The deceased, Imdadul Haq Shohel, 32, worked under a contractor, Omar Faruk, who took lease to provide water to the land of the company at Kumira.


Police said when Shohel went to start the motor somehow his shawl fell on it and was twisted into the wheel. Later, he might have been strangled with the shawl.

Institutional reforms a must for growth

Says Prof Kunal Sen of Manchester University

Miracle growth can take place in a country without properly functioning institutions, including effective courts, but to maintain a sustainable growth institutional reforms are a must, said Prof Kunal Sen of University of Manchester, UK yesterday.

Prof Lant Pritchett of Harvard University, USA said 80 percent of states in the world were still at low, stagnating or failing levels of capabilities.

The two were addressing a public lecture, "Evolution of State Capacity in a Challenging Governance Environment", at Brac Centre Inn in the capital.

Effective States and Inclusive Development, a research programme of Brac Development Institute under Brac University, in association with The Daily Star and South Asian Network on Economic Modeling jointly organised the lecture.

In his lecture, "Politics of Economic Growth", Prof Kunal said countries in growth stagnation would be characterised by a deals environment -- personalised relationships between individuals.

"Growth acceleration can take place when deals between political and economic elites move from being disordered to ordered," he added.

Prof Lant Pritchett, in his lecture, "Folk and the Formula-Pathways to Capable State", said development needs a state that can carry out its responsibilities -formulating effective policies, delivering the mail, educating children, enforcing law and collecting taxes.

"But most developing countries are still failing or stagnating...the reality is that success in building state capability typically comes from a struggle to replace bad institutions with good, based on learning from experience-and not from imposing a rigid formula unsuited to local conditions," he added.

The Daily Star Editor and Publisher Mahfuz Anam moderated the programme.

Brac University Registrar Air Commodore (retd) Ishfaq Ilahi Choudhury delivered inaugural address while eminent personalities including Prof Rehman Sobhan, Dr Akbar Ali Khan, and Prof Rawnak Jahan were present.

BNP boycotts talks with EC

Main opposition BNP yesterday boycotted electoral talks with the Election Commission as the issue of the caretaker government was not on the agenda.

The party was to attend the dialogues yesterday afternoon. It sent two letters to the EC on Thursday, refusing to participate in the discussions if the agenda did not include "provision of the interim government before the next general elections."

Jamaat-e-Islami, a key component of the BNP-led 18paty alliance, is set to boycott the talks today.

A number of other components of the alliance have already boycotted the dialogues.

Chief Election Commissioner Kazi Rakibuddin Ahmad termed BNP's boycott a political stratagem, adding the commission will consider the party's views on redemarcation of the parliamentary constituencies if sent to it. There is no problem arranging the dialogues again for

the BNP, said Rakibuddin, while talking to reporters at the EC. "We will welcome the BNP if it wants to sit with the commission."

The discussions close on Wednesday, the day set for the Awami League and some other parties. **TOKEN STRIKE**

Meanwhile, reporters of the print and electronic media yesterday decided not to cover the ongoing dialogues in protest at Election Commissioner Mohammad Abdul Mobarak's misbehaviour with them.

They held a sit-in on the premises of the commission. After the day's electoral talks on Saturday, Mobarak behaved rudely with reporters before the chief election commissioner and other officials of the commission.

Musa's 25-day cycle journey starts today

about the Liberation War. Twenty other cyclists will accompany Musa on the tour to 50 districts of the country that will commence from Shaheed Minar in the capital.

Prothom Alo Bandhushabha, Everest Academy, Cyclelife, IDLC and The Daily Star launched the cycle tour yesterday on the premises of Dhaka University's Teacher-Student Centre (TSC).

"The peace accord should have been implemented much earlier but there are some people in the government who wanted to go slow," Rizvi, the prime minister's foreign affairs adviser said at a policy dialogue.

"But this time none will be able to refrain us from implementing the accord as ' our bottom line is to implement it," he added.

Indigenous Peoples organised the 3-day long dialogue titled "CHT accord: achievements lessons learnt and the way forward" at Dhaka University's Senate Bhaban.


