said many important issues like primary education, agriculture, and youth development department were already handed over, reports our Rangamati correspondent.

The minister also said most of the clauses of the peace accord had been implemented in the last 15 years. The accord has 72 clauses in all and, 48 of them have been executed so far, he told a press

conference at the Awami League office in Rangamati town. Speaking at the discussion in

Dhaka, Larma warned that the CHT tension would only intensify if the peace agreement was not implemented. "The situation in the region will depend on the way the government treats and evaluates the CHT issues."

Shaheen Anam, executive director of Manusher Jonno Foundation, chaired the discussion, while Prof Mizanur Rahman, chief of National Human Rights Commission; Abdul Qayyum Mukul, associate editor of the daily Prothom Alo, and economist Prof Abul Barakat, among others, spoke one the occasion.

Says Rafiqul Islam Mia

BNP standing committee member Rafiqul Islam Mia yesterday said the prime minister has no right to announce election date.

"It is the Election Commission that has the sole authority to announce election date according to constitution's Section 119," he said.

He was addressing a human chain organised by Projonmo Academy before the capital's Jatiya Press Club demanding withdrawal of cases against BNP leaders.

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, at a meeting in Jatiya Sangsad Bhaban on Thursday, said the next parliamentary election date will be announced in October 2013.

Meanwhile, BNP acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir said, "Our ongoing antigovernment movement is not aimed at saving war criminals; rather it is for forcing the government to concede the demand for restoration of the caretaker government system."

He was talking to journalists after placing wreaths at the grave of late president Ziaur Rahman in the capital. Muktijuddho Projonmo organised the programme.

ACT TO REGULATE NGOS

### Unrestricted flow of dev funds demanded

The proposed foreign donation regulatory law must incorporate simple provisions, not restrict non-government development funds, and be immediately made public for scrutiny, demanded international NGO activists at a press conference yesterday.

Forum-Asia, a Bangkok-based organisation for human rights and development; CIVICUS, a global alliance of civic movement; and Commonwealth Human Rights Initiatives (CHRI) jointly organised the press conference in the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

The Bangladesh government consulted civil society leaders and 65 nongovernment organisations (NGO) on the proposed law and assured incorporation said Sayeed.

of the recommendations.

"Still, we remain extremely worried whether the recommendations will accordingly be incorporated when the bill is placed in parliament, as it ultimately depends on the government's desire,' said Sayeed Ahmad, Forum-Asia's country programme manager.

The proposed law's excessive focus on scrutiny and control of NGOs may foil the civil society's independence, said CIVICUS Advocacy Manager Mandeep S Tiwana.

Other concerns are cumbersome approval process involving multiple clearances for foreign-funded projects, absence of an approval timeframe, lack of specific grounds for rejection, requirement for five-yearly registration renewal and power to take control of NGO assets,

WAR CRIMES TRIAL FFs to fast unto death if

it's not done by Dec 16

Freedom fighters at a rally in Sylhet city yesterday afternoon announced that they would fast unto death from December 17, if the government failed to complete the trials of the detained 'front line' war criminals by December 16.

Earlier, they brought out a procession in the city to observe arrival of the victory month, December, when Pakistani occupation army surrendered in the Liberation

They staged the rally at Sylhet Central Shaheed Minar after the procession started from the city's Keane bridge

Md Shamsuddoha, district commander of Bangladesh Muktijoddha Sangsad, chaired the rally.

The speakers demanded that the trial of the war criminals must be completed by December 16. Otherwise they will fast unto death.

The freedom fighters from the city and different upazilas in Sylhet joined the programme.
