
FIFA punishes Jong-Woo

FIFA has suspended a South Korean player for two international matches over a post-match political gesture at the London Olympics, the South's football body said Monday. FIFA's disciplinary committee has also slapped a fine of 3,500 Swiss francs (\$3,781) on Park Jong-Woo following his actions, which relate to an island dispute with Japan, the Korean Football Association (KFA) said.



Team first for Tamim

SAHARA returned to Dhaka yesterday after stupen-

dous ODI success in Khulna, where they won both one-day matches against visiting West Indies by huge margins; a result not thought even in dreams before the start of the five-match series though they boast a record of winning a series against New Zealand 4-0 previously.

Bangladesh made a brilliant comeback after a 10-wicket defeat in the second and final Test and demonstrated why they are considered a much better unit in the shorter version of the game.

The Tigers are now eyeing greater success. For Mushfiqur Rahim's men the series victory is within reach now. But dashing opener Tamim Iqbal said that it would be better for the team to focus on how they can keep the momentum going and put up better performance in the next three games, scheduled for December 5, 7 and 8 at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur, rather than thinking of the series victory.

"Honestly speaking we are in a good position to win the series and we have the chance to do it in Mirpur, but in my opinion we should only think about how we

can continue the good show rather than thinking about the result. As a team we are playing good cricket in the series and I believe the result will come automatically if we can continue it," said Tamim yesterday, adding that the team were upbeat after tremendous success in Khulna but nobody was over excited.

It's really refreshing when the opener put emphasis on individual improvements despite comfortable victories in the first two matches.

"I'm sure the players and coaching staff will discuss how we can improve our individual performances before the next three games. It was a brilliant team effort in the first two games, but still I believe we can improve our individual performances. Strength-wise we are not a big side, so it's important everybody contributes but I believe we are on the way to becoming a strong one-day side," said a confident Tamim.

The Chittagonian also believes that people remember individual success only when it makes an impact on team's result, so it's important to focus on team success rather than any individual achievement.

"Without any doubt Anamul [Haque] played a brilliant knock in the second match but people will not remember for SEE PAGE 17 COL 1

SAHARA The spectacular and comprehensive manner of West Indies' defeats in the first two ODIs in Khulna have com-

pletely turned expectations surrounding the five-ODI series on its head. Sporting memory is short -- you are only as good as your last performance -- and so now the

tourists occupy the space that the home side inhabited before the series. With the memory of Khulna fresh in mind, it is now hard to imagine how West Indies will get around to beating Bangladesh -- the overwhelmingly favourite result before the series.

Maybe it is time to refresh the memory. West Indies still do have batsmen

like Chris Gayle, Marlon Samuels, Dwayne Smith, Kieron Pollard who can destroy bowling figures and the best laid plans. They also have a mystery bowler in Sunil Narine and good fast bowlers in Kemar Roach and Ravi Rampaul. The script was supposed to be thus -- the batting will run up 300-plus totals against an attack missing the bowler Shakib Al Hasan and the bowling would shoot out a batting side which was supposed to be lost if Tamim Iqbal did not fire at the start, not to mention flounder in the middle without Shakib the batsman.

West Indies scored only 199 batting first in the first match and lost by seven wickets, before losing by 160 runs in the second match after conceding 292 in the first innings in which Tamim scored only five. Not quite according to script. Of course the script might still be followed -- West Indies might still win the remaining three games and take the series as they were expected to. But one thing seems certain -- unlike Bangladesh who have seemed to find the resources whereby all members,



the second match West MARLON SAMUELS Indies skipper Darren Sammy admitted that spin was a problem and that batsmen needed to settle in and score. What has happened so far is that the early exits of Gayle and Samuels have forced the middle-order -- Pollard, Smith, Darren Sammy and Devon Thomas -- to hit out and get out as they do not have the skills to milk the bowling for ones and twos

when boundaries dry up. Even if a batsman like Darren Bravo does settle in and play the spinners well, Bangladesh's batting display in the second match will ensure that the pressure is always there, as a middling total will probably not be enough

Tickets for the third oneday international between Bangladesh and West Indies have been sold out on the very first day after those were put on sale yesterday.

The third ODI of the 5match series will take place at the Sher-e-Bangla National Stadium in Mirpur tomorrow.

Fans queued up in front of the nine nominated branches of the Social Islami Bank Limited in the capital from early morning and many had to return home without ticket, which became precious after the Tigers' victory in first two games

in Khulna. "All tickets, around 19,000, for the third match have been sold out from the nine nominated bank branches in the capital on the very first day. So fans will not get any ticket for the third match from the

Ponting still feels pretty special

Ricky Ponting put on a brave face after he was denied a fairytale ending when dismissed for eight in his final Test innings Monday, bringing the curtain down on a glittering 17-year career.

Ponting, the second-highest Test runscorer of all-time behind India's Sachin Tendulkar, announced his impending retirement before the showdown with South Africa in Perth after a recordequalling 168 Tests for Australia.

The 37-year-old, who said he was more nervous for his final Test than at any other stage of his career, was looking to go out with a big innings.

But he lasted just 23 balls in Australia's second innings as the home side slumped to a 309-run defeat and South Africa won the series 1-0 to retain the number one Test ranking.

"I felt there was one last big push for me, and the day and game was set up for it, but it didn't last long enough," Ponting said.

However, with only two wickets left, Rajshahi are expected to ease to victory on the final day.

BARISAL v CHITTAGONG

An unbeaten century by Faisal Hossain led Chittagong's batting as they finished their first innings with a lead of 92 runs. Barisal lost three wickets before stumps as they ended the day on 97 for 3.
